MAY FIELD DAY:

ROTTNEST ISLAND.

The 1970/71 competition year got away to a great start with its opening venue at Rottnest. A total poundage of $939\frac{1}{4}$ lb of fish were weighed in shared amongst 34 members, 2 juniors and 2 visitors.

The weather was perfect for this time of year, although a mild southerly in the evening would have increased the chances of good tailer, etc on the south side. The boat trip over and back, (due to the weather), was so pleasant that even HEW HOY YEW and "BASSO" BASKERVILLE didn't even reach their usual shade of green.

To start from the beginning: The "Panta Rae" left Barrack Street Jetty at 9 a.m. sharp (just ahead of the two passenger ferries) and upon arrival at East Street Jetty had to "stand off" while the ferries passengers got aboard. Then it was our turn and the gear and anglers were soon aboard. It is a pleasure to watch this loading and unloading now as the boys have got in down to a fine art; keep it up!

On arrival at Rottnest the gear was soon off-loaded and loaded onto the truck in order of the coloured tapes - Red for Ricey first, Green for Radar second, and White for The Caves and StricklandBay last.

The bus and truck then commenced the drive around the island. The Caves was the first stop and about a dozen starters set off for their various "holes" in this area. DOUG NEWTON, SHOW TATE, RON MANSFIELD & CO., alighted at their usual spot - Strickland Bay. Then to Radar and "LOFTY", "BASSO" and followers (including DAVE LATTO, who gave Rottnest a bash for the first time in quite awhile), set off to catch the big ones. Last stop - Ricey. The remainder, including JIM STRONG, HAL NEIL, PHIL NERI, RUDY LERCH, LES REID and others, decided to take the tip from the newspaper tipsters and catch a bundle of salmon.

This proved to be the case as the top bags came from Ricey per medium of Rudy Lerch $114\frac{1}{4}$ lb, Les Reid $112\frac{1}{4}$ lb, W. Utting $74\frac{3}{4}$ lb and young Paul Marsh beat them all with a bag of $117\frac{5}{4}$ lb and also caught the heaviest salmon, $9\frac{3}{4}$ lb. Others with good tallies from this area were R. Jensen 52lb, Hal Neil $29\frac{1}{2}$ lb (good effort Hal) and Ron Kildahl 20 lb.

Back at the Caves, Dennis Green (a new member) put up a good performance to catch a nice mixed bag of fish weighing $26\frac{1}{2}$ lb, George Holman had a 25 lb bag, Ron Scrivener $13\frac{3}{4}$ lb, Drew Shaw $7\frac{1}{2}$ lb, Keith Rundin 7 lb. Good to see the Slingsby father and son combination in attendance and although their tally was not large, I'm sure they enjoyed themselves. Skippy were the main fish caught in this area.

Strickland Bay produced some good bags of Skippy and herring also. R. Cusack caught $18\frac{1}{2}$ lb of fish, Doug Newton managed to catch 17 lb, (they probably all committed suicide), Ron Mansfield $15\frac{1}{2}$ lb, Snow Tate $14\frac{5}{4}$ lb and Val Pereira 13 lb. Good to see Val along on a field day along with

Sure enough we made in that direction and parked between the rocks and Smith's Beach. I casually made a few enquiries on the art of bait casting and was told to put on a mulie and belt it out without a sinker. Hellit's all I can do to cast a sinker out! I rigged up and and had a swift look round. Jim and Phil were asleep in the back and F.D.O. Jack was busy rigging his sure catch Alvey of Wagoe fame, whilst really he was listening to East and West on the radio. I crept down to the only flat spot on the rocks and made my first bait cast. I made a smart swish with my 3274 and Mitchell (Ron please note) and the bait rose high in the air above me. Luckily a puff of wind caught it and there it was 30 yards out in clear water. "This game's easy" Isaid and a couple of casts later I found that the stronger the wind the longer the cast.

Suddenly the line would not come in and I thought this strange - but I'd swear that, piece of reef was wriggling. Then the thought struck me, surely not a bite - not two in one year? With savage ferocity the fish went into action. It leapt into the air and tried to spit hooks at me. "What do I do now?" I emplored F.D.O. Jack who was by now beside me. "Don't you tighten that bloody drag" he said and Take it easy! Soon I had it in close and Phil appeared with a gaff and a disbelieving look on his face. Later I had another bite, much bigger than the one I caught but of course it got away. Having caught the only salmon in Smith's area we went back to camp to sweat out the long hours to weigh in time. Tom Smith had one but he would not take it out of his bag. At 8 a.m. Jack set up the scales and took his book and pen in hand. Of course I was first to the scales and in my excitement I left my hand on the fish - purely a gesture of proud ownership. Jim Strong who had obviously assisted Jack to weigh in before promptly slapped my knuckles with a rusty bait knife and the scales stopped at 91bs 1oz. There it was on the board - Jack Donohoe Heaviest scale fish. I stood around watching the others and chewing the mulie scales off my finger nails.

Tommy weighed in next and then Ross with a beauty, nice and fresh, just caught that morning. But I was still in front "Stiff cheese Ross" I said, "You can have heaviest bag". Minutes crawled by with still more to come. Then there was only a few minutes to go when another freshly caught salmon came in. I couldn't bare to watch the scales - "Disqualify the basket" I heard someone mutter and strangely I was standing alone. But it was a mere tiddler of 71bs, - Who was I to worry as I noticed Jack glancing at his watch. AN INTRODUCTION TO WAGOE REEF - APRIL 1970 by "WU"

With Jack and Arthur's words of praise for Wagoe Reef still ringing in our ears, the die was cast for an early trip to this "El Dorado". Monday and Tuesday produced morning land breezes so we organised the trip for Wednesday morning.

We set out from Kalbarri at first light - Ron and Ted in the "cruiser" - Dave and self in the "Rover". When we reached the higher ground near the Bluffs visibility was drastically reduced by a thick mist which despite the use of the wipers and head lights reduced our progress at times to a crawl.

After leaving the made road the condition of the track rapidly deteriorated and engagement of four wheel drive became necessary as we bounced and twisted over a particularly loose section. At one stage the track approached the commencement of one of the deep gulley's between two bluff's - just how uncomfortably close, we were not to see until the return trip in good visibility. Dave, wisely commented that the erection of a warning sign here at a later date might save a throttle heavy driver from a leap into oblivion.

Miles of meandering track at last brought us alongside the rabbit proof fence and later to a gate which we hoped was the one indicated on the rough map kindly drawn by friend Jack. After passing through the gateway I took the lead with Dave as chief navigator. The reason for this was that I had the only map - (Ron had lost his copy).

Being in the lead vehicle we were treated to a passing parade any naturalist would have given his proverbial to have seen - roos, emus and a wedge tail eagle reluctantly made way for the two noisy intruders.

The mist still reduced visibility to about fifty yards and consequently my requests for a position fix from the navigator was met with some unprintable remarks.
