JANUARY FIELD DAY:

This particular field day always has a good attendance and as a result members have a satisfying social weekend even if the fish aren't about. But when the fish are there too, well, such club runs are really memorable.

Boundaries - Members may fish between the areas bounded by a point 2 miles south of Lancelin to a northern point on the beach as far as you can drive north of Wedge Island. Sign on and weigh in times are printed in the front of Reel Talk.

Remember, gentlemen, that you will be operating in an area where the two shires concerned are very environment conscious. The club has a speed limit of 35 m.p.h. on the beach and regulations regarding flags on vehicles - please remember these. Flags are to be fifteen feet from the ground and in clearly visible cloth. These should be flown on all tracks and on the beach.

Please bury all rubbish or take it away with you. The 'bone' was pointed in this clubs' direction in 1972 because a few members forgot.

Be wary too, of snakes and fire.

Let us hope this field day is a truly memorable one from an angling and social point of view and not for its indiscretions.

ANYTHING TO SELL:

Members are encouraged to use their Reel Talk if they have fishing gear to unload. Things like that old rod not used since 1963 or that reel that is never used but is in good nick. There just maybe a member who needs such a piece of equipment.

If you furnish details - in writing - to the Secretary, he will see that the information is printed in Reel Talk.

SUGGESTION FOR NEW ANGLING YEAR COMPETITION

I have watched our present club angling competition with a good deal of interest and as we have now been asked to put forward our comments and suggestions, I will do so.

I don't think the competition in its present form is doing the club any good; in fact I think it is having the opposite effect. The interest isn't there as we had under the previous competition, and it doesn't achieve the main point of its introduction - that of conservation - in fact it does the opposite and to a greater degree than our previous method of angling. It encourages the fishing for species which we would normally frown upon, (the rock fish, buff bream and the like) and these fish are invariably wasted after being weighed in. Even though we caught large quantities of fish under the old scheme, they were not buried or thrown away as has been the case at present.

Four of each species seems to be a determent rather than encouragement to members fishing on a field day, as it is looked upon as a limit, and also the fact that one has to fish for something else after he catches ' of a species if he wishes to compete, even if he is in the middle of fishing a good school of tailor. Not many of us would stop fishing one species of fish if we look like being able to cath a good feed, so that we can win a competition - and we shouldn't have to, because this is the whole point of our activities: WE GO FISHING TO CATCH A FEED OF FISH!! Anything that is too restrictive isn't satisfactory.

One other point we have been asked to comment on - that of altering gear - we shouldn't have to. We should be able to fish for what we like, with what we want to fish with, and how we want to fish for it. The club have just spent \$300 - \$400 on 2,3,4 and 5 to 1 badges for light line fishing for those who wish to do so. This should suffice.

"More Mobile" anglers are part and parcel of angling in our present day and I can't see us restricting one or the other now that this aspect has come to our club. We have to live with it.

There is an advantage to these mobile members but because they are "mobile" doesn't necessarily make them better anglers. It still comes back to knowledge, ability and luck! Co-operation between members is what we want.

Our present format has another draw-back. There are no incentive points for catching each variety. The consistent anger who is weighing in four or five varieties a field day may be getting beaten each time by an angler who weighs in one species but with a greater total weight.

No species (other than the ones that we have at present) should be eliminated. The choice of what fish the angler must fish for should be left to the individual, but a competition can be framed in such a way that he can be left to fish for the "better" varieties without having to be told to do so, as no angler likes being told what he must fish for or how to, for that matter (in most cases anyway).

Suggestions for New Angling Year Competition (Con'td.)

Now to get down to my suggestion; as I have commented on the points as asked, and as can be seen, I am not personally satisfied with the competition as it is - not just from a personal point of view but because I don't think it is doing the club any good - not in its present form anyway.

A few points we must consider when thinking about a new competition are: Firstly, that it achieves the purpose of our club field days and that is that we go along to cath a FEED of fish; it must be simple to operate; it must make the minimum amount of work for our F.D.O; it must contribute to as great a degree as possible toward conservation; and must form an interesting and challenging competition.

My suggestion is that we fish a competition based on 2 points per kilo but setting a limit of 15 fish to be weighed in. The choice of what fish an angler weighs in is up to him. There can be an additional proviso if members think it necessary and that is the three placegetters get incentive points e.g. first 9, second 6 and third 3. This latter proviso is so that the one big haul won't necessarily beat the consistent angler/s.

Themerits of this suggestion are:-

- 1. It's simple and would make the F.D.O's work relatively easy.
- 2. The suggested limit is reasonable in that say 15 tailor of 1 2 lbs, (or 1 kilo) represents a good feed. It is high enough to satisfy the better anglers as they would normally catch a quantity in this region, but it sets a goal for our lesser experienced anglers to achieve. This doesn't mean to say that an angler has to stop at that figure, because he wouldn't I'm sure, but there wouldn't be much point in caching many more unless the individual had a use for them and could adequately get them home in his ice box.
- 3. Conservation comes in because of the suggested limit and because the format is such that the angler can choose what he fishes for. He is hardly going to fish for rock fish and buff bream and the like if he can fish for tailor, mulloway, skippy and herring, etc. thus no wastage.
- From a competition point of view looking at the two extremes, say herring and sharks (or large mulloway) it brings out the best in an angler because to win he must fish for the larger varieties that may be caught in the locality being fished, but if these aren't about, the chap fishing for the more common varieties will beat him. For example, if you are fishing for large fish your chances of catching smaller varieties are nil and vice versa (unless you are very lucky or very good at angling) The main point to remember though is that the choice is that of the angleme. This goes for the social side too you don't have to fish competitively if you don't want to, but you must have a competition for those who want to fish competitively and so that you can have organised angling outings.

Suggestions for New Angling Year Competition (Cont'd)

5. We wouldn't have to eliminate certain species (other than those we have at present) because of the format of the suggested competition.

In making the above suggestion, I think it would be a sound proposal and would be in the best interests of the club, and bearing in mind that first and foremost we go angling to CATCH A FEED OF FISH!!

This club operates on a "first-in" system and unpleasantness may arise if members "crash" in unfairly to the disadvantage of all.

If you are unsure of the written rules of angling under which our club operates, consult your etiquette book. If you attempt to do the correct thing you will probably be invited to fish that hole or that piece of reef, or at least be told where similar good country is.

Whatever happens, don't be a shark; somebody may gaff you!

It was moved and passed that Roy Lundy chair the meeting and that Jim Strong act as secretary and take notes.

The first item discussed was to set the dates for the casting competitions for the coming year, and it was decided that subject to the availability of suitable venues, that the following dates be recommended to the $\Lambda.\Lambda.\Lambda.$ of W.A. as the dates for the years casting dates.

Sunday the 28th. of April to be held at a local venue.

Sunday the 28th. of July to be held at a local venue.

Sunday the 24th. of November to be held at Albanv if possible.

It was decided that, subject to the A.A.A. of W.A. meeting's approval, the Albany Casting Venue would be considered the State Championship, With the other two venues giving members of the clubs and the clubs to compete and gain experience through competition.

The competition to be open to all affiliated members, with the clubs being asked to field teams also, where practicable.

All sinkers, tapes or identification markers will be supplied along with Dowels for the bait casting. Casters are to supply own 3 way swivels for the Bait Casting Event. All weights etc. will be broken off as they are marked at the end of each cast.
