SUN, SURF AND BIG BITIES by TERRY O'HARA

My mind was not on my work as I watched the hours slip by. This time tomorrow I'd be wetting a line 400 miles north, away from the "rat race" with only fish as adversaries.

On this trip to wagoe there would be Rudy and Ralph Lerch, Charlie Walsh and myself and Bill Schapp, whom we would meet at Halfway Camp.

Thursday night was spent loading the Toyota and trailer ready for an early rise and start the next morning. After a yarn and a drop of Rudy's Munich beer, we hit the sack for some shut eye.

Up at 3.30 a.m. werwere off by 4.00 a.m. and travelling easily; the dawn just opening the horizon to us. Time passed quickly as the miles passed, the Toyota making it a cakewalk. We hit the Jurien gravel about 8.00 after which we made good time to the bitument out of Eneabba. Dongara and Geraldton passed and were on her doorstep, Northampton. After a yarm with Laurie Clark— it seems as though the snapper have been on at Wagce; things look good.

The track in is in good condition and we are at halfway at 12.05, after a nice easy trip. In the settlement itself is an assortment of Range Rovers (3 of them!) and Land Rovers, so something must be in the air. One spot of shovel work when the trailer dug in and then we saw Bill's Toyota and caravan. Here we stayed for awhile and relaxed. Bill had not been to Wagoe but had plenty of tailor and mulloway which he had caught close to camp. Besides this, he said it had been hot most of the time; this we were just appreciating, boy those beers tasted good! We then set up camp in the proximity of Bill's camp then off for a look at Wagoe.

After an accelerator cable snapped near Disaster we felt we were rushing a bit. Wagoe must wait.

So Friday night we decided to fish close to the camp, right in front. The taior then decided to turn it on and in 2 hours we filled our bags with fish, sizes ranging from 1½ to 71b- Bill claiming the biggest! Then the mulloway came around. They were only small, but Bill's wife landed a 14 pounder; the rest were schoolies up to 91b. (Rudy and myself both lost good fish, in both cases, the hooks just came out). So what would Wagoe be like if it was this good here. We then resigned to fish up there next morning. After some tucker, into sleeping bags, anxiously awaiting morning.

Saturday morning we were up at 5.00 and the sun was already creeping into the sk_7 . The wind was E-SE, the time was ripe, Wagoe here we come. Off we went with a sense one can't really describe only in that it is there when one is in big fish territory.

We made good time up the track and were soon at our objective, the Cutting. The water looked good, very good, there was a swell alright and this ruled out fishing the reefs, but we didn't need to as the best water was at our feet. Then, as I clibed out of the Toyota, I noticed them, about 8 sets of gills strewn about the sand and only one fish has gills like these, Mulloway; big mulloway. This was the detonator to get us moving. Wow you should have seen the boys move!!

In a minute flat I was rigged and in the water. The burley went in and all was set. Then it started, bang, bang and on came the tailor. All the boys got stuck into them. Young Ralph seemed to have a spot close in because we cast right out whereas he dropped his behind a breaker and wham! I'd do it- nothing; throw right out and wham again.

At about 10.30 all went slack, then Bill's reel ran hot. Big mulla? After 15 minutes we picked it up in a wave, whaler and a good one. Then as Bill had no wire the inevitable happened, breakoff.

Rudy was next, but his fish wasn't to be outdone. It smashed the bait with utmost ferocity and hurled itself 6' out of the water spinning as it went in Mako fashion. We were all dumbfounded by the incredible power and beauty of this creature and agreed it had won its freedom when the line parted.

Bill must have been touched, because he was soon into something else. Off it ran, 50, 100 yards then the line arced up and a silvery block body with vertical slashes arced out of the water, mackeral! Bill was ecsatic, but just as this happened, his line went limp. Poor Bill, he looked so dejected.

We packed up and headed back to camp for lunch. Had a snooze during the afternoon, resigned to fish in front in the evening.

Late afternoon and the sea breeze hasn't yet materialised, only gentle zephres blowing intermittently from the SE. We didn't need encouraging; Wagoe, here we come.

We headed for the Cutting again, ready for battle with 2 bags of tailor gutts and 3 of mashed sardines, white bait and mullet guts brought up from Perth.

Already there, when we arrived, were 2 Northampton boys; George Puls and a friend, but no bites as yet. No scener had we stopped than George's friend was jerkedout of his inactivity and his rod pulled into a tight bow. The big fish made easy work stripping 150 yards off his side cast. Boy, we were getting used to quick rigging up. I was in the water in about 60 seconds. We all put out mulies and in came the tailor. Suddenly something began fiddling with my bait, then wham, a run of 100 yards and minus one rig. George's friend was again given the thick, this time the

the brute ripped off a good 200-250 yards of line. Again I got smahsed up on 191b. Blast this, out came the 700 E2 loaded with 351b super x. Just as I was trying to do the knots in the rig, Bill's rod bent to an angle which had to be seen to be believed. Off went the fish with a one way ticket to South Africa. Fr the next 35 minutes that fish took Bill on a merry chase 200 yards up the reef, back and forwards (at one stage the line got stuck in a fissure, Rudy pulled it out with a gaff! (A great ad for Platapus), and all this on an Eggbeater). Eventually he got it into the wash and it was his, a black tip whaler between 100-1201b (next day it weighed 961b gutted) not bad on 261b.

By now I was rigged and in the water, a half tailor for bait. It hadn't been out 2 minutes before something was playing with it. I took up the slack and felt the brute move off, then I gave himcurry. Did I say I gave it out, that fish dragged me stumbling down the beach, drag applied, reel humming. If ever I learnt respect for a fish, I did then. For the next 25 minutes the battle seesawed until I managed to get it within gaff range. Then he was ours, a fine whaler a bit larger than Bill's, $6\frac{1}{2}$ feet from tip to tail in the 110-1301b category.

Rudy was next into action. He really gave that shark hell, every move the shark made, Rudy gave it something more. It was in the breakers in 10 minutes. I did the honours this time but I don't know if I should have. The shark was green. I struck the gaff home and Vesuvious erupted cartwheeling, sumersaulting, the 5" gaff straightened like copper wire. Bill's forged one was rushed down, this did the job and got a permanent set in it for the trouble. I think I was as tired as Rudy after that. The shark, a whaler, was in the same 100+ category. Soon after I notched my second, about 901b.

The sharks then went quiet and tailor and small mulloway began to make things interesting again. Bill's wife, at this point, got a really good strike from something. It wasn't a shark, could it be a good mulla? In it came, a double header tailor, top hook on the rig a $6\frac{1}{2}$ pounder, bottom hook a 4 pounder, not bad, but this heralded the sharks return. Rudy was using nylon and got bitten off time after time.

Young Ralph at this point looked into and landed a whaler of about 35 pounds— a great effort!

I had 49 strand and two 10/0 Seamasters attached to a half a mullet out when the rod was just about wrenched from my hands. I had the drag fairly right but it didn't make an ounce of difference. I tried to loossen it but got bruised knuckles in the process. That fish, after 40 seconds, was still running. The two big handles were a spinning blur as line was stripped, a good 700 yards was taken off before the line suddenly went twang. On reeling in, I found the 49 strand had been snipped like spaghetti.

It is these fish that really excite me and for which I'd fish anywhere. A point worth raising is that all sharks were caught and brought in without wire, my two on 95lb nylon trace!

By this time we called it a night after a very exciting 5 hours of fishing.

The next morning we prepared to return home and were packed and ready by 7. For two days fishing we had a large freezer box and a large ice box full to the brim of tailor and mulloway, all we could carry. One thing we dearly regret is that we didn't take the club scales, for we all would have collected 3/1's as well as at least 1 club record. So remember, if you got to big fish country, don't forget the scales, or you'll inevitably regret it.

So time to set off home, time to say adieu to Wago who has again produced the goods for what we have of this trip are fond memories, of good company, of a pleasant weekend, in the sun and the surf and of a dash with the big bities!

He had with him a few friends and his daughter and I'm happy to report that all escaped without injury, although they were shaken up. The "Runge Rover" was extensively damaged and I venture to say it will be sometime before Tony will be able to use it.

COMPETITION ANGLING:

"I cannot understand how clubs can justify large scale slaughter of fish for competition points". Some of you may remember the occasion on which the above quotation was made. For those who cannot, it was made by Roley McKay at an instruction period during 1972. It is a quote that has never left me alone, and one that is to some extent an indictment of club competition angling in general. Our own club, great though it is, fosters a competition which relies on brute force, not a little luck and some skill. The skill referred to is mainly the ability to read the beach because if the line is heavy enough, the reel good enough and the angler patient enough, the fish is doomed! On really big fish a little extra skill is required—but how many of those do we catch?

How is such a competition commensurate with our aims and objectives in particular (a) which refers to sport and art and (b) which refers to conservation?

We have all heard so much clap-trap about ecological protection, pollution and environmental protection, but how many of us feel just a little uneasy when 50lb or more of small tailor or small mulloway are weighed in, or 1800 lb of small shark, or 2400 lb of salmon...... Quite often we hear members talking about how they used to catch fish here and there but can no longer do so.

To its credit this club has made two token contributions to conservation namely the bag limit on salmon and gilling and gutting fish to be weighed. This is not enough!

An Alternative.

Let's examine in very general terms an alternative way of coping for the angler who wishes to maintain a strong competitive spirit within our club. I feel this can be done with far more relevance and interest than that which exists at the present time.

Many of our members are familiar with the operations of the Australian National Sportsfishing Association (ANSA)—although this group seems to be operating fairly quietly. Their competition is based on one concept, that of man versus fish—the points resulting from a conquest being computed from weight of line, weight of fish and fighting quality of the fish. Could the Surfcasters do something along these kines? Could members be encouraged to fish light, to compute their points honourably and to compete in a stimulating contest. I do intend to examine these possibilities and prepare a further "instalment" for a later edition of "Reel Talk" and I sincerely hope that some members will come forward with some constructive practical suggestions.

COMPETITION ANGLING CONT'D:

Objections.

One major objection or obstacle such a revolutionary change would face would be prejudice. Nobody will deny that change in an established, smooth running organisation such as ours is often viewed with closed bias. It is hoped however that members will keep an open mind so that the concept outlined will gain support and be closely examined to give this club a more desirable and envied competition structure.

One can foresee much paperwork and mathematical computing necessary, but perhapssome format can be adopted to keep this to a minimum. How does the chap get on if he catches 60 fish? Does he do 60 separate calculations? Does he only use his best ten fish? Do averages become operative? This is one area where such a scheme may become onerous and cumbersome.

Once the points have been computed, the monthly and annual tallies can still be followed up. The angler who fishes for points, although he will now have to prove his skill as an angler, not a butcher, will have to fish lighter and take a risk on losing a fish or two. The winner of this competition can truly be dubbed a sportsman.

The clubs angling contest survives on an honour system now and no objection could be raised in this regard, surely. The anglers word regarding his line weight would have to be taken on trust, as so many aspects are done now.

Summary.

Gentlemen, I have written this article in all sincerity as being in the interests of our club. It is appreciated that many anglers will fail to see the advantages on the surface but on further examination may have a change of heart. Imagine what a great "first" the Surfacesters would have if we formulated a club competition which was practical and unique, and the envy of many clubs and associations. I would be very grateful if any member has any suggestion or criticism as I do intend to draw up a more specific competition structure to present later. At this stage it is only food for thought but I believe in its concept and feel strongly that something could be done.
