#### SECRETARY'S REPORT:

On Tuesday, January 16th, President Tom and I braved the heat and travelled to Lancelin at the invitation of the Gingin Shire Council to attend a meeting of the Council, and representatives of the Lands Department, Environmental Protection Council, Town Planning, Department of Agriculture, A.A.A., Recreational Vehicles Association, W.A. Beach Buggy Association, West Coast Angling Club, Surf Casting and Angling Club and Les Reid, also George Holman.

This meeting had come about from the Shire's concern over the rapid increase in erosion close to the four coastal townsites in the Gingin Shire-Guilderton, Ledge, Seabird and Lancelin. At a previous council meeting, the council had discussed means of preventing the erosion caused by vehicles and one of the suggestions put forward was a complete bah. Somehow the "West Australian" heard about this and reported that this was to be the action taken. This, of course, caused a lot of concern to the above groups and a meeting was arranged.

The Shire President started by saying that the Council was completely happy about the activities of organised groups who in the past have advised the Council and sought permission to use the beaches and desert areas near Lancelin. He did not expect that this meeting would come up with a solution to all the problems but hoped that the exchange of views would show what steps could be taken so that the aims of all parties could be met. It was not the intention of the Council to finalise the matter at this meeting, since he expected that there would be many details to be sorted out. The Council recognised that, as with most problems, it was the actions of a small minority of people which would spoil it for the rest of the people who were not a problem.

The representatives were then asked to state their views and give some details of the club or association and its operation.

The W.A. Beach Buggy Association hope to acquire a lease of a part of the Lancelin desert and make it the Mecca of beach buggies in Australia. They are in favour of a form of registration for buggies with all buggies to carry an identifying number. They drew a comparison with the situation and laws governing the registration of boats. They are not in favour of the licensing of buggies, because the licensing requirements at present are such that they are not compatible with the requirements for a buggy with a performance that will win competitions. This Association has rules and regulations dealing with the safety of the vehicles and the users. The buggies are used on sand only and they are not operated over vegetation. Their requirements would be completely covered by a lease of an area of the Lancelin Desert and they would then have control over the users of that part of the desert.

The West Coast Angling Club is a small fishing club whose members own and use beach buggies. They are in favour of registration of buggies and the use of identification numbers.

Tom spoke for the S.C.A.C. and put our case for transport by 4-wheel drives and beach buggies along the beach to fishing spots.

The A.A.A. spoke on behalf of both club anglers and individual anglers and described how anglers' beach buggies are built to carry a load and not to tackle the biggest sandhills. The A.A.A. is also in favour of buggy registration and identification numbers.

The Recreational Vehicles Association re-emphasised points made earlier and described how the recreational use of beach buggies and 4-wheel drives on the beach and sand dunes was as important to its followers as other forms of sport and pointed out that nearly all traces of their activities are removed by the wind or water in a few hours.

George Holman, from this Club, was also present at the meeting and was a delegate for the A.A.A. of W.A. and the Recreational Vehicles Association. At the meeting he produced photos showing the tracks left on the beach after our field days, the club weigh-in and the loads our buggies carry, to substantiate his views.

Les Reid, as an individual buccy owner, was the last to speak and most of his points had already been made by earlier speakers. He felt that speed limits in various situations should be applied.

The Council then asked a number of questions about how the clubs could control and discipline club members and it was agreed that there would be few problems in this area. We were asked how often we see other people using vehicles in such a way that vegetation was damaged or erosion caused and if we would be prepared to point out to these people that they would spoil it for everybody and ask them to stop. Delegates were in favour of a suggestion that prominent Club members could be made Honorary Council Wardens with authority to take particulars of such people and order them to stop, or take action through the Council.

The current trend in advertising off-road vehicles so that they are depicted as scrub-bashing, trail blazing wonders was discussed and a number of people spoke against such tactics, however, it was pointed out that advertising will continue as long as it results in sales and these advertisements appeal to some types of people. This is easily seen by the number of fun bikes around for example.

Delegates were asked if members would be prepared to pay for third party insurance for buggies, and a figure of \$20-\$30 was suggested. This of course would remove one of the main objections to buggies;— the lack of insurance. 4-wheel drives, being licensed are covered by third party insurance. Most were in favour of this, although it is obvious that

there is a lot of work to be done before this can come about.

I feel that this meeting achieved a lot for anglers and the competitive beach buggies. The Gingin Shire Council is very sympathetic to our wishes and has no intention of applying a ban on vehicles on the beach. The Council now has had a personal meeting with members of the Club and recognises it as a responsible body, which must therefore, be composed of responsible members. With the field day coming up in February, I urge members to be particularly careful not to do anything which will change this impression. We are off to a good start with the Gingin Shire, and this should lead to the same sort of relationship with other coastal Shires. As a fishing club, and as individuals, we have everything to lose by doing the wrong thing.

# A.A.A. OF W.A. DELEGATES REPORT:

The past month has been a busy one for me as one of your Delegates to the A.A.A. of W.A.

Firstly, being one of the representatives for the A.A.A. of W.A., at the meeting with Gingin Shire and the various governmental bodies, entailed a good deal of running around and prepartory work, but the end result as it stands at present, was worth the effort. Finalisation depends on the decision of the governmental bodies on the issues of use of the beach for anglers and their vehicles, but the Shire has given us the green light to continue using them at present. The meeting discussed the issue in detail and everyone present was very pleased with the way it was conducted. The Shire said it was very happy with the way the Clubs conducted their activities and the conduct of their members and can see no reason why there should be any restriction on their activities.

It also said it would like to see some method of control of buggies in the Shire- possibly compulsory registration.

The last meeting of the W.A. Division on Tuesday, 16th January, was a lengthy one. One of the items delat with on the Agenda was the selection of the State Team for the Australian Championships to be held this year in N.S.W. Jack Harvey, from our Club, is in the final 15 from which the team of 12 will be selected.

Two shore records were passed: The first a Sand Whiting of  $l_4^1$ lb, the second a Gernard Perch 11b 90z.

The W.A. Division has been approached by Channel 9 and various radio stations to assist them in the running of a fishing tournament at Yanchep on March 30th and 1st April to assist a charitable cause.

This they have consented to do and would like a lot of assistance from the Clubs due to the number of entrants envisaged—approximately 3000. Bond Corporation are one of the sponsors and first prize is an all-expense paid trip to America for 2, to see the America's Cup. Approx. 9-10 other prizes total \$2,000.

Our Club Committee has agreed to make the club scales available and seeks volunteers to man them. This will do our club name a lot of good and we will possibly receive some publicity during the T.V. cover of the tourney. Our drycasting may be changed so that our members can compete if they wish.

A few other matters were dealt with but were not of interest to our members.

#### FORTHCOMING SEASON'S VENUES:

It is only a couple of months before the new season's venues must be selected and so we must give thought to this task.

To be able to satisfy all members with all their different opinions is an impossibility but we must remember that there are numerous vonues that, when fished at the right time of the season, are (in most instances), good fish providers because of seasonal migration etc. These good venues can also be flops if fished at the wrong time of the year as we all know.

If, when considering our venues, we bear this point in mind and, realising that if they provide good fish in the majority and everyone catches a feed, members will go along and be content. But not many will travel to an unreliable venue, as we have learnt in the past.

The Committee has had discussions on some of these venues and has prepared a list of the months and places that select themselves because of demand and proven catches in the past. #### "WEDGE":

Nev Riseby rang me early in the week to suggest a trip to Wedge Island. I roped in a mate of mine, Bob Alver, and we settled on Sunday as the most convenient. I guess Bob wants to get his son started early, although at  $3\frac{1}{2}$  he doesn't do much fishing yet! Neville had his son Craig along and I brought a young Geraldton lad down in Perth on holiday.

So, at 10.30 a.m., or thereabout, we sett off; as it happened, with two vehicles, as Bob's LWB Landrover had a suspect gear box and we couldn't all fit in mine. This served as a reminder to me that on beach trips a party with two vehicles is great insurance.

Lancelin Inn was a welcome sight at mid-day and we sank a couple of coldies with a scratch lunch. The tyres were flattened for the trip up the beach. There was a fairly late low tide and from last field day the beach appealed more than the track. With only a couple of boggy patches in the whole distance, the beach was great to drive on. We checked out the Southern reef but the dreaded weed was in. So off we went to the North of Wedge. There was a group fishing a couple of miles up and they were getting tailor (2.30 p.m.), but one guy had busted the top off his cane rod on a clump of weed. On we went trying to find good water not heavily weeded. Towards the Rock (which couldn't be driven around), we found a clear patch with a nice looking gully, just out of reach. Luck was with us, we found one could wade out on a bank and get into the gully. Bob and I went out first, while Nev got his young bloke going. We only had about 10 mulies each just to give it a try. Half-a-dozen casts later still nothing, so Bob went to change his rig, but he had his eye on going further north. My next cast had a small tailor following my mulie just as I lifted it up. Then it started (3.30 p.m.), next cast a lelb tailor, then bang, a 31b one. I flagged the guys and by the time they were out I had another about 31b. Well, although only a few were of that size were caught, we soon found ourselves with bags heavy with 1-21b tailor and wading in for more bait. After a couple of hours of this the pace was starting to tell. Then I pulled in a tailor that had been bitten off about halfway and was still struggling on the hook. Bob hocked two on the one rig and he was so busy dangling them and yelling at us that one fell off. By 6.30 we had had enough, so out with a couple of bottles for hors'd' ourves and we tucked into some food with the sun still a half-hour or so off setting; a time I'm more used to as the start of fishing. With the fish to clean, our attempt at Mulloway fishing was not really concentrated. I had one good run and when I lifted the rod it felt really heavy. But, no dice, I think I layed into him too much and was broken off. So weary, but happy, we headed home with 135 fish to show for it.

A note on the juniors; my charge was in all sorts of bother with a strange reel (manual pick up L.H.W.) and rod, and never really got going. Nev's boy had great fun pulling in eight nice tailor; Dad had to do the casting to reach the gully. For awhile they were really going. Nev casting,

handing the rod to Craig and then bang, Craig battling away with Nev's 650 Alvey and 12' rod with an angry tailor at the other end.

Is it, or is it not to talk about environmental control nowadays; Harsh words; mostly because everyone is concerned today and agree that something had to be done NOW?

We fishermen are probably more aware of the problems THAN the general public realise. No wonder we are in the midst of a great changing environment- we are killing nature.

Remember when we used to pull out fish just about anywhere and pull up a crisp piece of kelp on our gear. when snagged from the bottom. Now we are more likely to reel in greasy covered weed, plastic bags and undefinable muck.

We have seen, and heard, our waters being polluted by waste, oil and chemicals. We are now beginning to see these waters less transparent, not hospitable to our fish.

Let it be a year of awakening for angling club fishermen to make their contribution for conservation and to others who don't know any better.

Catch your fish and preserve them. Let's have our enjoyment from nature. THINK ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL.

#### TO FILL A PAGE:

It appears, as I prepare this edition of "Reel Talk", that I am a page short, so I have to find a little something to write about.

Thinking back over the past month, I realised that I had had a bit of a look at Seabird and Moore River, with Les Reid, whilst on our way home from the meeting with the Gingin Shire. Realising that this is the location of our next field day, and also that this is around a month earlier, I will tell what I saw, and if the weather doesn't change too much, it should be about the same. One point though, we will experience a full moon on this venue and it will be interesting to see what effect this has.

Back to the location: Moore River is the best I have seen it for a long time in relation to the beach and weed. The sand has covered the reefs inshore and the mouth of the river is open. The thing that impressed me most on the day we saw it (and it was a calm day), there wasn't a blade of weed on the like in sight. Should be ideal for Mulloway and Tailor and possibly herring.

Seabird had some weed, particularly South, but around the jetty area was nice and clean. The thing that impressed me most about this area was that the water was deceivingly deep, even though from the shore, it doesn't give this impression. A short cast from shore and you would be in 10-12 feet of water as it shelves off quite quickly only a short distance out. This isideal for sharks and larger fish, also tailor and possibly a mulloway or two. Herring should be there in the morning. Anglers might experience some trouble with blowies until dark because of the offal that is pumped out near the jetty, but looking at the bright side, it might also bring the fish around.

The water is around 18 feet deep off the end of the jetty but the problem here is that to obtain a fishing spot on the jetty, you have to be real early. It is very popular with those people on holidays.

Possibly, whilst I'm rambling on, I might make a few comments on the Ledge Point area and the beaches south. Ledge Point area and the jetty have in the past, produced some good catches and with the tailor running should be as good a fishing spot as any. The beaches south are usually rather soft to traverse in buggies or 4-wheel drives, but can be negotiated. At times there are to be found some good fishing holes and gutters and this area should produce some sharks, tailor, mulloway and herring.

With these few comments I will have possibly given you some idea of the area and a little food for thought, I hope- as well as filling this damn page!!!
