Port of Fremantle - Outer Harbour Causeway Project

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter dated 2nd December, 1970, in which you express the concern of members of your Association respecting the possible effects which the Causeway between Garden Island and the mainland may have on Cockburn Sound.

In this connection you may be assured that this Authority is also concerned and in anticipation of a Causeway to the Island being constructed has taken positive steps some considerable time ago to ensure that the natural environment of Cockburn Sound is preserved.

In 1966 when the Port Authority's long range plan for development of Cockburn Sound as a deep water commercial port was approved in principle by the State Government, the Authority undertook an intensive programme of investigation and research involving special studies by members of its own staff, and the granting of a research studentship to a post graduate student from the Department of Geography at the University of Western Australia to study various aspects of water and seabed movement in the Cockburn Sound area.

These investigations were followed by the appointments of a firm of international consultants, widely experienced in the planning and development of ports, who were commissioned to study, interalia, the Causeway alignment as proposed by the Commonwealth, the position and number of waterways through the Causeway, and the likely effects the Causeway would have on the environment of the Sound generally. The findings of the consultants, who were required to consider the preservation of the ecology of the Sound as a basic requirement, have been adopted by the Fremantle Port Authority, and the Commonwealth Department of Works, and largely have been the basis on which the final alignment and design of the Causeway was decided.

A second firm of specialist consultants has also been commissioned for an investigation involving the use of a hydraulic model to gauge, among other matters, the effect future port developments in the area may have on the movement of both seabed and water.

Further, the Port Authority has engaged the services of a firm of analysts and consulting chemists to carry out an hydrological study and ecology survey of the Sound, these investigations including the study of marine life such as sea-grass, mussels, sea-squirts, plankton etc., all of which react to changes in water conditions in a clearly detectable manner. Future checks of such life can be compared with the study results, so that changes and the reasons for such chaanges can be highlighted.

From the foregoing you will appreciate that the Authority is doing all in its power to make sure, as far as possible, that the future of Cockburn Sound will not be prejudicially affected by developments in the area.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT: (Amendment to inside cover)

GARFISH are measured from the tip of the upper jaw to the end of the upper half of the tail; PRAWNS are measured along the body from eye to the tip of the tail: CRAYFISH are measured along the mid-dorsal line from the anterior edge of the pronounced ridge which joins the front edges of the rostral horns immediately posterior to the eyestalks, to the posterior margin of the carapace; CRABS are measured from tip to tip of the posterior margin of the carapace spikes; MARRON are measured from the tip of the rostrum to the posterior margin of the carapace along the middorsal line; all other fish are measured from the point of the snout to the end of the tail.

RECOMMENDATION FROM THE COMMITTEE RE DRYCASTING.

At the last Committee Meeting it was decided by the majority to recommend to the General Meeting that the ensuing dry casting season see a new system in the level line.

It is to dispense with the handicap altogether and take 10 per cent of the average of three casts.

For example, John Bloggs scores three casts for a total distance of 900 feet. This total is divided by three with a result of 300 feet. Ten percent of 300 equals 30, therefore points scored by this caster would be 30.

This system, it is hoped, will encourage members to cast longer (thus improving their distance casting) if they wish to attain high points from this division.

It is felt by some members that good accuracy casters had an advantage over the long distance caster on the present system. However the same can be said for accuracy in comparison to distance; you have to apply yourself and practice. As long as you can reach the discs all you have to do is land the sinker in the right place. (Easy eh!)

The main obstacle to the new system in the level line appears to be that of a physical nature, but I should say that the results of the 1971/72 season (should this system be approved by the general meeting) will tell the story.

DON'T FORGET::::

There is only four weeks to the Field Day at the Murchison. You should start making your arrangements now and not at the last minute.
