MARGARET RIVER FIELD DAY:

13/14TH MAY 1972:

"Hope springs eternal in the human breast". We have often heard this quote in many situations. Who wrote it or first said it we will never know, but after some thought, I feel sure it must have been a fisherman. What else but hope sends us down long roads in unfishable weather searching for fishable water and fish. Surely it was the driving force sending 34 reasonably sane and sensible men to Margaret River fishing.

RON and I set out on our journey south on Friday afternoon in reasonable weather. The further south we went the more unreasonable it became. By the time camp was made south of Margaret River around 10.15 p.m., the Rover was rocking in roaring wind. Rain from passing squalls travelled horozontally instead of vertically, mixed liberally with salt, whipped from roaring waves. The word for the weekend was HOPE; so hoping for a better morning, we climbed into our newly installed bunks in the Rover. The morning's weather was the same, possibly a little worse. Hope then rested with a wind shift to the south. It didn't, so being fishermen, we went fishing. A reasonably quiet corner yielded a dozen Herring in two hours. When cleaned, they were stuffed full of wogs, one particularly ambitious chap contained a large centipede. With brilliant deduction, we reasoned the fishing wor to be better at a weed bank across the bay from us. To fish it we had to once again hope (sorry it's the only word), for a southern wind change as the westerly was blowing straight into it. To give nature a chance, we drove into the river mouth to see how many brave sculs wanted to check-in. Wechecked in 34 anglers, none of whom knew where he was going to fish, if at all.

After the check-in we returned to our morning spot to find the wind had shifted a little to the south. RON, using white bait, started to catch Herring immediately. Due to their easy feeding on wogs, they were not grabbing in their usual way. This resulted in a lot of dropped fish, the large belly in the line did not help the hook up either. I fished with lurex hooks behind a blob. This rig, for me, proved quite effective, and once hooked, few, were lost. In the last half-hour of fishing, we both used bait, as the fish were within 10 yards of us. Although close they were still fussy and did not bite as herring usually do. At 5 p.m. we gave it away and cleaned our catch before dark. With the fish cleaned and on ice, we consumed the delicious chop-sucy prepared by Lois, and washed it down with a can or two. We left the coast after dark and camped in a grove of trees near the highway out of the howling wind. Only a few members were waiting at the weigh-in point at about 8.50 a.m. Sunday. The first news we received was that GEORGE HOLMAN had decided it was too rough outdoors, so had booked into the Margaret River Hospital for the night. After making sure there were fish to weigh, the scales were set up. First ERIC SULLIVAN with two skippy, total 211b; then JOHN DEVITT'S skippy (1) 1 lb 10oz; this the heaviest scale fish. DENNIS GREEN dragged two sea trump for the bag to give him a total of 1 lb. NEV RISBEY was next with $\frac{1}{2}$ lb of herring (2), the same sized bag once again won the Junior Section for GEOFF RENSHAW. This left yours truly to win his first ever

field day, which must have some sort of noteriety, as it would be one of the worst field day totals on record. My bag of herring, weighing just $8\frac{3}{4}$ lbs, only beat the Pres. by 2lbs to give him second place.

As most members did not return to the weigh-in, I assume they did a smart thing and went home early, out of the unfriendly elements. We called at the Hospital on the way out, here we found DENNIS waiting with the news that GEORGE was O.K. and would be going home with him.

So dear members, as you now probably realise, there was little to write about the weekends efforts. I'll close as I started, with "hope".

Hope Garden Island is better.

MAY CAST:

32 members rolled up to Floreat Oval for the opening of the casting season in as close to perfect conditions as one could imagine. It was also the first time that the club's new innovation of using spgghetti instead of ribbon came into practice. Many comments were forthcoming from the members and such comments are very welcome as this "feed-back" is the only way that such changes can be assessed - so, chaps don't be backward in coming forward, if something is bugging you, let's know about it! Last year's winner, GEORGE HOLMAN, rolled up heavily bandaged and looked like a devalued dollar but was determined to participate nevertheless. Welcome to A. NORMAN and P. ISBISTER who were "first timers" on this occasion.

The level-line provided the highlight of the morning with some excellent distances; remarkable improvements and spectacular breakoffs. (Tiny (back to form) PARKEP and ERIC SULLIVAN - 2 each). J. DEVITT put down the longest cast of 463 feet and also took off this event with a fine 44 pts. Good to see B. REYNOLDS back with us again and he shared second place with G. BASKERVILLE with 41. R. LERCH, who has ironed out the bugs in his Alvey, L. REID and W. UTTING, who is really getting the best out of his geared reel, all finished with 40. It was plainly obvious that, without the restriction of ribbon, most casters picked up an extra 5 or 6 points. We are looking forward to even better things from our top casters.

In the double-handed accuracy, there were some fine efforts. Old peg-leg managing 50 with 3 casts, and N. KNIGHT'S bull. B. LEICESTER, who cast so well last year, and R. TUCKER shared first place with 63, making Sportsman of the Year points hard to earn for the rest of the season. Others to do well were T. CORCORAN 57, R. TICHBON 56, W. UTTING & R. KILDAHL 54. Watch out seniors because one of our juniors, J. RENSHAW, put down a very creditable 46.

The single-handed accuracy section was perhaps the noisiest and most entertaining event seen for some time. At this stage, "ligaments" HOIMAN was doing very well despite the ribbing and guffaws taking place. Some people will try anything to improve; it was noticeable that LITTLE LATTO, after George's magnificent "bull", hobbled up and cast on one leg to try to emulate this score. Dave needs more hobbling practise obviously. Not to be outdone, old "ligaments" put down another one! However, quietly working in the background was J. DEVITT, whose effort of 30 put him in the lead here. G. HOIMAN was next with 29. E. SULLIVAN 28, N. RENSHAW 26 and someone we haven't seen casting for awhile, A. SMITH 23, were the best of the rest.

Even with a severe handicap, G. HOLMAN proved his worth. In winning the competition last season, he only bettered this casts score of 122, twice. If he can start this way on one leg - giving us all an advantage - how well does this indicate some of the scores he might get as the season progresses. After scores were computed, J. DEVITT, who began so well last season, took the morning off with 131 pts, a fine effort. R. TUCKER'S 140, scored last July, still has the best score under this new scoring system, now being used

in its second season. However, it won't be long before someone gives that score a real fright. Second for the morning was the same R. TUCKER 125, followed by B. LEICESTER 123, G. HOLMAN 122 and T. CORCORAN 116. Fourteen casters finished with 100 points or more.

LAST season's final top twenty is virtually the same as this season's opening top twenty with the exclusion of J. STRONG, W. MORROW and E. PARKER, who have been replaced by E. SULLIVAN, M. DAWSON and junior J. RENSHAW. The order is of course much different and it looks like an interesting battle about to begin with N. KNIGHT and H.Y. HEW giving the leaders 30 and 40 points start respectively.

This season has begun well on an exciting note and it is hoped the more and more members will take advantage of this, both social and informative and stimulating morning. Thanks markers: - but please wear those hats. See you all and others next month.
