FEBRUARY FIELD DAY:

CERVANTES:

The east wind was blowing hot and fairly strong when we arrived at the check in. The heat had some members lined up on the reef for a quick dip, and what a variety of colours in underpants. TOM CORCORAN stood out in his red spotted white ones, his football alliegiance having some influence I suppose.

An hour later, we had checked in thirty members and the sea breeze was blowing quite strongly. With the temperature now very pleasant, we set off north. The beach was a piece of cake to drive on, so good in fact, we did not have to let the tyres down. With the beach as easy to drive on as this, there would be no reason for anyone not to take his four wheel drive along it, even to come back to check in.

From the point of the bay to the hill river, the water was all the same, so we stopped half way between the two. After a cold ale and a bite to eat at 2.55 precisely, TED SAVAGE cast his first bait. At 2.56, a four and a half pound tailor was about to have its throat cut. The significance being that the heaviest fish on the field day weighed three and one half pounds, but this early success was not a sign of things to come; fish were hard to come by. Ted only caught one pound two ounces more of fish in field day time. RON finished with 31bs 8oz and myself, 91b 12oz.

SNOW TATE and RON MANSFIELD weighed in 41b and 31b 12oz respectively, their fish were taken at the Hill River. Snow had a tailor on the edge of the water when it spat the hooks. With fish rather scarce, Snow made a rush and a grab that missed. All that then could be seen of him above water, was an arm holding a rod.

ERIC PARKER, STAN and GEOFF (J) RENSHAW combined to catch 121b south of Cervantes. Geoff's 41b gave him the Junior prize to himself. Last month he tied with PAUL MARSH. NEVILLE RISBEY and RISBEY JNR I think fished south as well, Neville topping 71b and Jnr. 12 oz.

ERIC SULLIVAN had the best bag for his party and for the field day, with a total of thirteen pounds. GRAHAM BASKERVILLE was all smiles with a 31b 4oz tailor, the biggest fish at that time, his total 51b. LOFTY GRIFFITHS was next with 21b 12oz followed by TOM CORCORAN with 21b 8oz.

Graham's smile was short lived. BOB FREDERICKS tailor put the needle at 31b 8oz, the heaviest for the field day. Fredericks Jnr. also caught a good tailor, going 31b. RON BAILEY'S total was 71b to put him second in their party. HEW was top of the group with 81b 8oz. Hew had a battle for sometime with a large shark, but his 8ft leader was not enough and the frayed line parted.

GEORGE HOLMAN was second on the day and his 11 lb, put him a few more points in front for the yearly competition. DENNIS GREEN'S 71b leaves him still in third spot for the year. JOHN and PETER COTTER fished near the same spot

with Peter showing Dad up by 12oz. TERRY O'HARA'S bag of 81b 4oz came from there, as did also, RICK ROWLANDS, R. & P. SCRIVENER and DREW SHAW.

Twenty-nine of the thirty on the field day weighed in fish to the total of 1291b 14oz. Not a great field day as far as weight goes, but when the fish are scarce, it gives you some satisfaction to be able to outwit a few of them.

Next field day is the Murchison, a place where anything can come along in the way of fish and usually a fair number of big ones. Your name might be on a couple, so come along.

FEBRUARY CAST

Considering the time, there was a good roll up of 27 members to participate in our monthly cast. The holiday had taken its toll and notable absentees were R. KILDAHL, L. REID, D. TALBOT, D. LATTO, H. BARROT and the LUCAS family - all no doubt enjoying the holiday elsewhere. It was good to see new members P. HALL and H. MORREL performing as "first-time old-timers", and a welcome return to J. DEVITT who has been dogged by a shoulder injory.

The morning was hot and very humid with a westerly wind drift, but it was the humidity which cut back the scores in the level line distance with only two exceptions. They were G. BASKERVILLE 38 points, and J. DEVITT 38 points; scores good enough to win this section. There were several unfortunate B.O's, notably E. PARKER (again!), B. FREDERICKS and R. LERCH. Frequent mention of the speed and dexterity of one of the markers, was made by many members and it was only when the cloud of dust settled that members realised that it was TINY! Others to score well were N. KNIGHT 35, R. TUCKER and D.C.O. 33, H.Y. HEW and D. GREEN (11/12) 32, and G. HOLMAN 31.

The Double-Handed Accuracy section saw some good scores with a bull from N. KNIGHT and W. UTTING at a target 216 feet away! R. FREDERICKS had trouble in this event - not scoring anything. Even TINY got 24. However this event was won in fine style by R. LERCH 59, followed by N. KNIGHT and R. TUCKER 57, G. HOLMAN 54, R. TICHBON 49, D.C.O. 47, W. UTTING and J. STRONG 45.

The Single Handed Accuracy saw a remarkable improvement in the scoring. The previous month only 2 members scored 20+. This month there were 11. R. LERCH, R. TUCKER, R. TICHBON all scored bulls and even T. STAM talked himself into a bull - but then for Trevor that's not hard. N. KNIGHT with four even casts notched 33 to win this event from B. LEICESTER 28, R. LERCH 27, G. GILDERSLEEVE 26, G. HOLMAN 23, H.Y. HEW 22 and G. BASKERVILLE, T. STAM and R. TUCKER 21.

The overall points score saw N. KNIGHT score 135 points to easily take cut the "pot". He was followed by a "back to form" TUCKER 121, unlucky LERCH 119 (had to overeome a B.O.), unlucky HOLMAN (S.H. Open by a foot) 118, and consistent BASKERVILLE (113 last month) 113, TICHBON 108, D.C.O. and J. DEVITT 103 and B. LEICESTER 101 - all scored well.

R. TUCKER 1044 and H.Y. HEW 1018 changed positions in the top twenty and NOEL moved a little further away from GEORGE, but it's still wide open with 2 casts to go.

Mentioning OPEN brings me to the Single Handed Open Final cast for this season. G. HOLMAN had the narrowest lead of 1 point over R. TUCKER, so Bob had to put down a cast 2ft longer than George's at least. So that's just what he did. Bob's best was 250 feet and George's 248. Congratulations to Bob and condolonces to George - it was a great competition. GRAHAM

BASKERVILLE has indicated his potential for next season with a fine 24 ft - only 4 behind you George!

All in all, the season is producing its exciting moments as it draws to a close. Both GRAHAM and I hope that this is indicative of things for the 1972-73 season, when more members will come along and take part in the spirit of fine competition, learn something themselves and also shake up our "seasoned veterans".

I realise that to have a story come from the far north may be a bit of a shock for southern members, but it is something different to be able to read about something other than tailor, salmon or mulloway, and I hope that you might come up here for a holiday one day, and so catch a Barramundi, Queenfish or Turrum.

Anyway, this little ditty is about a fishing trip that I recently went on that had both disappointment and jubilation. To start off, I live at Derby, and each week, I travel 40 odd miles to fish for barramindi with my father. (I am fifteen).

The alarm rings at 4.00 a.m., I reach out and switch it off and go back to sleep again. Precisely five minutes later, another one rings, because I knew that that would happen through past experience. I struggle out of bed, wake the old man and start to load the gear into the car. In my case this exists of a Silaflex 1AI and AHU 6000 with 121b line. Exotic? Well, the way I see it, is that I don't want a tin foil reel with cardboard gears when I happen to hook a 15 pounder.

With little brother, the dog, esky, etc. etc., also loaded, we set off for Willare Bridge, where the Broome-Derby road crosses the Fitzroy River. When we finally get there, after dodging wallabys, Brahman bulls and donkeys, the sun is just above the horizon, and the surface of the water alive with the splashings and rollings of literally dozens of fish, varying from mullet to archer fish, and once or twice, we even heard the "clomp" of a Barramundi having his breakfast.

After climbing down to the water's edge, we split up and move either opposite ways, or work different sections of the river. I must stress that accuracy in casting is a must in this type of fishing (unless you own a lure factory or are a millionaire) and even if you are good, you must be prepared to lose a fair number of lures.

My method is to cast to the upstream side of a likely locking snag, let the lure drift down to within a foot of it, and then begin the retrieve. The usual lure is a blue or silver Reb 2 3000. The retrieve can vary. I have taken fish on both a flat out retrieve or on a lure that is barely moving. My favourite and the one that seems to work best, is a fairly fast one — either hit fast or miss out.

On this particular trip, I found a log that was about ten feet from the shore, and also a patch of snags that was about thirty feet out. Perfect! I could do one cast and cover both places. My younger brother was casting at the second snag from a different position, and it was him that got the first strike. Perhaps "strike" is a little misleading. I should think that "wallop" would be a better term. Spray flew everywhere as this fish "walloped", but unfortunately, he had only 61b line on, so the unfortunate happened.

I was the next to get a hit, as a smaller fish, about five pound, rose up from under the nearer log to have a go at the new Reb 2 4000 I was using.

You've all heard about the fisherman who "skilfully guided it away from the snag with line singing, rod bending" etc? Well, it didn't happen. From the first resistence, I was well and truly in a flap. Usually the water is that clear that you actually see the fish coming up to have a go, but this one came up from nowhere, hit that lure as if it was the only one left, and vanished under the log. Brute force was the only method I decided, so I heaved on the rod, and succeeded in bringing him up, way up. In fact three feet out of the water. I remembered something I had read somewhere about pulling on the rod when a salmon takes to the air, so I did just that. It must have winded him/her pretty badly, because he gave in without much fight after that, and I safely landed him. Jubilation... there were some people back at the camp who had been there for two days, and not even seen a fish, but here I was with a beautiful 5 pounder after only an hour.

After my pulse had eased back to only twice that of normal, I managed to get another cast out in the vain hope that he had a mate. Joy of joys, yet another fish swept up and clouted the lure. However, this one jumped behind the log and threw the lure to glory around the log. I then had the jumiliating job of swimming for the lure, the first time I have ever had to do that.

That turned out to be our lot for the day, but to show that things are not all rosy on a fishing trip, we managed to push in the rear bumper bar of our brand new car. Oh well! ... Good things can't last.

Since that time, I have caught and seen more than 12 barra in that spot, which is a deep pool only fifty yards long. If anybody cares to call in on me while they are on holiday up this way, I will gladly show it to them, and if possible, help them to catch a barra. Fifteen poune line is the limit though!
