PRESIDENT'S REPORT

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DRYCASTING - 7TH JUNE, 1964

Even with these conditions 25 seniors and 3 juniors came along to participate among them being Noel Knight (senior and junior). Although Noel senior had a broken arm he still had a go - which shows how keen he is.

Ken Jones sent down the longest cast of 375ft. followed by Bill Bridger 370ft. and Alan Bunnett 36lft. Ken eventually won the L.L. Distance with 351 - 138 - 489, second was Arthur Horton (who had to be dragged out of bed) with 294 - 180 - 474 and Bert Payne casting well 291 - 177 - 468 third.

WCG FARMING.

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The humble wog has become the most widely used bait by the nerring fisherman. Other fish that will take wogs are whiting, skipjack, silver bream and garfish.

Some people think that using such a bait is unhygienic, but prepared in the right way wogs are as clean as any other bait.

Methods of breeding vary but the following method should be found quite suitable.

First, you will need several fish heads, a quantity of newspaper, (44 gallon drum and a sugar bag.

Begin by putting two or three heads out to be blown, taking care that the neighbour's cat doesn't get down on them.

Inspect from time to time, and when you have three or four good strikes you are ready to go into the business, making sure you don't have too big a strike, as this means you will have small size wogs instead of big ones.

There are two types of blowflies that will give good results. The large brown fellow lays eggs alive, while the green one lays dormant eggs.

Cnce you have a strike, proceed by mixing quite a number of heads with those already blown, and wrap the lot in about 10 or so thicknesses of newspaper. Place them in the sugar bag and put them under the 44 gallon drum. Leave for four days, or longer depending on the weather. The hotter it is the quicker they will grow.

When you are satisfied that they have been down long enough, remove the layers of newspaper, and you will find the wogs have left the fish. Simply pour them from the paper into a gallon tin half filled with clean pollard. Leave in the pollard for a full 24 hours.

Sieve them out of the first lot of pollard and place them in a fresh lot for another day. Sieve again and, using old polish jars with screw tops, and half filled with clean pollard, place them on the bottom shelf of the refrigerator, taking care they do not get damp.

It is a good idea to put the jars in a paper bag or, better still wrap the jar in a piece of clean sugar bag.

Inspect the jars every week or so and change the pollard. Lone this way your wogs are always clean, will not smell, and will last for many months.

For convenience when fishing, place the wogs in small plastic containers. Jars have a habit of breaking on rocks. Lon't waste the old pollard - save it up for the berley bucket. REEL TALK Page Nos. 12 & 13

Norrie Cross' letter continued:-

Puttering back to base after dark, laden to the gunwhales with barramundi, Cherry croc-spotted for me. After two aborted runs when the crocs sank too soon, I blasted a 10-footer, but he rolled into deep water before we could retrieve him. This put Cherry well ahead in the game of oneupmanship played by the children!

Although Marge had brought rations for an Army, we gorged on barramundi and Burdekin ducks wrapped in alfoil and cooked in un earth-oven. Ice was no problem since we had four thermite iceboxes between us. Each evening we laid the dust with a couple of small bottles of Swan apiece, then as the kids lay in their bunks and the fire blazed high, I percecuted them all with my chromatic mouse-organ with selections such as Serenade, Die Waldteufel, Au clair de lune, and a few of my other outdated favourties. When everyone else was asleep I a t near the fire picking the meat out of the boiled head of a 121bs. catfish, to extract the very ornate crucifix bone for Cherry.

Next day, Anita and Peter conned me into climbing Mt. Bundy with them. This took us well over an hour, but the view and the photography was well worth it. To commemorate Anita's tenth birthday I carved her initials in the highest tree at the summit, and then, to preserve the peace I had to carve Peter's as well. In a billabong near our camp, even at this distance, we thought we could see a croc surfacing occasionally. That night, Pancho, Dick and myself investigated. Although we spotted no croc we found belly slides 18 inches wide and large handprints.

All good things must come to an end. Although I could bore you for hours with other incidents which occurred on this trip I'll highlight only our return trip through the quagmire. Pancho went first, so that he would be in a strategic towing position if the laden Toyota went down again. Oh, the irony! The Landrover lurched to a heeled-over, shuddering halt in the very portion of the bog which had spelled my doom on the inwards trip! Not being game to try and pass on the track I explored on foot through the bush and declared it firm enough to take the unladen Toyota, minus the trailer. Using an oblique pull, with Pancho's arc-mesh strips under my wheels, he rose out of there like Lazarus, and I didn't stop

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going until we were well clear on the homewards side. A funny sequel was that, announcing that I would return via the bush to pick up the trailer and come back that way also, I charged into the quagmire intending to swing out of the ruts and into the bush. To my horror, (and to everyone elses consternation, the vehicle refused to leave the ruts and it was a case of Sydney or the bush! Luckily I was in low-ratio and I fed it all the power the motor had - and this time it didn't even look like stopping. Coming back, the trailor sank to its axles when it broke through the crust in the bush, but everyone manhandled it out of the hole and I charged off again and safely made terra firma. After this we broached the last of the Swan and ruefully inspected our mud-plastered vehicles. This liquid version of bulldust dries into a white, cement-like substance which, a week later and after many washings, I'm still trying to remove from my shiny new paintwork!

We made good time back to the nearest oasis, the Noonamah store - no doubt thinking of the coldies under the counter. Here we divided the barramundi fillets and the last I saw of Pancho was when I bored past him at 65 with more than an inch of pedal left. This, of course, was only done to impress, as I'm trying to sell Pancho on a Land Cruiser.

Before closing, a word about a trip I made on the Zena down to the Perron Isles a few weeks ago. Drifting for one full day we put down about 13001bs. of fish, mainly grey and red emperor, with a bit of variety, and the occasional head clean-bitten of by sharks. Trolling wasn't very successful, although a couple of chaps knocked off mackeral and tuna. I was busy with the colour camera, photographing specimens of each type of fish before their colours faded. The best gear I found for this type of fishing "as my stocky "barramundi" rod, Tatler reel, 391bs. line and an English paternoster rig which is really only a sophisticated version of the Filipino spreader rig used by most Territorians. Y best fish would have been Golden Snapper around 151bs., and I saw some excellent Coral Trout also.

In the next few weeks we hope to head for Jim Jim on the South Alligator River, where I had some fabulous barramundi last year. My abition, later in the Iry, is to try and get through to the newly discovered 700 foot Falls. Water resources colicopter crews say that the lagoon at the base of the Falls

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is teeming with barras, and that the Johnston crocs are so tame they had to step over them! The hazards connected with this venture are mainly its isolation and lack of trail. Also petrol supplies are a problem, since the last refuelling point is back on Stuart Highway 100 miles westwards, and the Falls are a further 60 miles through shattered rock country where I'll be lucky to get 10 miles to the gallon. I have Army survey maps of the area, but I won't attempt it without letting all concerned know my intentions and times.

Congrats to old Noisy for knocking off my pot! Seriously I'm mensely pleased to see such a mighty caster win the trophy, and what makes it even more worthy is the fact that Noel has battled on with one of the biggest handicaps. Good on yer, Digger!

Since it's way past midnight I'll sign off now, Best wishes to all my friends and clubmates - wish that Marge and I could attend the Annual Ball.

Until my next trip, back into the cupboard with the typewriter!
