DRY CASTING - January 6th, 1963.

Twenty three members and four juniors attended the casting, an excellent attendance considering that it was in the holiday period, and I think we all got our money's worth as some of the casting in the open had to be seen to be believed. Bill Bridger led the way with a magnificent cast of 429ft. (143 yds.) which establishes a new record for this event. Congratulations Bill, it certainly was a mighty cast. Noel Knight coming back into his own was second with 399 ft. and Allan Bunnett getting better all the time came third with 389 ft. Some of the other efforts well worth a mention were Bob Tichbon 384 ft., Bob Jensen 379 ft., Bob Tucker 366 ft., Bob Lilly 360 ft, Keith Mulvay 351 ft., Mick Doscas 337 ft. and Don Beadon 329 ft. which shows how the boys are improving.

In the Distance Event Bob Lilly with a cast of 364 ft. proved a good advertisement for the fixed spool reels as he topped the list, just heading Noel Knight who cast 363 ft., followed by Bob Jensen with 346ft. Noel Knight turned the tables where it matters most, with a score of 354 - 116 - 470, with Bob Lilly next 342 - 117 - 459 and Keith Mulvay 297 - 160 - 457.

The Double Handed Accuracy proved a day out for Bob Jensen with a score of 62/80, breaking the previous record. Congratulations Bob. Then came Bill Bridger with a good score of 51/80 and Keith Mulvay 43/80. Bill Bridger scored a bull and eight members scored with all four casts, no mean effort when the targets are 80 and 50 yards away.

In the Single Handed Accuracy Noel Knight finished way out in front with a score of 27/40, Bob Lilly was next with 18/40, and Ian McLennan, who always seems to come good in this event, was third with 16/40. Norm Clark, that's me in case anyone hasn't heard, managed to jag a bull, and only Noel Knight had the honour of scoring with all four casts.

In the Open Event there is only one more fixture and at present Bill Bridger holds a handy lead.

FIELD DAY AND OPEN FISHING COMPETITIONS AND DRYCASTING

Last months issue of "Reel Talk" carried a reminder to members of the competitions for the 1963 - 64 year. To any member who may have given this matter consideration as to alterations etc., to the benefit of these competitions and to all club members will they please forward these alterations etc., to any Committee man or hand in at our next General Meeting, February, so that they can be perused by Committee in February and they can be printed in March issue of "Reel Talk" for adoption, or otherwise, by the general members in March, for our present competitions finish on the 30th April and the new one starts on the 1st May.

IS YOUR SALT WATER DRAG SLOW OR STICKY?

As we all know prior to our present day reels which are smoother running, better finished and more evenly balanced, the thumb, finger or palm of the hand was the only drag we had to slow, stop, turn and wear out a fish, but today most reels are fitted with a drag, and as new reels come out they are modified, improved and with particular emphasis being placed on the drag.

Even though the reels are better finished and the drags work smoother, they still, with use, sometimes abuse wear. This is unavoidable for after all that is what we have the reel for - to use not to keep nice and clean, well oiled and locked in a box. Consequently the more a reel is used the more it will possibly wear and the following is what Ian Brown found to be the cause of the heading "Slow and Sticky" and how he rectified the cause in his Saltwater Reel:

Bearing in mind that uneven pressure and worped plates may cause the action of your drag to be tardy and uneven. First look at the drag spring. It may be found that the ends of the spring have been cut off, out of square. If this is so and it nearly always is, then dress the ends back to square with an emery wheel, and finish off on a fine oil stone using the figure of eight stroke.

Now for parts ± 7 in your Mitchell handbook, the serated washer may be twisted slightly. This may be proved by laying the washer on the oil-stone (preferably one with a level surface) and using one finger to lightly move it back and forth in a figure of eight motion, continue to do this until each tooth shows sign of being ground. Now repeat on the reverse side.

Next the horse-shoe washer, this requires only enough set to sound the alarm or ratchet when the drag is operating. Any extra set only serves to stiffen the clutch.

Having gone this far, it takes little effort to true the remaining plates. Using again the light pressure of one finger and the figure of eight stroke on the oil stone aim for a mirror like finish. Don't forget do the two sides.

Finally keep your drag washers clean and polished at all times and who knows we may have the answer to the "Spanish Mackeral" on our next trip to the Murcheson.

FIELD DAY GOLDEN BAY - 12th and 13th January, 1963.

Weather conditions: Fresh Easterly and South-Easterly winds which gave a calm sea and a clear picture of the main channel and holes, so offering no difficulty for members to choose a place to fish. These conditions were quite a change to what we have been encountering on some of our recent Field Days. It was quite a relief to be able to fish and not have to de-weed every few minutes. Not that everything was all our way, for the sand crabs were numerous, as one member was overheard to say "Those crabs are mighty expensive to feed with the scarcity and price of Mulies".

The attendance for this Field Day was an all time high, and made a Club Record. 43 members, 3 visitors, 13 juniors and 3 junior visitors made an overall tally of 62 anglers, which gives an indication that local Field Days are popular with members and by the figures of fish captured at this outing it would appear that nearly everyone caught fish. Though the general size of the Tailor were small according to the Tailor that we catch at times, at least they were there to be caught.

When the locals who ususally fish Golden Bay arrived on the scene they were amazed at the array of rods and bods that adorned the golden sands and which looked like a picket fence along the waters edge and I believe that quite a few characters weren't too happy at having their favourite spots taken and could not quite make out what was happening.

It was most pleasing to see quite a few of the lads along that do not generally make it to all Field Days and I am sure that they all enjoyed themselves and I hope that we will see them all along to our next Field Day and also another good attendance by juniors who appeared to thoroughly enjoy themselves, though Horrie Muirson is looking for a good second hand ball and chain to tie his young one up. Horrie reckons that as his lad grows older he should be growing younger to keep up with him.

On arrival at the venue the Club sign was erected and in short time we were ready for business and then the cars loaded with rods and bods. etc. started to arrive and Tom Backhouse, Norm Clark and myself were kept busy issuing cards and entering names in the Attendance Book, and then the lads were away to find a "hot spot". Alan Livesey and "Snow" Tate decided to go South and once again they did the right thing for with Doug Newton, Joe Strange, "Lofty" Griffith and young Bill Newton they all came back with good bags of Tailor and Sharks and by all accounts they had themselves a wow of a time for they were bitten off, broken off, snapped off and had the piscatorial pleasure that most of us would also have liked to have been in. Our turn next time poss_oly.

"Tiger" Lilly's party comprising Bob Tucker, Jerry Windus, Tom Smith and Ron McQueen headed for the point at the North end of the beach in an endeavour to find the "right" spot. Though the North did not return the fish captures that the South end did most of the lads returned reasonable bags and Jerry had the edge on most of the lads who went thataway and it was good to see him get stuck into fish for Jerry has been a most persistent tryer.

Ron Shirley and his young friend also went North and they chose a likely looking spot right on the point and when Ron's mate got a run and eventually landed a nice Mulloway at about 4.30 p.m. we all thought that this was going to be the place and day, but unfortunately there was only the one decent size Mulloway and another small one that Mick Coleman-Doscas caught much later on until around sundown when the small Tailor came on.

Norm Giles followed D. Rogers and D. Webb down South where they collected good bags of Tailor without too much trouble and it was good to see the newer members returning with good catches.

When Norm Clark and visitor Doug Hibbon and myself walked over to the beach around 5.30 p.m. we were amazed at the line-up of anglers stretching right along the beach North and South, and of the acitivity that was taking place. Ern White was observed laying into it and casting almost across the channel. Arch Tickle and his boon companion "Rocky" Backhouse were busy clowning and proudly showing off their catch of several Whiting. What a pair of outlaws these two are. I don't know when I've seen two chaps get so much fun out of life as these two. If there is anything going on you

can bet they are in it. (Sorry you couldn't get a Rockie though - Arthur. Ed.)

Further up the beach Ron Kildahl and Bob Flein were also doing their level best to find a big Tailor amongst the medicore size fish, but it was a bit of a battle as it was also for Bill Utting and the lads with him, though they locked that comfortable in their little beach tent that it really didn't matter if the fish weren't bit g. Kevin Hawker and his lad were observed getting into fish and young Bill Hawker was the runner and stood watch on Kevin's second rod. Young Greg. Clark showed us all up by landing three Tailor before most of the lads around us had had a bite, then Norm collected several - my score being 5 over size Sand Crabs after using 5 packets of Mulies.

Alf Rutland came by later on and gave a report on the activities up North where Mick Doscas, Hugh Gregory, George Greenham and Bob Tichbon were also, and stated that most of the lads had caught a few though nothing big, although Hugh Gregory was ready for all takers and was just about ready to bite the butt off his rods as he watched Ron Shirley pulling in Tailor and he couldn't get a bite.

The size of some of the Tailor really staggered me for I didn't know when I have seen them so small for a long time. About the size they catch on the Mandurah Bridge. Most of the lads cut them up for bait and many were rejected at the weigh-in, for even though the had the length, they did not have the required weight of three to be pound. The most remarkable thing about this was that while the fish up North were small and not really plentiful, down South one could almost say was the direct opposite, and this information should be borne in mind for anyone thinking of going down that way again in the next month or so.

Several of the lads fished through the night, but on this occasion these efforts were not sufficiently rewarded for an all night vigil though who was to know that, but by ll p.m. most of the lads had hit the sack ready for an early morning start and shortly after 4 a.m. most of the lads were back on the beach thrashing the water

with Mulies to entice the finny fellows, though once again the Sand Crabs and Whiting came into their own and quickly tore the baits to pieces which eventually was enough to discourage most and by 6.30 there was a steady flow of anglers heading wearily towards the Parking Area for the weigh-in.

The total weight of fish caught amounted to 298 lbs. of Scale Fish, plus 91 lbs. of Sharks was quite reasonable and our total of Scale Fish caught on Field Days now reads at 1,598 lb., and with three venues to go to complete this years competition there is every indication that we should better last years total of 1,628 lb., and more especially so if we can continue to have the good attendance figures of members that we have had on recent Field Day outings.

It was good to see Bertie Payne along again and true to form Bert Said later that he knew where the fish would he. Good on you Bert. It was also pleasing to see George Hampton and Steve along and George says that from now on he will "be in it" as often as possible. It is good to see the dads and their lads enjoying themselves. There sould be more of it.

The sad note on the Field Day was when Charlie Crouch let his grandson wash the fish he had caught which meant a loss to Charlie for the bag of fish was pulled out of the youngsters hand by a wave and so they returned from whence they came, but Bob Lilly came to the fore and compensated Charlie by giving him fish from his bag, which once again proves a real club spirit of friendship amongst members.

Ted Savage managed to sneak in a little fishing time. Ted got his half dozen Tailor and then made tracks for home. It was good to see you along Ted and we hope that it will not be too long before we have Doug along with us again.

My many thanks to the lads that assisted me on this Field Day, and I certainly needed all the help that I could get. To the winners of the different Awards I would like to offer my congratulations, to those who were close winners, here's hoping

that you will make it next time.

The next Field Day is at Preston Beach, South of Mandurah, off the old coast road. Arrangements are being worked out now for this venue, and the pros and cons will be available at the next General Meeting. The Club Sign will be the centre of operations. There will be one parking area for vehicles. All members to report in at the Club Sign. Fishing area will be as far North and South as members wish to walk. Weigh-in time will be 7.30 to 8.30 p.m.

ON THE REEF AT MOORE RIVER

The following are excerpts from letters to our Secretary, Ian McLennan from one of our most ardent and successful and popular club members, Norrie Cross. The first is an account of a "trip to the Reef" at Moore River, which is so graphic that one almost feels that one is with him and the next is of exploits in the Darwin area which I am sure all readers will admit is educational and informative.

Our many thanks for your most interesting letters Norrie, and let me assure you that they will always be welcome. May your stay in the N.T. be of a short duration with whips of fishing and that we will soon have you back with us gracing our Field Days and Casting Days, etc.

Monday, 17th December, 1962. Dear Ian,

First of all I should like to express my appreciation of the kind words and presentation at the December meeting. I deeply regret that I lacked the words to really show how overwhelmed I was at the sincere and spontaneous gestures of friendship from all at the meeting. Even now I can only say that being a member of the Surf Casting and Angling Club of W.A. has been the finest experience of my life, not only in the amount that I've learned about fishing and casting from what I consider to be a cross-section of the top representatives of their sport in the country, but also for the deep and lasting friendships that I have made and shall always treasure. My one ambition now is to return after two years and take an active part in the affairs of the Club. In the meantime I shall look forward to the monthly Reel Talk to keep tabs on you all, and when I learn a little bit about Darwin and its fishing I promise to send an occasional letter. We intend to invest in a 35mm camera and if I ever learn to master it perhaps I shall be able to project some slides of N.T. one Club meeting night.

My apologies for not attending the Quinn's field day. Here's hoping that the results were up to my prediction. I was more or less under an obligation to take a friend up to the Moore

River. He has been in South Australia for three years and spent a few days here prior to leaving for overseas and was keen to try himself out on the reef north of the Moore River. Results to a certain extent were disappointing. Evening fishing was poor due to the strong sou'westerly, weed and rip, but during the night kingies and tailor up to 41bs. were caught. In the morning about 25 anglers were flogging mulies off the reef and the tailor were surprisingly scarce despite perfect conditions. However about half a dozen kingles took trolled mulies and most people gave it away when these went off. The average catch was three or four tailor. With my companions, Jock Sharpe and Bruce McIntyre, I knocked off and brewed the billy. At about 9 a.m. I facetiously declared that I was going out to try for a yellowtail. I sent a herring out 200 yards on a balloon using the tatler and heavy rod, but this didn't produce so reverted to flogging mulies on the Mitchell. Retrieving my very first cast I spotted a herring proceeding in airborne hops, one hop ahead of a pellowtail and I streaked my bait in and plopped it in front of him. He followed it right to my feet but turned away so I scrunched a handful of Mulies and scattered them about 20 yards in front of my fishing spot. He swan around quite lazily in front of me and on the second cast the line tightened and we were in business for the next forty minutes. When he started to tire I had several very good side views of him and he showed clearly broad dark bands along his body which convinced me that I was into a samson fish. However, immediately Bruce gaffed him out of the surf south of the reef the bands disappeared within seconds and he lay there an even bronze colour, a yellowtail kingfish. I must confess that I am completely erplexed about this business of Samson fish and Yellowtails. Roughly states that at one stage of their growth it is impossible to distinguish one from the other. I finally convinced myself that it was in fact a Yellowtail by Roughley's illustrations which shows that this fish differs from the Samson fish in having the final ray of the Dorsal fin flaring upwards instead of downward. However, this is the first of the four yellowtail that I have landed which has had clearly defined bands on its body. We had a cheap camera with us and if the prints come out I will forward a photo for perusal. I have enclosed an entry form for the fish which I hope will kick the competition along a bit. It will go off all to soon, and I sincerley hope that Section 7 finally goes off with a Yellowtail in excess of 501bs.

I feel that the last yellowtail was my swan song even though I have several dozen mulies left in the freezer. Time is running out - the painting isn't finished yet:

Compliments of the season to you, Ian, and many thanks for the beautiful rig last year at the Moore River. I can honestly say that I have learned something about fishing from every member of the Club whose company I have had on the beach at some time or another on our field days. Looking forward to lots more of them!

SUNDAY, 6th January, 1963.

Dear Ian,

Enclosed is a snap of the 29lbs. 10 oz. yellowtail which I caught a couple of weeks ago at the Moore River. Next Thursday I am returning to pick up my family, returning with them on January 18th. This will give me time to give the Moore another thrash with some borrowed tackle - mine is all up here. The chap whom I relieved, Johnnie Horner, returned to Perth yesterday and I've promised him a run up to the Moore to try for some real sport after two years of frustration in Darwin:

I've been up here just over a week now, just starting to feel acclimatised. In the first 48 hours I fished three different spots here with various chaps and found it very hard to pick suitable rigs. The first trip was out to Buffalo Creek at low water. The sea was about a mile away over the sand and the creek was quite shallow in places, with deeper stretches on the outside of the bends. We struggled through mangrove swamp for several hundred yards up the creek, mud up to our knees, fiddler crabs and land crabs scuttling everywhere, whilst I kept a very apprehensive eye open for the coral snakes that Johnnie had warned me about. At a suitable spot on a clear rocky ledge, Johnnie fished with a whiting rig and prawn bait, and was soon pulling in whiting from 6 to 9 inches.

small bream up to $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. and some similarly sized trumpeter whiting identical to the Swan river type. After trying out a few different spinners on the flick rod I put one of Johnnie's whiting on a mulie rig and started to troll. The only fish that I raised was a deadly stonefish, fairly hooked through the upper jaw. He was a repulsive brute with two large red eyes looking straight up and poison spines all the way down his back and various other ones on the sides of the head and in the pectoral fins. Taking him off the hook was a ticklish job performed with the tip of the knife at arms length. pparently these chaps are quite a pest to local anglers. Previously I had been under the impression that they just lay around in reefs waiting to be trod on! After this I reverted to a whiting rig and on my first cast was retrieving what appeared to be a small bream when my line suddenly slackened and appeared to some towards me. I took up the slack carefully and next minute the line cut through the water at a rate of knots as a barramundi turned and raced off up the creek with my bream in his mouth. There was no hope of landing him, of course, and when he felt the check of the line he rolled on the surface, about 10 or 121bs., before spitting the hooked bream out. In future I'll probably try a live bream nicked through the back with a 6/0 beak hook under the same conditions

The same afternoon, another of my old fishing mates tried to inviegle me into an all-night session on the Darwin main wharf. I was pretty beat after my all-night trip up from Perth and the session in the mangroves so I compromised with a 4 a.m. start. This proved to be completely unproductive until first light when I observed some newly-arrived but obviously clued-up anglers pull in a decent sized ish near the base of the wharf. When I went down to investigate this the session was fairly on and they were all furiously pulling in "skinnies" between three and ten lbs. The "skinnie" in profile has the lines of a spanish mackeral, quite deep in the belly, but the big ones even are no more than two inches across the shoulders. The normal way to fish for these chaps is to first catch live bait, called locally sardines, but looking something like a poddy mullet. You jig a light line with about 10 bare No. 8 suicide hooks on it and the sardines bite on the bare hooks. With about half a dozen you are in business. The normal rig then is a 60lb. handline, about 5 ozs. of running sinker and the sardine hooked through the lips with about a 5/0 suicide hook. The skinnies hit like an express train, but the anglers give them no quarter and soon have them rolling on the surface. Under 51bs. they haul them straight up the

wharf, but the biggest one, nearly three feet long was kept with only his head out of the water until a 4 foot wide bucket shaped, wire covered cage was lowered on a rope and the fish steered into it and hauled up. I decided to have a crack at the skinnies with spinners, and climbed down on the rocks at the base of the jetty with my SG41, SW Mitchell and a box of spinners varying from 30z halco to 20z wet fly spoon flash. On my first cast I had two unsuccessful strikes, then on my next cast a skinnie about 7 or 81bs. in weight took the hook. He was excellent sport for about a minute, and leaped a couple of times, but eventually discarded the hooks. I wrote him off to experience and made a mental note to bring back some mulies next rip and try trolling for them. This was the end of the session and at 7.30 a.m. we packed it in.

The same afternoon I was invited to visit Berry Springs, about 33 miles south of Darwin. Although this was supposed to be just a sightseeing trip to a pretty swimming spot in the jungle I took the flick rod and some light spinners. The water looked delightful, deep, fairly clear, with large trees fringing the banks. Standing on some rocks where the spring opened out into the first large pool I flogged my spinners one after the other, taking the water in sectors at varying depths and speeds. After about half an hour an 18 inch barramundi flashed up after my smallest halco almost at my feet. He was the only one that I saw but it satisfied me that they were there. People were swimming in the far end of the pool and I felt that if I could go there on a week day, with clear water and no swimmers, the spinners would produce.

Since that first hectic 48 hours I have not fished, and may not do so until the family arrive, but I've been looking around for promontories, reefs and beaches with channels fairly close inshore. The tidal rip is the biggest limiting factor, rising on an average 23 feet in six hours. In fact, I forgot to mention that we packed up fishing in Buffalo Creek when the leaves on the surface started to gently move upstream. By the time we had forced our way back to the car the water was roaring up the creek at between 10 and 12 knots. The tide piles up on a bar at first, but when it tops this, most of the sand is carried away and the water fairly surges forward. On the outgoing tide the bar forms again.

So there you have it, Ian. The sum total of my catch so far is one stonefish! Most people are of the opinion that my rods and threadline reels will be useless up here, and that I should join the ranks of the handliners, but I feel that there is an unexploited potential for the rod and line man here. I intend to buy a 4gall. thermite container in Perth, cram it with mulies, sprinkle them with dry ice and put it straight into the butchers freezer on camp. I'll make a few exploratory trips with about ½doz. mulies each time when the tide is right, but I'll be limited to between half an hour and one is at high tide on the promontories around East Point or on Casuarina Beach which is not far from where I shall be living for a few months in Nightcliffe. Later, I may try balloon rigs and whole mullet on the Tatler in the region of Doctor's Gully or East Point, but I'm told that when a shark takes your rig here it's most likely to be a 12 foot grey nurse!

Well, that completes most of my fishing impressions so far. Hope to meet some of the boys when I come down, but if not I promise to keep you in touch with piscatorial events up this way.

I was very pleased to receive the last Reel Talk at my new adress, many thanks to Ted Savage.
