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
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CLUB ETIQUETTE

However, only under very exceptional circumstances will failure to attend weigh-ins not be penalized with the loss of points acquired during that field day.

It is the Field Day Officer's duty to inform the committee of any anglers who fail to attend the weigh-in. It is the committees duty to decide what action is to be taken.

Disputes may be taken to the committee.

Entries for Game Fish hadge, Club Records and Open Fishing Competitions must be lodged with the recorder within 30 days of capture.



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STEEP POINT SAFARI "89"

Mid June 88. Dusk was falling as we traversed the causeway across Useless Inlet, Carrarang St.

Well the end of yet another long awaited week of fishing and quite an adventure and memorable one at that. Sitting out a cyclone within 24 hours of arrival - repitching camp and fishing again within 8 hours - introduction to ballooning, only to see a mako rise, take the bait, cork screw, and shred 1201b wire as though it was cotton - playing a shark for two hours and losing him - the Gibbon Hole, whih left me stunned, how do we fish that? - well I was shown the result ... we had a good bag of fish.

With a last look back we climbed into the Toyotas to face the trek back to Perth - "somehow, sometime, I just had to visit this fishes' kingdom again".

January '89, and I guess my mates had felt exactly my stated sentiments, for we had set a date for May three ... vehicles, ten bodies, all eager to tax our fishing abilities at the most westerly point of Australia.

It wasn't till april that we got together. Some serious programming had to be worked out. Bodies had been reduced to six in two vehicles. Date and time were set and each had a list of gear we would be responsible for.

May 11th 8.30 p.m. two Toyotas packed and ready to go (what we hadn't got we would do without). Two other parties were to join us on route. Greenie would meet us at The Overlander, Mal Thompson would pick us up on route.

It was 5.00 a.m. as we pulled into The Overlander, stiff eyes, a little sore. George and I had driven alternately 100 klm stints dozing in between shifts in back of wagon. This worked well, Heath working as co-pilot navigator. Greenie was waiting for us, and as we ate breakfast Thomo drove in.

At 6,30 a.m. we left for Steep and after a soft sand problem leaving the Causeway we arrived at the point 10.30 a.m. by 12.00 Mal White's rod hit the water. George was snoring in his tent, the rest of us tackle-sorting in anticipation of a ripper fishing week.

George started the ball rolling with a superb Sampson. Heath, not to be outdone, followed suit ... not as big as dad's but enough to give him his game fish badge. Snapper and bait size snook were then the order for the rest of the evening.

Saturday became a day of rest, wind blowing in wrong direction not much doing spinning. Opportunity to catch up with some sleep. Mal White livened us up with a Snapper or two from the front, the rest of us joined him. Snapper and Snook were on again.

Sunday weather brighter but cloudy, wind blowing N.E. so decided to make for the Gibbon Hole. Water very white and foamy but didn't

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stop us from landing a good bag of mixed fish: - Baldchin, Snapper, Sweet Lips. Evening fishing brought a few Snapper.

Monday was the Holmans and Greenie and Thomo's crew depart for the Gibbon Hole while the rest of us fished the front. Spinning was dead, and it wasn't until 11 a.m. that the wind turned to S.W. Balloons were put out, waiting game begins...

I had two good hookups: First played for 45 minutes but managed to loop the line around handle of reel - result bust off. Second strike, held for 15 minutes (thought I was winning) but fish thought differently. He went deep around Nigger Head on front - result: Second classic stitch up.

Mal Head meanwhile had missed two, due to absence from rod vicinity first time, and failure to get there in time the second. He was spiting fire balls!!

The mob then arrived back from the Gibbon boasting of three full sacks of Snapper-Balchin-Trevally and Sweet Lip. Heath promptly set a balloon then leaves it set up. Dam me, within ten minures he had a strike and lands a nice Mackeral. His joyous boasting, as you can guess, was swallowed like a stick of dynamite by Mal and myself, especially as Mal lost two good hookups later that night!

Tuesday, saw the departure of Greenie and Thomo. Rick and Mal White stayed in camp, the rest of us hit the Gibbon. I got a good hookup, the Holman Combo gaffed him, a 22kg shark, which made the adrenalin pump through the system. George landed a nice Blue Bone Groper fullfilling an order given by my misses before we left. Heath gained a couple of Snapper, as did Mal Head. We came back to camp to a well cooked dinner prepared by our resident cook Rick, who constantly kept us stocked up with first class tucker. After I had pushed the bottle around not much fishing was thought of for the rest of the day!!

Wednesday, dawn broke on a very dreary morning, damp after rain that night, no wind and cloudy. Later wind got up but was an easterly ... no good for ballooning. Fishing activity looked pretty well no go.

Except for, of course you guessed it, the ever persistant George. He had armed himself with spinning gear and balloon and trundled off on his own to the furthest tip of the Point. In this position he managed to get a balloon out about 200 metres N.W. from the ledge. Around 10.30 off she went, and within 20 min a bonza Sailfish 2.6 metres nose to tail was gaffed up on the ledge. To you experienced fishermen a hundred questions come to mind. Well on examination of this classical creature it was found that a shark had taken a hefty chunk out of his tail end. at least 4 or 5 klg worth.

My first sight of this magnificent creature was him tail skipping over the water for a distance of at least 30 metres around 50 metres out N.W. of point. Heath. Mal and another fellow were there with a running and pole gaff. Apparently there were about five or six sharks after the sailies' tail. George was winding like fury ... there would only be one chance, line was grabbed. Heath locked gaff is, and let it run (well timed), head was ingulfed, they both pulled like hell, pole gaff went home as she left the water.

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Six to eight now bloodey furious Mako Sharks tore around in circles at a complete loss as to where their brekky had disappeared to, and why four unshaven, cheesey grinning, individuals were hopping around hugging and covorting like idiots above them.

George, although elated, felt disappointment. The fish had been bitten half an hour hook up. The poor critter must have gone through hell in the last minutes of its life.

The first Sail I had seen of truly fantastic size and design, made to roam and lord these waters. It personified for me the land, waters, and mystique of the whole area.

What more was left for Wednesday? We moved to the Gibbon Hole after lunch, Heath landed a fine Spaniard, to complement dad's Sail. I lost a good hookup due to faulty knot tying. Mal White scored two great Trevelly and two Snapper. Mal Head persistantly gave them heaps but just couldn't stop their tearaway runs, and so seemed to vent his frustration by casting 4 ozs lumps of lead down the Gibbon's throat. He was heard to mumble "If I can't hook the 'Bs' I'll give 'em lead poisoning!!". He did come to the fore that night with two fine Snapper. Rick too showed us he's a mean fisherman matching Mal's two Snapper!

Thursday, no wind again, back to the hole. Heath landed a beaut Trevelly, George Blue Bone and Snapper, Malcolm two Snapper. I excelled myself - a Trevelly - gaffed again by the son and dad team. He tipped the scales just over 6 kgm to give me the long awaited opportunity to claim that elusive Game Fish Badge! Malcolm now had full stage but no luck. We didn't fish at night. and early morning was planned so we all hit the sack.

Friday, early start, fished till noon. Heath and I captured three nice Blue Bone each. George stuck to spinning, but no go. Our Malcolm, well two good runs, but just no luck whatsoever. Malcolm "me old mate", I do sympathise. It's taken me four trips, but It's sure a great feeling when it comes off!!

All hell breaks loose, now back to camp. Rick and Mal had brunch ready for us. By 3.30 p.m. we had struck camp, packed and were ready to leave for home.

Dusk again, pumping up tyres at the causeway, a Sail hit the surface three times with a tail dance that was the greatest finale Garrarang Station could have laid on for anyone. What more can be said? A great week's fishing with a good bunch of guys, in an area of God's own country.





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EXMOUTH - THE WAY TO GO

On May 22nd, Jim Strong, Bill Utting and Baz March hooked up the Cabana Caravan to the L300 wagon and set off on our third annual trip to Exmouth. Again we staged the travel over three easy stages of daytime travel - Northampton, Carnarvon and Exmouth. Rain followed us all the way and the first night at Northampton showed that staying in the relatively new council overnight park is not the place to stay when it is raining.

Thenight after our arrival at Exmouth it rained for the first time in nearly a year - almost 50mm being recorded. A messy place with red mud for a couple of days until it dried out, but from then on until the end of our stay the weather was clear and warm to hot with the winds moving right around the compass during that time.

We were a month early for the bream and whiting run, although Bill and Jim caught just over two dozen plump whiting on the last day. All our old spots were fished successfully plus a number of new locations.

By chance a conversation with a young couple on the Bundegi Beach got us on to the U.S. Navy jetty for three fishing sessions. The young man was a rigger at the U.S. Base and he took us to the security office for the necessary pass papers. Fishing the jetty was guite good and an experience, especially when lifting reasonable sized fish 20 feet up on a 121b line and herring rod. One sight not to be forgotten was to see, in the glow of the jetty floodlights, hundreds of very large Buffaloe Bream in the water around the jetty. Among them were many Long Toms and several big Trevally, which unfortunately, would not touch a baited hook.

Our best big fish spot was at Turtle Beach. Bill's line became tangled on a small turtle and a humourous tussle took place until the line came free. The turtle could not understand why it was paddling furiously out to sea but was travelling backwards. At this spot we caught a number of Golden Trevally up to 4.25 kilos, plus a number of Swallowtail Dart - some of a very good size.

Even after a number of very good fish meals, we were still able to nearly fill the 39 litre Engel freezer with fish fillets to bring home.

Basil took his photo album filled with wartime photos of Exmouth. This resulted in:

- Tape recorded interview with the editor of the local newspaper.
- Headmaster of Exmouth school borrowing the album and his senior students enlarging and reprinting many of the photos.
- A conducted tour over the Solar Observatory (which is located next to the wartime R.A.A.F. base) and an American Air Force sergeant borrowing the photo album to add information to his project on wartime activities in the area.

The trip home was quite an experience.

We left the caravan park early morning to a fanfare of cheers and waves and in pouring rain. Less than an hour later we sneaked back into the park as quietly as possible.

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
Many of the floodways were covered in water, some deep water and others quite turbulent. Twenty four hours later after making a number of enquiries, we decided to try again. We made it to Minilya Roadhouse with only two flooded sections to be successfully crossed. Information at the roadhouse indicated 2 kilometres of deep flooding at Bannabiddy Creek. After 2 hours waiting and seeing road trains that had come through, and other vehicles that had got rather wet coming through, we decided that we had to see for ourselves.

There was word that a truck and trailer were carrying vehicles through the flooded section at the rate of \$20 per vehicle. After fording two fairly long flooded sections we came upon a line of about 15 vehicles. We joined in the queue for a lift on what turned out to be a Toyota Hilux ute loaded with rocks for ballast towing two Robinson Heath type trailers. After a four hour wait we were loaded up and into the flood. We felt like Humphrey Bogart and the African Queen gurgling along through the Amazon. On the south side of the flooded section, to our amazement, were 100 plus vehicles and caravans waiting to get through.

Apart from a couple more flooded sections before reaching Carnarvon the remainder of the safe steady trip home was placid.

The trip was very enjoyable and I am now starting planning for a return trip next year.

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MEDIA STATEMENT

MINISTER FOR FISHERIES

June 3, 1989

Amateur fisherman will be limited to catching 15 octopus, suqid or cuttlefish per day under new guidelines to protect the species (cephalopods), Fisheries Minister Gordon Hill announced today.

Mr Hill said people planning to go fishing over the long weekend would be well advised to stay within the limit and catch only what they needed for their own consumption or for bait.

He said a combined bag limit of 30 cephalopods would apply to boats.

"While most recreational fisherman take only a small catch, there are those who have taken advantage of the lack of controls," he said.

"Some individuals have been catching large quantities of cepalopods for illegal sale."

"Like all marine species, cephalopods are a finite resource and must be protected from excessive fishing pressure."

Mr Hill said Cockburn Sound and Warnbro Sound were particular problem areas.

He warned that fisheries officers would be on patrol this weekend throughout Western Australia and anyone who failed to observe gazetted fisheries guidelines could face still penalties.
