Twenty two members and three juniors took part in the casting and although the weather vas threatening we were once again lucky enough to complete the days events with only one very light shower. Bob Tichbon with a mighty cast of 380ft. cast the longest distance with Bob Jensen right on his heels with 378ft. and Bob Lilly and John Bellman next with 370ft. Bob Tichbon scored the most points in this event with a score of 334 - 140 - 474. Ian McLennan was second with 291 - 180 - 471 and Keith Mulvay was third with 323 - 145 - 468.

In the Double Handed Accuracy we again saw Bob Tichbon in front but this time Allan Bunnett was right up there with him, both scoring an excellent 52/80 with Bob Lilly next with 43/80. Six members scored with all four casts. Jack Harvey and Allan Bunnett scored near misses.

The Single Handed Accuracy saw Bertie Payne with 22/40 Just holding off Bob Lilly, Bob Tucker and Noel Knight all with 21/40 and Hal Neil right up there too with 20/40. Five members scored with all four casts and we had three bulls-eyes - Bob Jensen, Jim Strong and Allan Livesey. FIELD DAY YALLINGUP - 2ND & 3RD JUNE, 1963.

Weather conditions: Westerly winds, with a heavy ground swell pounding all the beaches, though generally the weather was kind to us. Even though the forecast looked grim, 38 members, 7 junior members plus 10 visitors made an excellent attendance of 55. The total weight of 775lbs. of scaled fish was sure a great tally and to all members attending I send my congratulations on a grand effort. Taking into account the fish caught previous to the Field Day I am certain the total would have reached 1,000lbs. In all a total of 57 Salmon plus at least another 16 or so, caught before 2.00 on Sunday. Even Berty Payne was amazed at the bags of Salmon! Arthur Backhouse made the headlines with his fine capture of a 61b. Skipjack and then later on Sunday he landed another weighing 42lbs. This of course took off a section in the Field Day Competition.

The areas the lads fished ranged far and wide, Eagle Bay around to Canal Rocks. It was Canal Rocks where most of the members caught Salmon, including Ron Shirley, Ron Kildahl, Terry De Jussing, Ian Brown, Keith Mulvay, Terry Fuller, Horry Muirson, Doug Savage and Bill Utting. Other parties, Andy Mulgrave, Bob Lilly, Bob Tucker, Ian McLennan and Ted Savage fished at Smiths Beach area and all returned good bags. Alf Autland, Phil Evans plus Arthur Backhouse and Archie Tickle visited the area near Eagle Bay. Snow Tate and Hugh Gregory returned some excellent Skipies. Doug Newton, Lofty Griffiths plus the lads Bill and Bob Newton fished at Yallingup Beach where conditions were very difficult - Norm Clark visited this area and reported conditions almost impossible; the long swell alus the heavy weed was far too much to cope with. Noel Knight na Noel Wilkerson went further south and both returned some mice Skipjacks. Ken Wiggins and G. Robinson both weighed in a Calmon apiece. Ken Hunt and Rick Jensen had a mighty tussle with Ken just finishing in front. These two lads put up a mighty performance and between them thir bags then weighed 5421bs. and they have the congratulations of all members on their angling ability and a credit to the coaching of their Dad's.

The scene at Canal Rocks was quite amazing with over 60 cars from all over the South-West. The anglers were everywhere

busy catching Herring or Salmon. On the rocks one had to take turns at casting and then step down so the next person could cast. This is where casting accuracy counts and it sure pays off when casting from some of the difficult positions.

I did hear that at the Channel area where the Salmon were moving through the anglers were shoulder to shoulder and of course a certain amount of confusion was always on as the Salmon raced madly round trying to escape from the lines. Norm Clark and I visited this area and when Norm heard the Salmon were on he decided to tackle them, though my uncle and I decided on the Herring which were on the bite. However, the casting position had an element of uncertainty and what with anglers from opposite rocks tangling up blobs etc., at one time our blobs were taken over to the wrong rocks and then broken off. Phil Neri and young Garry Davidson were having a ball and landed many Herring. Norm Clark had several strikes but unfortunately lost his Salmon, maybe striking too soon or too much justling by other anglers. This was the area where Terry De Jussing had a grand time and he and his mate were constantly in action. Near the parking area one old timer from Collie showed us his Station Sedan, which by the way held 20 odd Salmon. I heard later he was using a 471b. line and just heaving the Salmon through all opposition from other anglers whose lines got in the way.

The camp area looked like a busy suburb, where many members hurried back and forth between fishing and eating and very little sleeping. I noticed Keith Martin and his wife moving off in search of a likely spot on the coast. There was so much going on I just couldn't cope with it all. The weigh-in was a beauty, never looked like ending and when Norm and I had weighed nearly 400lbs. the night before, we thought we had the bulk of it done. However, the lads journeyed off in the morning and came back with another 300lb. of fish and off we went again.

Arthur Backhouse was busy taking photoes and our many thanks Arthur - they will be developed this week and placed in the Club album. The position of the blackboard was constantly changing as the fish were weighed in. All in all, the lads on this venue had a whale of a time and my heartiest congratulations to Award winners.

The standard of angling was very high indeed, the comradeship

had to be seen to be believed and the club spirit was never higher.

On Sunday evening several of the members paid a visit to the "master" Berty Payne where we found Mrs. Pearl Payne busy preparing for the day's fishing ahead. Later on Monday I heard Berty was taken ill and spent several hours confined to his bed, though later he arose and caught several pounds of Herring.

My many thanks to all the members who assisted me on the Venue, especially Norm Clark and not forgetting Bob Tichbon who took our party inside his caravanette and made us all very welcome.

My Uncle Len summed it up by saying "It was a pleasure to associate with such a great gang of skillful anglers, whose enthusiasm knows no bounds".

Mrs. Dot Jensen and Mrs. Clugston called by Monday morning and saw
the weigh-in and I'm sure they were pleased with their lads efforts.

KOLOS S. INDIA

Shooting Fish with a .22 Rifle.

Archie was born in the Forrest of Southern India, the son of a District Forrest Officer, and from an early age was taught the trick of hunting and fishing, and through him I also learnt the art of native fishing and how to catch and shoot fish. The English man does not know these methods unless shown and taught by someone who knows how. So on this bright sunny morning we adjourned to the village of Kolos and our shakire Asis Khan had already the night previous gone to the village to make the arrangements for divers. These are sons of the fishermen and their ages are between 10 and 12 years and these boys live in the water of the Nizam dam and swim like fish, can stay under water for 3 to 4 minutes at a time and go cown to the bottom of the dam which is 40 to 60 feet in depth.

On arriving at the village we met Asis Khan and four boys with smiles all over their faces, they were very happy to earn a couple of pence for their work, which would feed the whole family. For the mornings work they would receive 8 annas each that is 8d. in English money, which was good money in those days. We left the village and made our way to the Dam. The wall of the dam is about 12 to 18 feet above water level and we sit on this wall with a native boy each side of us, our legs dangling over the edge, facing the water. Now at 12 o'clock Noon as the sun is directly over head. The big Rhowe fish swims fast under the surface of the water. These young boys can pick them out long before you can and they point in the direction as the fish comes swimming along, their eyesight is like a hawk, they seem to see under the water. Now we use a powerful .22 Rifle - I had a Savage, 5 round mag. open sights. You aline your sight on the tip of the fishes nose and follow along with him and listen to the boy while he tells you when he is going to rise and the fish comes right to the top of the surface and in a split second pokes his nose out of the water and seems to blow a bubble. It is at that instance you must fire as he is under the surface and your shot will ricochet off the water and you miss him.

The native boys sitting by your side tell you while you have one eye closed, and the sight is alined on his nose he says he is coming up - he is coming up and you are steady squeezing the trigger and he knows just when he is going to poke his nose up and he says "Marro" which in Indu means hit him - you fire on his word, because you cannot tell if the fish is still under as his nose is out only for that split second - it's just up and down before you can say Bob's your Uncle. Now the two boys sitting beside you know if the fish has been hit between the eyes and as it sinks to the bottom of the dam and lays there, both boys have dived into the water and are on their way down to the bottom and a couple of minutes later up they come to the surface holding up this beautiful 30 to 40lbs. Silver Fish and shouting "Shabash" wich means 'Well done!

One generally gets 5 to 6 during the period the sun is directly overhead because that is the only time they come to the surface and blow bubbles. The boys say they blow wind out of the gills to remove any slush or mud they have have but this is the only fish that does this and I have never been able to find out why at noon only.
