### SURVIVAL by Basil Marsh:

The frequency of private trips by club members and the distances being travelled has increased dramatically over the past three years, some of the areas visited have been rather isolated. The possibility of a serious problem in the form of a vehicle breakdown or an accident causing injury is always a possibility, yet not a great deal of thought is given to this aspect in the planning of a trip. If the party consists of a reasonable number of persons, then the problems may not be so difficult to deal with, but when there are only one or two persons involved then the situation could be serious or even disasterous.

These notes will be directed towards a one or two person situation, but they could also of course apply to a larger group in the event of a major difficulty.

Survival commences before you even leave home to go away on a trip. During the planning stage of an extended trip particularly north of Perth, careful survival planning should be considered equally as much as the timings and location of the trip, fishing gear and bait. The following points should be practiced, prepared or arranged.

- . Vehicle spares, tool kit, spark plugs, distributor points, crank handle, two spare wheels, petrol and oil in containers, tow rope, pump, puncture outfit and tyre levers, spare engine hoses, fan belt, car jack, wheel brace, strong rope.
- . Emergency food rations, water, first aid kit, water purification tablets, plastic sheet.
- . Details in writing left at home of the anticipated day by day locations and events for the entire trip. Do not just wave goodbye and tell those at home to expect you when they see you.
- . Have the vehicle completely checked and serviced. Have a practice at home changing a wheel if you have had little practice during the past year. If you are towing a trailer, have the shackles, springs and wheel bearings checked and serviced. Trailers generally receive less attention and servicing than the towing vehicle.
- . Check all your camping equipment, especially gas stoves and lights. Replace nipples, jets, valves, hoses and gaskets where necessary. Have the gas bottle tested if you find any evidence of corrosion by salt.

If the final camping location is more than four hundred miles away, give thought to stopping somewhere along the way for five or six hours for a proper meal and a sleep. This will lessen the probability of the final stages being an endurance test caused by fatigue, the final twenty miles on average are generally the roughest as far as driving conditions are concerned.

### SURVIVAL cont'd:

At the last town before the final stretch, call into the police station and advise the local constable where you are headed, your anticipated time there and tell him you will check in with him on the way back. If something goes wrong and you fail to return, emergency services will not have to waste valuable time and effort in locating you thus possibly saving your life if something serious has gone wrong. This point may seem silly and unecessary but every year in West Australia several people die in isolated areas because they failed to take this very simple precaution.

You have arrived and set up camp at the chosen spot. This is the time when you should carry out a methodical check of the vehicle and do any servicing of repairs necessary. Check and have ready in a convenient place your survival gear. Have a discussion and agree on a course of action in the event of an emergency such as:

- . Fire
- . Physical injury or illness
  - . One or both persons becoming lost
    - . Vehicle breakdown

If you carry out the points mentioned so far you will have reduced considerably the risks and increased your ability to overcome problems which may occur. Naturally we always hope that nothing will go wrong-but you never know.
