DRY CASTING - December 2nd, 1962

Twenty four members and four juniors attended the casting to witness one of the best individual efforts seen for a long while, Norrie Crossfinished in first place in the distance, third in the D.H. Accuracy and first in the S.H. Accuracy, and in doing so he broke the record for the Spinner Distance with a mighty cast of 389 ft., and the Single Handed Spinner record with a score of 31/40. Congratulations Norrie, and F am sure everyone will be looking forward to your return.

There were some excellent casts in the distance event, Norrie Cross 389ft., Noel Knight 363ft., and Bill Bridger 352ft. were some of the best, and with their handicaps Norrie Cross top scored with 340 - 140 - 480, with Bob Tucker next with 329 - 141 - 470, followed by Noel Knight with 329 - 139 - 468. These chaps are certainly applying the pressure now.

In the double handed accuracy it was good to see Ernie White out in front, Ernie has been battling hard but this is the first time he has cracked it, and with a good score of 47/80 he was followed closely by Ron Kildahl 45/80 and Norrie Cross 44/80. No-one managed to score a bull, but there were near misses by E. White, K. Mulvay, J. Strong, and G. Greenham, and only three members scored with all four casts, they were R. Kildahl, A. Livesey and R. Jensen.

In recent months the single handed accuracy has proved quite a problem, but this month was the exception with some excellent casting. Norrie Cross topped the list

with 31/40 which establishes a new record for this event and right behind him also breaking the previous record were Bob Tucker and Allan Livesey with 30/40, followed by Ian McLennan with 23/40. Ian and Noel Knight both scored bulls and six members scored with all four casts. Allan Livesey had the honour of being the only one to score with all eight casts in the accuracy events.

At present Noel Knight will be in the handy position but I am sure he will have some stiff opposition before the competition closes.
