THE CAVE MEN OF ROTTO: By Basil 'Tiddly' Marsh:

About eleven o'clock we were all back at the cave, cleaned fish and packed some gear. When we decided to eat, a big problem arose. All sorts of food appeared with each person wanting his to be eaten so he wouldn't get into trouble with the little lady at home for bringing back uneaten food.

At one o'clock we were back at the road and settled down to wait for the bus. We were constantly amused by the continuous steam of cyclists arriving at the top of our hill all red faced and breathing heavily. If we had had a drink stall there we could have made a fortune.

The bus and truck arrived. A pleasant trip around the Island back to the jetty for the weigh-in and finally a smooth trip back to the mainland. I tell you man, it was a great weekend with great company.
