The longest casts for the day were as follows. 56gr 147.62m, Art bait 136.68m and 112gr 159.89. Gary had the 2<sup>nd</sup> longest 56gr with 135.25m and also the 2<sup>nd</sup> longest 112gr with 142.20m beating Bob by 1 mtr.

Gary had no competition in the DHA with a good score of 161, the next closest was 122 (not good). A top score of 30 by my myself in the single-handed accuracy was enough to win on the day, with Mark with 28. Mark once again took out the honours in the Men's division, not hard to do if you are the only one casting.


The next drycasting will be held on  $7^{\text{th}}$  February, hopefully. *Ron Thomas*

## January 2022 Cervantés field day Report

On arrival at the car park north of Cervantés, the sea had "white horses" galloping across the surface due to the strong southerly; the water was that milky green that doesn't usually bode well for fishing.

After driving down the scratchy 5km bush track to Black Rock, I set up camp a little away from the limestone, as there were already a group of campers in place. They turned out to be eight Yugoslavian gents from the various ex-states [now countries] of the former republic. I was invited over for lunch and beer and grappa. The conversation about Novak's recent antics was rather interesting; depending on which country you were from. All this socializing took quite some time, and it was mid-afternoon before I got a line wet.

The wind was so strong that the sand was not only painfully blasting any exposed skin but also eroding from around the tyres causing the Land Cruiser to slightly list to windward.

I didn't get any bites until just before sunset, and only managed to bag a couple of tailor. During the night the southerly didn't let up, in fact it got stronger, making the roof top tent sway back and forth, rocking me not quite so gently to sleep.

I was up half an hour before dawn, setting up the burley bottle and subsequent oil slick trail for the usually reliable morning gardies and herring, this really needs an easterly wind to push the oily advertising out to sea, however the Douglas wondering why there aren't any fish caught yet

persistent southerly just forced it uselessly north along the shoreline, so no fish bit. After a couple of hours of nothing [not even a blowie] taking the hook, I packed up early, had an ethnic BBQ breakfast with the lads from the former republic and was ready to leave by mid-morning. Fortunately, because of the low tide, I was able to comfortably drive around the rock and south along the beach all the way to the town site to inflate tyres and be home in time for lunch.

# Fishing With My Dad – Preston Beach.

Preston beach is a great spot for Dad and I to get away fishing for a night. Only about a 90-minute drive from home with the highway, we go for bite time. Leaving at 2pm to arrive on the beach, ready with lines in the water by 4pm sharp.

As usual Preston Beach was PACKED as it was still school holidays and a Saturday. Lowering the tyres and taking a quick picture of the rescue tractor's number, we headed out for a very bumpy ride. Lots of inexperienced drivers with their tyre pressure still road worthy - the beach was choppier than the waves!



We manage to find a spot that looked good which is hard at Preston as everywhere looks good. Once we pulled up the real task began. My job is to set up the rods, thread the line through and get the chairs out. Dad's role is to put the reels on, put the rod holders into the sand and the rigs. Turns out 'we' forgot to pack the chairs – by "we" I mean Dad! So, the trip started badly but could it get worse? The answer, yes! It did get worse for both of us. With only 2 rods ready with bait, I looked down to notice the reel on Dad's rod did not have the "reel" bit. You know the turn-y thing that allows you to bring in the fish. This time it was all Dad's fault.

So now we reach 4:30pm and down to no chairs and 1 rod leading into what we call the "bite time". Now most that know Dad and I, we secretly are competitive but don't admit it to each other.

We came up with the plan of one turn each. This is where it gets interesting. Is it one turn each as in each cast, or each fish? Changed

every time. So, when I reeled in and saw Dad had his back to me, I quickly cast back out so it looked like I was still on my one turn. I think that is how I ended up catching more fish than Dad!



Night continued and we decided to leave earlier than usually as the beach was busier and sandier, so we left at 7pm with 4 tailor and 2 herring in tow. For only 3 hours fishing with one rod. I was pretty happy with that result considering I got 3 of the tailor and 1 herring which was HUGE! THE BIGGEST! AND MORE IMPORTANTLY BIGGER THAN DADS! (that's why it is in capital letters). Dad is still arguing he caught the biggest tailor of the trip, but I clearly remember mine being 0.05cm longer.

Now Preston Beach being the lovely sandy beach it is, we struggled to get out. I believed it was the driver and

not the vehicle. (P.S. Dad was driving). We ended up going back 100 metres to only drive 20 metres forward. Struggling to get to high grounds to avoid the families on the beach, we were thinking of dropping the PSI in the tyres until I notice that the amazing safety features on this 5 star ANCAP rated vehicle were preventing our smooth drive home. We forgot to turn off the traction control. The traction control detects if there is a loss of traction with the car wheels. By detecting this, the brakes are applied to the wheel or wheels with no traction and more power to the one with the traction. (Sarah's interpretation). Once switched off, the drive was beautiful! No more struggles in the sand.

Pumping up the tyres is the best and worst time. Best time as Dad and I talk and reflect on the trip and worse time as the trip has ended and we don't know when we go out next. As life goes on it is becoming harder for Dad and I to find time to go fishing. More commitments with study and work, I am getting more jealous of Dad's free time to go fishing and now that he has a boat as well. I wish I can join him for every trip, every adventure except for Rotto, as I usually drop him off at Freo and look at the waves taller than me and the weather as grey as grey can be — I'm happy on the land and not on that boat.

## Back to beach fishing -



I love learning from Dad. He taught me how to fish, how to cast, how to bait, how to fillet, how to 4wd and more importantly how to take care of Dad while fishing. Always get bait for Dad first, keep him hydrated and well fed.



#### SPORTING??

Awhile back I was talking with Boyd Pfeiffer about the advent of spinning tackle. I had assumed, incorrectly as it turned out, that it was a relatively modern innovation, coming around only as of perhaps the 1930's or 1940's. Boyd mentioned that spinning tackle was available in the very late 19th century, but wasn't used much because it was able to cast very light and rather productive offerings and was therefore considered "unsporting" by sportsmen of that era. Imagine that!

Growing up in the 1960's, all of us who were involved in any aspect of the field sports were taught that anything which provided the participant an "unfair advantage" was unsporting and as a matter of conscience, should be avoided. You didn't shoot a duck on the water and you didn't attempt to snag fish. It just wasn't done by anyone who considered themselves a sportsman. In fact, that's what differentiated a sport from a game – in one the rules were self evident and self imposed, in the other they were written down and enforced by a referee.

Recent 21st century fishing innovations require the modern fisherman to search his conscience and decide what unwritten rules he will impose upon himself. Visiting a local tackle shop I was asked by the proprietor what I thought about the Alabama Rig, a transplanted saltwater meat-fishing technique that is currently all the rage in the bass fishing world. I remarked that I figured that a man fished for one of three reasons — food, money or sport.

As far as fishing for food goes, I do not believe it is any longer possible to equip oneself, incur the fees and other associated costs of the sport, and catch fish for less money than it costs to simply buy a bag of grocery store fillets. As far as money, this is the realm of the tournament fisherman and for me, is nothing more than competitive gambling. I do not ignore the impact that tournaments have had on the sportfishing industry and the business it has generated for those who depend on that huge economy. But it is not for me. Which leaves fishing for sport — which is what I do. In that aspect I was left with only one answer for the man, "I consider it unsporting and will not use it."

2012 has seen the advent of new fishing sonar units so adept at interpreting electronic signals and displaying them on a screen, that one might as well employ an underwater camera. The days of intelligently interpreting flasher signals and determining bottom contours that were likely to hold fish are long over. Now fishermen will simply hunt individual fish, sorting the bass from the catfish from the bream, from the small fish to the big fish, and make his casts based on what his television screen is showing him. While I see no skill in that, I am forced to acknowledge that there were once those who used plum bobs and spoon plugs to record bottom contours and probably lamented the advent of sonar flashers, which we now think of as primitive, as unsporting.

I suppose the fish still gets to decide whether to bite or not, but perhaps only for the time being. Who knows what lurks just around the corner. For fishermen of my generation or older, there is a sudden clash between these newest technologies and the sporting ideals taught to us as children. What constitutes an "unfair advantage" is something each individual must decide for themselves.

## THE IMPORTANCE OF BARBLESS HOOKS





Barbless hooks have been around for years. However, as catch and release angling has surged in popularity, so too has demand for these hooks. You might be asking yourself, what's the big deal? After all, you can just crimp the barbs on your other hooks.

Here's the thing: when you crimp the barb on a barbed hook you remove the one thing meant to keep the fish on, the barb. Barbless hooks - on the other hand - are engineered to have excellent fish holding power without the barb there in the first place.

### THE HISTORY OF BARBLESS

So, barbless hooks. Where did it all start? According to Fulling Mill Technical Manager Steve Carew, Fulling Mill has been selling barbless hooks for 25 years or more. He says "the initial designs were introduced due to the increase in catch and release fishing. They were exact barbless copies of the successful barbed hooks that we sold and used in our fly production. I have to say, though, that these hooks were a resounding flop. The initial production batch were quickly discontinued, and it took us many years to sell through the stock."

However, the story doesn't end there. Steve continues, "around 2011 we saw that competition style fly fishing on rivers was really gaining in popularity and the top teams were using manufactured barbless hooks from Eastern Europe. So, we decided to launch a range of barbless flies and initially we used the hooks from Eastern Europe to tie them. We discovered all sorts of quality issues with these hooks, so after a serious sales job on the then owner of Fulling Mill, he was convinced to invest once again in getting barbless hooks manufactured. This time, however, the hooks were not just straight barbless copies of barbed designs. The rest is history. The fly range and the hooks were a huge success, and they continue to be a core part of Fulling Mill's fly and hook offering."



#### WHAT MAKES BARBLESS HOOKS UNIQUE?

Barbless hooks are specially engineered to hold hooked fish just as well as their barbed counterparts. According to Technical Manager Eric Kelley, when you remove the barb on a hook "you need to look elsewhere within the design to see what can add holding power to that hook model."

As an example of this, he says "a popular method is extending the hook point to give the angler better leverage to hold a fish more securely. You can mess with the angle of the bend as well to increase holding power and leverage applied. Basically, a whole mess of things can be tweaked in the hook shape to get what you're ultimately after. Its why hook development is so fun."



### THE FULLING MILL BARBLESS RANGE

When we introduced our second round of barbless hooks, they were an immediate success. According to Eric, "We released a handful of models all at once to better suit the needs and wants of anglers who kept asking for barbless hooks. The Grab Gape, Jig Force, Heavy Weight Champ and Czech Nymph hooks were the original forerunners. That was a decade ago and immediately after their release, anglers and tyers kept knocking on the door for more."

While there is still demand for barbed hooks in some applications, with the spotlight being shown on the competition scene, more and more people are now starting to realize that barbless hooks aren't what they used to be decades ago quality wise. More and more anglers are making the change.

### THE BENEFIT OF BARBLESS HOOKS FOR CATCH-AND-RELEASE

Hooks are one of the more well studied aspects of catch and release angling and the resounding consensus is that barbless hooks are better for fish than barbed hooks. There are three main reasons why barbless hooks help create better outcomes for each fish you release.



### **LESS INJURY AND BLEEDING**

Barbless hooks cause less injury and bleeding. Studies on species as wide ranging as trout, bass, and triggerfish have shown the there is less bleeding and injury associated with barbless hooks. Most of the injury from barbed hooks is a result of the unhooking process. This study found that barbless hooks significantly reduced moderate or severe injury. This can become increasingly important when a fish is hooked in sensitive areas (gills, throat, gut, or foul-hooked) where bleeding is more likely to occur.

### **EASIER AND FASTER TO REMOVE**

Second, barbless hooks are easier and faster to remove. Based on research on a wide range of freshwater and marine fish, using barbless hooks tends to reduce handing time by half. This is important because the longer your handle a fish the more stressful it is for them. A study found that barbless hooks were faster and easier to remove and also reduced the duration of air exposure fish experienced by 50%.

### **LESS MORTALITY**

There are a number of studies that have shown that barbless hooks reduce mortality of fish after they are released. In this meta-analysis (a statistical analysis that combines the results of multiple scientific studies), the authors found that in some studies barbless hooks decreased mortality. Overall, the authors found that in the studies they examined the average mortality rate for barbed hooks was 14.6% and for barbless hooks was 8.2%. They hypothesized that it was often either or a combination of both of the first two reasons (less injury and bleeding, and faster unhooking) that led to decreased mortality for fish caught with barbless hooks.

Barbless hooks, in particular those designed as barbless as opposed to barbed hooks that have been crimped, lead to advantages for anglers and fish alike. Each time you catch a fish, it's an opportunity to put conservation into action by using best practices - barbless hooks is the perfect place to start.
