To the "Reel Talk" Editor,

I read with interest the comments of the "Toaster" in 'Toaster's Titbits', towards the proposed venue for March '75. It's hard not to draw conclusions as to the identity of the mystery writer in the light of the notation added to the fourth point of interest on the March venue.

His articles in the past few months have bristled with the eloquence of a master - a school master that is. Anyway, I would like to concur with the "Toaster's" choice of Flinders for the above mentioned venue and would add that I enjoyed this trip so much last year, that a couple of weeks ago, in February, I went to Flinders with my wife and eight year old son and spent three days fishing and lazing about in the sum.

We camped/Wern Dunnett's property, pitching the tent in amongst the peppermints near the spring and driving from there to the steep sand hill, walking the rest of the way to the beach. We fished the reef and beach within half a mile either side of the access track, arriving usually about nine a.m. and staying till the sou-easter started, returning to camp for lunch and a snooze, then back again for the evening session when the breeze had dropped slightly.

For the first two days the weather was typical Flinders - a howling, almost unfishable sou-easter in the aftermoon and evening, and calm conditions in the morning. We caught all our fish in the mornings, a lot of herring and skippy and a few silver bream and flathead. The second morning a big school of salmon swam nervously past, followed ten minutes later by a similarly agitated small school of fair sized tailor - possibly pursued (although I did not see them) by larger predators. At the time I had no mulies or spinners or heavy line, so I watched with even greater agitation than the fish felt as they swam past.

Om the last day there I went down at six a.m. to the same reef where I had seen the tailor and salmon the day before, to find a stiff sou-easter already blowing. Despite the conditions, I decided to have a go anyway and started pitching mulies as far out as the breeze and my limited casting ability would allow. I must have stood there for an hour catapulting mulies into the wind before I got a fish. When the fish arrived, in one hour I caught half a dozem tailor about three pounds each, the same number of large herring and a flathead before my thirty pound breaking strain nylon trace was neatly bitten off. Having already caught sufficient fish in the preceding days to fill the one esky I had brought with me, being conservation minded and not having the same number of sources for disposal of fish as some anglers, I refrained from rigging up a new trace and headed back to camp, woke up the family and drove home.

P.S. Now, I know Flinders Bay is not a popular spot amongst Committee Members, especially after viewing results of competitions held there in the past, but if somehow the competition could be arranged so that more time be allowed for fishing later in the morning, then results may be better. While I'm at it, I would like to include also, a plea for the retention of at least two Southern venues, for although fish may not be as plentiful at times, there is a much greater variety. Besides which I feel that the season is a little top heavy with Northern wenues.

EXHILARATING MOBILITY:

With the current surge in popularity of the motor-cycle in the last two years, after a dormant period of about 12 years, more and more people are being drawn to the leisurely occupation of trail riding. The feeling provided when the rider "faces the wind" can only be described as exhilarating and free. Add to this the enormous range of bikes that are equipped to handle track, trail and sand, then there has become available to the angler a form of transport that will not only provide mobility, but also independence and a degree of excitement.

Anglers whose financial reserves are limited to such an extent that a four wheel drive vehicle is a luxury beyond reach, can now gain many of the advantages offered by the 'rover, 'Toy.' etc. for a fraction of the cost.

The bikes designed specifically for sand, with fat wheels and high clearance, will allow an angler to move freely from his main vehicle with all the gear he requires, to a range of up to 30 miles. The cost of such a 60 mile trip could be as low as 50 cents!

One particular Japanese firm has had available for some time a three wheeled model. Equipped with large sand tyres these machines will go virtually anywhere. These cannot be licensed for the road thereby seriously marring their popularity.

Another Japanese firm has produced a series of 2-stroke machines that can be licensed and will go anywhere -even two-up if the tyre pressures are low enough. With a machine of this type an angler can move about freely, carrying his rod and gear requirements. His only limitation is the range of his petrol tank.

These bikes range in power from 50cc through 90cc to 125cc with price tags of \$400, \$500 and \$600 respectively. The author has a 90cc model and shopping around will reduce those price tags.

Having written only about the virtues of such transport, it should be pointed out in fairness some of the drawbacks. Perhaps one serious consideration is the fact that the economy of the long trips is threatened if the owner takes only one companion who he can transport easily when at the beach. He has two choices:— (a) he takes only one companion or (b) takes more than one, spare fuel and is prepared to make many trips on the beach.

No one will deny that a bike cannot offer the comforts of travel as offered by an enclosed vehicle. The rider has to put up with cold, wind, sand etc., but at the same time, the enclosed vehicle cannot offer the same mobility as the bike. Age may determine one's priorities.

Transportation is another consideration but many carriers are now available which are both legal and easy to fit, costing anywhere from \$20 to \$50. The carrying vehicle may also need 'helper opprings.'

It is a little surprising that the angler in this State, which offers so many sandy beaches, has not taken to this form of transport. It is a safe, reliable and very efficient way of examining large areas of beach country, is relatively cheap to buy, is wery economical to run, and prowides a fluency of movement no other wehicle can provide and all for \$500 to \$600.
