### IMPROVE YOUR CASTING.

If your casting is sub standard try aiming high. One of the best remedies for the average beginners casting difficulties is to cast at the clouds. Most novices are a little slow at releasing the thumb pressure on the shoulder of the spool when they make their cast. The result is a short cast as the lure or bait is aimed to low. Raising the trajectory lengthens the cast. The high point of aim makes for easier lazy casting and maximum distance.

Merv Brittens effort in landing a  $2I\frac{1}{2}$  lb Kingie on a spinner "at 4. am. is really outstanding and has put the pressure on the Master 9 of the open fishing competition.

To the uninitiated the "Master" is none other than the mighty Davis.

#### THE LURE OF THE KINGFISH:

The West Australian Kingfish, or as it is more correctly named the Mulloway, is a fine cating fish when smaller and when in the larger sizes a real slugger, and on reasonable tackle he satisfies the most avid of thrill happy rodmen. Coast and is also taken in the fish occurs far up our Western Coast and is also taken in large numbers on the Eastern coastline. Every October sees the Kingie specialists in their usual haunts. The fish then commence the run up the Swan River and the season lasts until as late as April.

When they first enter the miver from the sea they are a silvery coulour but as the season progresses they acquire a bronze colouring. To say that Kingie hunting is a disease would be a frose understatement, as once bitten the angler becomes a social outcast in his quest for these tackle busters.

### A few words on bait.

I Would say without hesitation, that the finest bait for early season is Squid. The head of the squid being used and laced on to a 6/0 mm to 9/0 hook.

Closely following the squid in popularity is Mullet, cut into chunky strips and laced or threaded on to a 6/0 to 9/0 hook.

However, as the Trumpeter enters the river around Christmas time we can use these, and when the Kingies are on, the Trumpeter really comes into his own as a live bait. Small Tailer and Yellowtail also make very good live baits.

There are two ways of using Live Bait. First by inserting the hook in the shoulders just behind the head. Secondly by inserting the hook behind the Anal and Rear bottom fin. Both these methods are good and do not kill the live bait, yet still leave plenty of barb clear to do the hooking.

When fishing for small Mulloway, a prawn with 2/0 or 3/0 French Hook is ideal.

### REELS.

With trends favouring the Geared Overhead Reel, it is rarely that the old drum reel is seen, however, this does not mean the drum reel of yesterday is no good-far from it - as many fine fish have ended their days on the wrong end of the old wooden or

again the dealers with the

aluminium drum reel.

A reel with a good capacity of 18 lbs to 27 lhs or even 35 lb nylon line is the shot. I know some more adventuresome types have used light lines successfully, but the fish are not hooked frequently enough to risk losing them through light lines chafing.

Now Kingfish in the surf are a different thing to Kingies in the river. You will, I know, at times get that fierce savage pick up but more often it will be a slight easing away as he mouths the bait turns and is then off.

Any interference or striking at this easing off stage and it is curtains for you. Consequently having cast out your bait, be it Trumpeter or Squid, or live bait it pays to put your rod down and pull off about IO to I5 feet of slack. This is just pinned down with a bit of paper or stone- your reel is of course on free spool with the ratchet engaged.

This set-up gives the Kingie time to mouth the bait and as he eases off he meets with no pressure and when he is on his way he meets the ratchet pressure.

If you are fishing from a wall or embankment, pick up the rod and strike by an upward lift, with the gears of the reel engaged and then run a few yards backwards. This action takes any slackness out of your line, that is if the fish has picked up the bait and is swimming parallel to the wall instead of heading out.

The first fatal step is to have your drag too tight. I know for I have lost a few good fish like this. Have your drag pre-set so you can pull it off fairly easily and smoothly with one hand. After all. Why have 200 - 300 yds of line on your spool and risk losing your fish by trying to stop him in 50 yds. Let him run freerly and soon he will stop, and you will feel that familiar head wagging as he tries to dislodge the barb. Now you can stir him up a bit by pumping the rod. He will take off again, but slower this time I'll wager and when you stop him this time, with care he's yours.

I say with care because many fine fish have been lost by bringing them too gaff too quickly, and having that star drag set to tightly. When he nears the jetty or wall, that is where he has that final go and 40 lbs of Kingie on a short length of line can

really play havoc.

When you bring him to the gaff slack your drag and when he goes to town your line goes with him. You can count on ten to twenty minutes of real good slugging with one of these boys.

### Times to fish.

The early hours of the evening, the early hours of the morning. In fact they are like gold - they are where you find them, and when you find them. But, whatever the hours you log up, you have only to get one of these beauties and you will be like me. Anxious to have another go at what I claim they are Tackle Busters.
