FEBRUARY FIELD DAY

ROTTNEST

Anglers this is up to you to fill in the form at the back of "Reel Talk" (should be in next month) - the committee can only work on those filled in. The club as a result of the poor response will have to subsidise the venue to the tune of about \$55.00.

The trip across was uneventful (except for one who was sick and four who felt that way), though the S-W breeze roughed up the sea and some water came inboard.

Arriving safely we had to wait for the truck and bus, (brilliant arranging on someone's part). When the vehicles did turn up, the gear was loaded quickly and then away.

First stop was the "Caves" area with about eight anglers disembarking. Saw Lofty sprinting over the hill as if he was caught short. However, this was not the case - he merely wanted to have a look at the water. He was soon back and he, Graham and Hewie restowed their gear on the truck. This was not for them. Too much weed.

Next stop was the "Larger Arms" at Strickland Bay and here "Snow", Doug and visitor STAN CHAMBERS off loaded. A number of members speculated on the large blanket covered box that EOUG had brought. SNOW was heard to remark that it was the "tele" and they were going to be comfortable. What was in it Doug?

Half a mile further up another eight alighted and amongst these were ALF RUTLAND, HAL NEIL and two visitors, JIM STRONG, PHIL NERI, myself and lad RAY. Alf, Hal and their two visitors fished the southern portion of Strickland. Our party more or less fished the centre.

The last stop was "Radar" and here a motley assorted bunch of anglers disgorged themselves. Namely "LOFTY", GRAHAM, HEWIE, GEORGE HOLMAN, DENNIS GREEN, BARRY REYNOLDS, KEITH FLEMING, BILL MORROW and THE PRESIDENT. As the best anglers were amongst this lot the scores were expected from this area.

Back at Strickland, gear was lugged to our chosen spots, rigs assembled, a bite to eat and on with the fishing. Early in the afternoon young Ray quickly caught two fish and then later a few more. JIM STRONG hadn't been too successful, but then close to dark, hooked a small "blue whaler", weighing 13 lb.

Around six o'clock SELWYN approached from the Caves carrying a bundle of gear. He had stopped briefly with "SNOW" and party but found the going too rough. Selwyn eventually joined us and fished unsuccessfully.

From our position we could see SNOW, DOUG and STAN amongst the tailor and how we envied them. They finished up with good bags and DOUG gained the heaviest bag of scalefish, with $20\frac{1}{2}$ lb - mostly tailor and one buff. "SNOW" compiled $18\frac{1}{2}$ lb while STAN managed $15\frac{1}{4}$ lb. Quite a useful total from this area.

Meanwhile back at our spot, PHIL NERI had fished without luck, managing only to catch a few small ones and these he used for bait. Phil had fished past ALF RUTLAND and party, arriving back at H.Q. saying that ALF had landed a couple of nice sharks just before dark, (6.30 p.m.).

Talking to ALF next morning, he remarked on the fact that the two sharks were caught. The first he thought was a sea kingie the way it leapt from the water and put up quite a fight. The second was caught in quicker time. ALF used 16 pound line and was careful - his total was $48\frac{1}{2}$ lb.

Burlying up the spot where young Ray had caught his fish the previous night, it wasn't long before he started again; a nice skippy and then a beauty - 21b 3oz. I don't know how to stop him short of not bringing him. He then hauled in a few more to rub in the salt. His bag was $9\frac{3}{4}$ lb - mine was $4\frac{1}{4}$ lb. Beaten again.

Up at Radar, RON and BILL were fishing almost at Wilson's Bay. HEWIE was fishing a short distance away when he hauled in a possible State Record - a 21b 7oz King George Whiting. Congrats.

BARRY REYNOLDS had started at Radar but wound up west off Fishhook Bay. While fishing here, he hooked into a JEWIE, but was unable to land it. The water here was extremely deep with the line down at a sharp angle. Around dark and fishing by himself, he decided to move down to Fishhook Bay.

It was here that GRAHAM, DENNIS and GEORGE turned up and joined Barry. During the night Barry caught his shark and then shortly after GRAHAM caught his 46 pounder. Barry had five runs altogether and lost 10 rigs in fishing till 1 a.m. GEORGE had three runs and was unsuccessful, although he fished until 1.30 a.m. DENNIS had something pretty big; it took out 300 yards of line - played it for sometime then suddenly B.O. On winding in the line found it was badly frayed over a long length.

GRAHAM had three runs altogether for his one shark; he also had a jewie on and at one stage could have jumped on it. However because of a overhanging ledge he was unable to land it and eventually broke his 401b line through. His total haul was $50\frac{1}{2}$ 1b.

CASTING CAPERS

In February we saw seven visitors from clubs to represent W.A. at the angling convention in S.A. These anglers turned up to have a crack at drycasting and to savour its disappointments - and there were plenty:

Our members extended a helping hand to these guests and I am sure they went away far wiser but needing a lot of practise. One of the visitors washeard to say that he should be able to notch up points in the accuracy events as he could cast thatfar. After the events the same chap admitted it wasn't as easy as it appeared. Well I am sure that a lot of our chaps think similarly after some of the scores that they achieved.

The S.H. Open was more or less a formality - BOB TUCKER had to virtually fall over to lose - the main opposition expected to come from GEORGE HOLMAN. In this we were not far wrong because the spirited contest between these two accounted for the distances obtained. BOB created a new distance of 319 feet during this event and this certainly must take some beating (until the next S.H. Open anyway). GEORGE'S distance was 307 feet; this is good casting and his best effort. HEW Y. HEW could not quite match the former distances but his 254 feet was an enviable distance.

Others prominent were BILL UTTING and DAVELATTO with 240 feet each.
My best effort was 233 feet and JOHN DEVITT the lion of distance casting achieved 231 feet.

The final placings for the year resulted in a win for BOB TUCKER with 1200 feet, second was GEORGE HOLMAN whose score of 1143 feet was 213 ft better than BILL UTTING'S 930 feet to finish third place. Congratulations must go to these anglers for a fine effort. Tinny buggers!

TONY SMITH and ALAN MCLAUCHLAN, whom we have not seen for some months, turned up but were disappointed with their scores in the D.H.A.

Previously mentioned BILL UTTING, showing a welcome return to form, easily won the S.H.A. with 31/40. In this tally Bill nonchantly chalked up a "bull". Nicegoing Bill. I followed Bill and tried to emulate him but could only muster 29/40, and second place. Third in this event, as in the D.H.A., was RON KILDAHL with four even scoring shots. Ron usually fares well in the D.H.A. event but showed his versatality by scoring 27/40 in the S.H.A. The sign of an all round caster. BOB TICHBON after having a wipe out (surf riding terminology) with his first cast, slipped into high gear (auto racing) and sent down three beauties to score 26 points. "DEADLY" showed up again to grab a handful of points (24) to make up a useful total. GEORGE HOLMAN increased his total points with a useful 23/40 and JOHN DEVITT had near misses for two "bulls" and a total of 20/40. DAVE LATTO also scored twenty points.

Generally speaking, although the distances are closer in the S.H.A., the scores were harder to obtain. Seems as though most anglers prefer a full blooded cast. Mention should be made of TREVOR STAM. Trev has persevered with the S.H.A. and over the lastcouple of months has managed to come close to a good score. This month while not setting anything on fire, scored a "bull" with his last cast.

Moving onto the L.L. Distance, we had a sure winner in "HEWIE" who scored 54 points, with some fine casting. Hewie using John Devitt's gear to advantage, gained distance with succeeding casts and finished with a near personal best cast of 425 feet. There were quite a few handicaps broken (ten) as a result of the excellent casting. The maximum reduction was 53 feet and this was earnt by Hewie. Others

The Top Ten sees little change other than a slight closing up of points, and GEORGE moving closer to DOUG TALBOT and RON KILDAHL moved up into eighth place - three points ahead of RUDY.

Next month will be the final of the D.H. Open. JOHN DEVITT at the moment holds a 236 feet lead over RUDY; still one never knows, does one?

In addition - normal sections will be held and if the weather is hot, ginger beer will be provided. Starting time will be 9.00 a.m. sharp as we have some visitors from the A.A.A. team to have a practise. This will beheld after our events are finalised.
