### October Field Day

Sign on at 1 pm on Saturday, the 29th September. Saw the attendance of 16 members and 1 visitor. Including the rurally modified front end F100 of Nel and Lee Clifton who had an altercation with a cow the preceding Friday night, fortunately damage curtailed to vehicle only, not passengers. Front mudguard ended up being wrapped around wheels and was restricting driving but with some intuitive manoeuvering was finally pulled of thanks to Cookie. (THE MUD GUARD THAT IS)

Loved the sign on Flinders property stating "NO ENTRY", "NO ACCESS TO BEACH", "PRIVATE PROPERTY NO TRESPASSING", we have access to a spot conducive to group camping sheltered under trees and on our own away from the general public with great expectations to the potential fishing opportunities.

CAREFUL HANDLING AND FREEZING OF POTENTIAL TROPHIES

Since I began taxidermy I have had many fine specimens brought to be mounted often in condition better suited for the "Barby".

Most accidental damage can be repaired, though a fresh speciman in perfect condition has greater chance of ending up a trophy you can be proud of with less cost to you for the extra time spent on repairs.

Some of the ways you can keep your catch in good condition are:

Fish that you are intending to have mounted need cardful gaffing, if unavoidable, then restricting from leaping around (losing scales and splitting fins) by wrapping in wet bags or a tarpaulin. Remember when removing hessian etc, that scales and fins are "one way traffic" and can be damaged. Good quality photos and close ups taken while your fish is ALIVE are invaluable to me when repainting your trophy.
Minimize handling (especially spreading the fins) and keep cool, wet and out of the sum.

Aslo avoid ropes, crushed ice, baskets etc from denting unpadded flesh.

Prior to freezing cardfully fold fins in close to the body then (depending on size) wrap your fish in wet cotton wool or cloth (if possible) then several layers of Gladwrap, plastic or tarpaulin to prevent "Freezer Burn".

Crabs and crays are wrapped in similar fashion with any detached legs or feelers and any "spare parts" from similar specimens included in the package.

Birds and Mammals need any wounds, mouth and vent plugging with cotton wool or tissue to

prevent stains from leakage. Handle birds only by legs or beak and lay our straight. Wrap in tissue or newspaper then

several layers of plastic.

Mammals need tails and legs folding against the body before wrapping. PHENOL, a very potent poison and bacterial agent, can be injected into any slightly stale birds or mammal (but not fish or crustaceans) or fresh birds or mammals when immediate freezing

Inject diluted phenol into the crop, gut and brain of birds and brain gut and under the skin (especially around the face, tail and feet) of mammals. Only use a small quantity so not to overstretch the skin.

At the end of October our club lodged our submission with the Recreational Advisory Committee on the fopic of "The Future for Recreational Fishing. This review will decide the future of recreational fishing for at least the next decade and has come at an opportune time. With the increase in population coinciding with increasing pressure of fishing on our stocks, it is noticeable there is a dramatic drop in fish captures and unless an analysis of all relevant matters and alternatives is done immediately a few years down the track there won't be any fish to be caught. Needless to say what affect it would have on our club.

Our special committee formed to make a submission on our behalf has done a great job, with special mention to Peter and Sharon Osborne. A good deal of time over the four month period was spent on meetings to review the documents and relevant matters and as a result a very detailed submission was lodged by our club. Main points put forward were:

\* Agree on bag limits (with some minor alterations.)

\* Agree on trip limits

\* Agree on licensing as long as monies go to a trust fund which can never end up in government hands, and controlled by Recreation Fishing Council which must have a greater number of recreational

fishers present than bureaucrats
\* Tighter fishing control by fisheries (more fisheries officers to catch and prosecute offenders). To encourage the use of Honorary Fishing Wardens to help in policing stock management and

catch offenders.

\* Total ban on amateur netting (except for throw nets, prawn and crab nets).

Make sure that there is access to all our coastline for the public. Too much land is being closed off by private purchases and national parks.

\* Ban foreign vessels fishing close to our coast and in particular

"Wall of Death" drift nets.

\* Research professional trawling and its effect on breeding stock. \* Liase more closely with the Professional Fishing Association so that fish stock can be preserved for the benefit of us all.

\* Encourage conservation fishing.

As you can see a great deal of thought has gone into our submission and these and a lot of other points were made. We have had our say so now we await the draft which should be presented around March in 1991.


