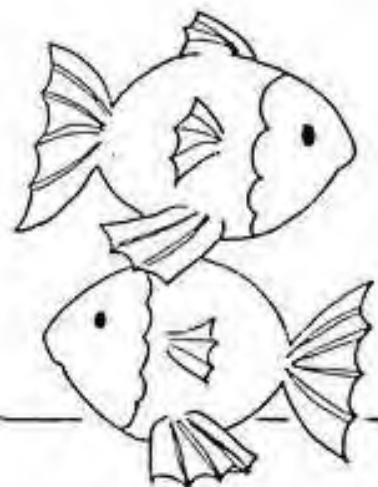

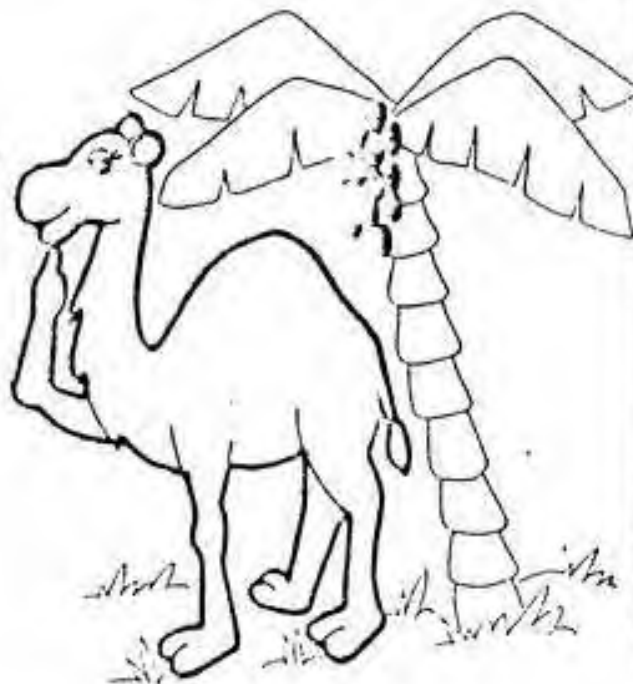

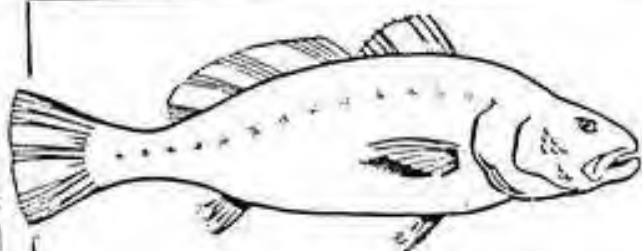

## KALBARRI FIELD-DAY

With the promise of fine weather Malcolm and Michael Head, Graham and his son Michael, my tribe and myself, left for Kalbarri on Friday afternoon for the long weekend field-day at Kalbarri. We had an uneventful trip and arrived at Kalbarri house at about 11.45am to find the house locked and no key. A quick trip over to Kalbarri Accomodation to get the key turned out to be fruitless as they were all in bed. Upon getting back to the house we were able to get entry by removing the glass from the laundry door. Once inside we quickly set up the beds and put the kids to bed. We then decided to have a couple of beers, this turned into quite a session finishing around 3.30am.

After a late breakfast on Saturday we decided that we would fish Wagoes Saturday night. The weather was as forecasted, sunny with light easterly winds. It was Brilliant! After picking up the key for the house we drove down to Red Bluff Beach to check it out. There was no swell and the surface was glass smooth. On the way back to the house we checked out the Blue Hole and it looked very fishy, but we stuck with our decision to fish Wagoes.

Straight after lunch we headed off to Wagoes, the new road through the National Park was in good condition and only took approx 20mins to get to the crack turn off. We drove straight down to the lagoon to have a look at this area, to find Tony DeLanzo and Filamena camped there. Wagoes was the same as Kalbarri, no swell to speak of. After a quick chat to Tony we moved back up the beach and set up to fish through the afternoon and evening. We fished from 2:30 pm till just after dark without so much as a bite. Just after sunset Michael Head was the first to get a mulloway on as soon as his bait hit the water, within about 15 minutes Michael Reesley was on! This turned into quite a comical experience when Graham went down to gaff it. His first claim was that it was a shark. The next was his sitting at the waters edge yelling the shark had latched onto his foot. I ran down to help him to find that Michael's Mulloway had swum between his feet and the trailing hooks had lodged in his foot. Just as I bent down to help him we were swamped by one of those large Wagoes swells, this in turn ripped the hooks out of Graham's foot and I was then able to gaff the fish. Brett was the next away and soon had his fish on the beach. We fished for several more hours for nil result. Kid's 3 fish, adult's zero!

Sunday morning was crisp, but fine with easterly winds, so instead of going to Wagoes we fished Red Bluff Beach. Weather conditions were perfect, but very little action in the fishing department. After about an hour, we were standing around the back of the vehicles, when young Scott decided it was time to start fishing. We watched him have a couple of casts only to wrestle with seaweed that was at the waters edge. On his third cast he yelled out He was on! We just looked at him and thought O'Yea more weed. But this weed seemed to be heading out to sea. I ran over to find that his reel was nearly empty of line. I explained to him to pump and wind to try and retrieve some line. This he did and soon he had half his line back on the reel. We walked down towards the Bluff's all the time gaining line. When the fish was out about 50metres we could see it on the surface. It appeared to be a small shark. I thought well this is it because he only had 40lb nylon leader. He played the fish like a pro and soon had it at the edge. Graham went down to gaff it and dragged out an Amberjack. When weighed this fish went 11.1kg on the scales. An excellent fish. Sunday night and Monday produced only one small soarie and a small rock cod to Michael Reesley. The weather was good and the company and accomodation in the club house was excellent. An enjoyable weekend was had by all.



WHAT STAR IS THAT?

Besides Jewie, Baldchin and Snapper, what are our best quality eating fish? In "Sea Fishes of Southern Australia", Barry Hutchins & Roger Swainston have given edibility ratings to the fish described in their book.

Southern Australia is considered to be the coastline stretching from Sydney on the east to Perth in the west. The fishes covered are those most likely to be caught or observed by recreational fishermen and divers around that coastline.

Ratings:\*\*\*\*\*=excellent eating; \*\*\*=good eating.

\*\*\*\* Four star fish : Silver, Mirror & John Dory, WA Jewfish, Pearl Perch, Sand & King George Whiting, Snapper, Spangled Emperor, Tripletail, Mangrove Jack, Tasmanian Trumpeter, Blackspot Pigfish, Baldchin Groper, Narrow-barred Spanish Mackerel, Black Sole.

\*\*\* Three star fish : Banded, Spotted & Western Wobbegong, Sharks, Elephant Fish, Sandy Sprat, Lancetfish, Beaked Salmon, Catfish (Striped, Estuary, White-lipped), Rock Ling, Garfish, Swallowtail, Snapper (Red, Yellow-eyed Red), Nannygai, Perch, Red Gurnard, Flathead, Harlequin Fish, Cods & Rockcod, Queensland Bass Groper, Hapuku, Eastern & Western Blue Devil, Fivebar Flagtail, Whiting (except Sand & King George), Pink Tilefish, Tailor, Cobia, Slender Suckerfish, Trevally (Golden, Silver & Sand), Common Dolphinfish, Bream (Yellowfin & Black), Tarwhine, Mulloway, Teraglin, Goatfish, Bluefish, Luderick, Eastern Rock Blackfish, Sweep (Sea & Silver), Boarfish, Maggie Perch, Morwong (Red, Banded, Blue & Queen), Jackass Fish, Trumpeter (Bastard, Real Bastard) Mullet, Snook, Eastern & Western Blue Groper, Eastern & Western Foxfish, Wrasse (Hump-headed, Five-banded & Thick-lipped, Green-finned & Blue-barred Orange Parrotfish, Stargazer, Gemfish, Largehead Hairtail, Southern Frostfish, Deepsea & Spotted Trevalla, Warehou, Australian Spotted Mackerel, Wahoo, Albacore, Tuna (Yellowfin, Southern Bluefin), Swordfish, Marlin, Black Spinefoot, Flounder, Sole (except Black), Leatherjacket.

So next time you meet a Bastard or Real Bastard, remember they only rate three stars, not four.

Since I began taxidermy I have had many fine specimens brought to be mounted often in condition better suited for the "Barby".

Most accidental damage can be repaired, though a fresh specimen in perfect condition has greater chance of ending up a trophy you can be proud of with less cost to you for the extra time spent on repairs.

Some of the ways you can keep your catch in good condition are:

Fish that you are intending to have mounted need careful gaffing, if unavoidable, then restricting from leaping around (losing scales and splitting fins) by wrapping in wet bags or a tarpaulin. Remember when removing from hea-san etc, that scales and fins are "one way traffic" and can be damaged. Good quality photos and close ups taken while your fish is ALIVE are invaluable to me when repainting your trophy.

Minimize handling (especially spreading the fins) and keep cool, wet and out of the sun. Also avoid ropes, crushed ice, baskets etc. from denting unpadding flesh.

Prior to freezing carefully fold fins in close to the body then (depending on size) wrap your fish in wet cotton wool or cloth (if possible) then several layers of Gladwrap, plastic or tarpaulin to prevent "Freezer Burn".

Crabs and Croys are wrapped in similar fashion with any detached legs or feelers and any "spare parts" from similar specimens included in the package.

Birds and Mammals need any wounds, mouth and vent plugging with cotton wool or tissue to prevent stains from leakage.

Handle birds only by legs or beak and lay out straight. Wrap in tissue or newspaper then several layers of plastic.

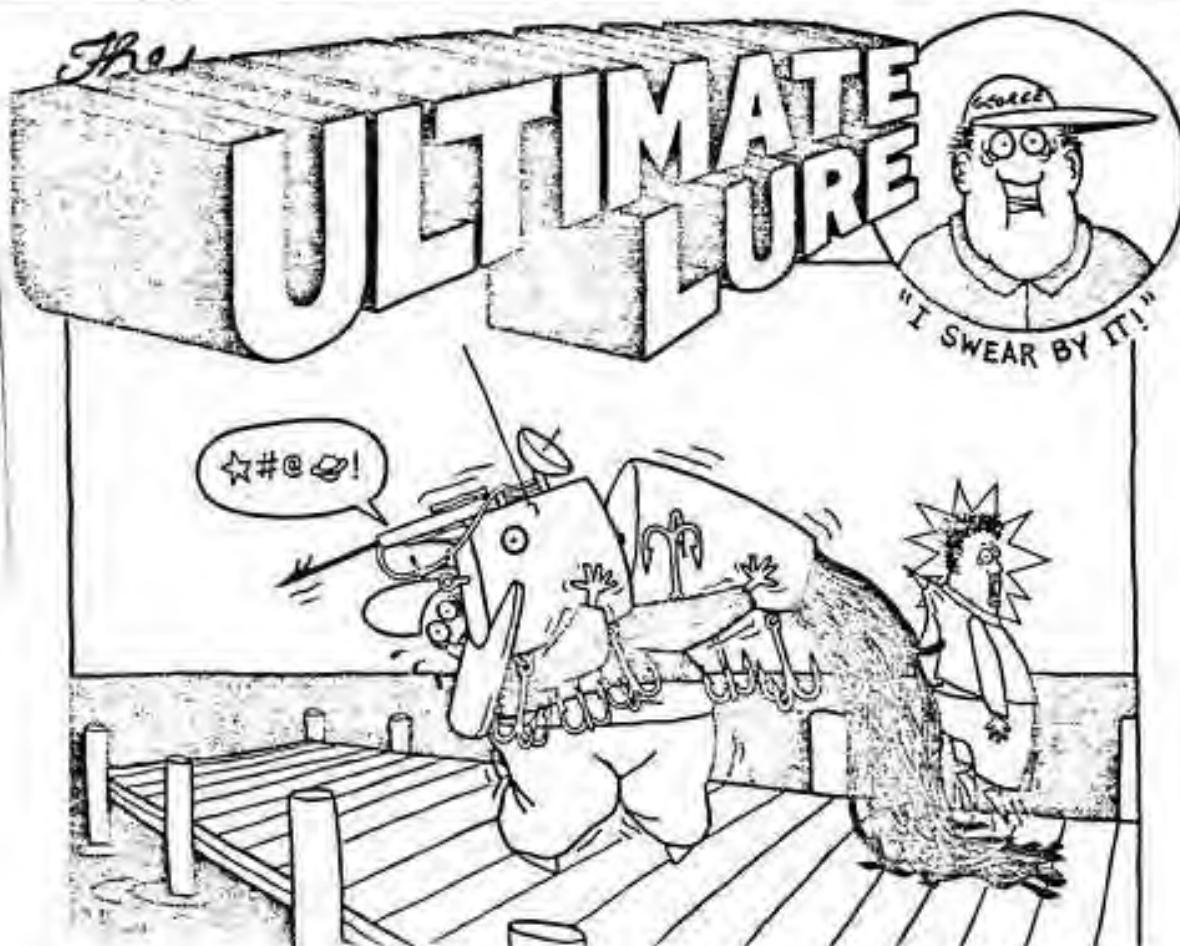
Mammals need tails and legs folding against the body before wrapping. PHENOL, a very potent poison and bacterial agent, can be injected into any slightly Stale birds or mammals (but not fish or crustaceans) or fresh birds or mammals when immediate freezing isn't available.

Inject diluted phenol into the crop, gut and brain of birds and brain gut and under the skin, especially around the face, tail and feet of mammals. Only use a small quantity so not to overstretch the skin.

**1. GROUP BAG LIMIT:** A total of ten per day of any combination of these species.



**2. ACCUMULATED BAG LIMIT:** If while fishing you live for several days continuously on a boat you may accumulate the bag limits for those species. Bag limit = no days aboard a daily bag limit.



**3. LICENCE REQUIRED:** You must have a recreational fishing licence if you wish to catch these species available from the Fisheries Department.



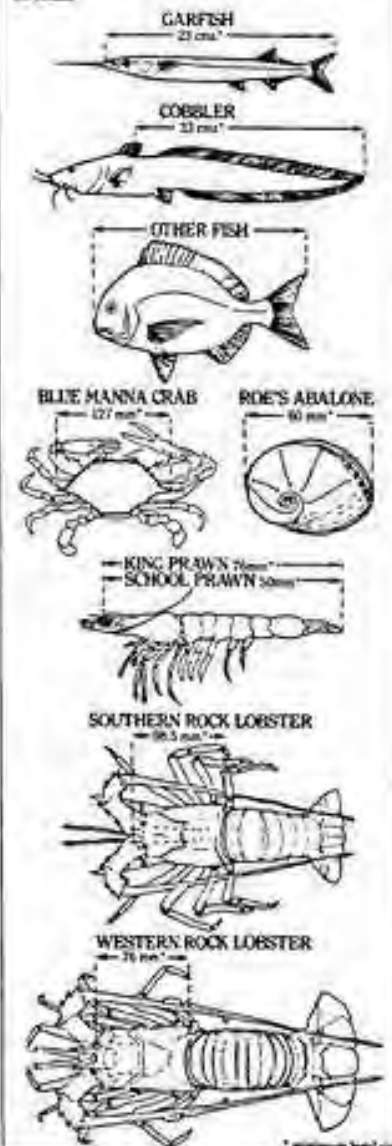
**4. CLOSED SEASONS:** A closed season may apply to these species. Dates sometimes vary from year to year. Watch the press for details, or contact the Fisheries Department.

### HOW TO MEASURE YOUR FISH

Use an accurate gauge and follow these diagrams. Put back the little ones for next season.

#### OPEN SEASONS

Rock Lobsters: 15 November to 30 June inclusive. The Abrolhos Islands open on 15 March.  
 Trout: 1 September to 30 April. Some waters are open all year.  
 Abalone: All year except in the metropolitan area.  
 The metropolitan season is usually opened between November and mid-January, but this may change from year to year. Watch the newspapers or contact your nearest Fisheries Department office for advice.  
 Prawns: The Swan-Canning estuary is open from 1 November to 31 July. The Serpentine, Dandalup, Harvey, and Murray Rivers are closed from 1 May to a date between 1 November and 1 December which is decided each year. Watch the press or contact the Fisheries Department for details.



\* minimum legal size
