Copy of letter received by Ray Porter from the Curator of the W. A. Museum.

<u>, and days to begin the Mark Afric</u>

Dear Mr.Porter,

There has been some delay in the identification of the big fish picked up by you at Yanchep beach, and presented to the Museum. This is mainly due to the fact that during the greater part of December I was Away, but also because the fish was of a species entirely unknown to me.

I have now identified it as <u>Centrolophus maoricus</u>, belonging to the family Nomeidae. This Latin may mean little to you, But I am afraid that the fish has no common name.

In Australia this fish has, as far as I am aware, been recorded only once, in or about 1919, when a specimen of 740mm length was found washed up on a beach at Crookhaven, New South Wales. Your specimen is not only a new record for Western Australia, but it also extends the known range of the species over thousands of miles and moreover is the largest example ever recorded.

The preceding lines will have made clear to you how important an addition to our collection the specimen is and I want to express my sincere gratitude and appreciation of the fact that you have taken the not inconsiderable trouble of collecting and preserving this large fish, and that you have donated it to the museum.

In the Sunday Times fishing column of the 8th January, 1961, one of our older members "Kurly Katz" received a mention along with Paul Foster of the Offshore Angling Club.
