We were very sorry to receive a resignation from Steve Sutton and family.


The club raffle was drawn by our Social Director later in the evening and the various winners will appear elsewhere in the 'Reel Talk'.

5. Bring your CAMERA.

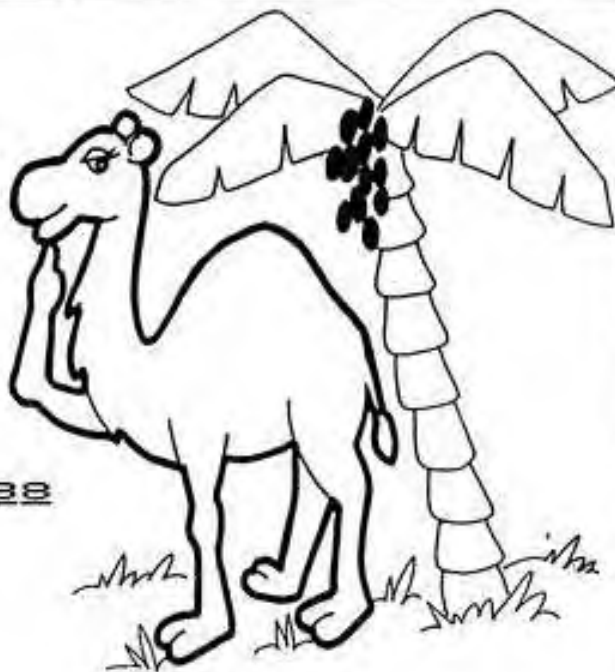
FUEL

Fuel is limited to possibly Arthur River after hours and probably only until 2400 hours for those travelling at night. Many Peaks has fuel available on Saturday morning.

DIRECTIONS

The Mount Barker Road is good but a narrow tar road. The rest of the road is a good gravel surface. Follow the marks on the map as these indicate the route to be taken. After passing through Many Peaks continue east until you reach Warriup Road, proceed along for approximately 15 kms. You will see a small lake on the left. Almost opposite this is a road turning to the right (don't take this as it leads to a gravel pit). A few hundred metre further on is a very indistinct narrow road turning to the right. This is Swan Lake Road (the sign may still be there), follow this track and don't take any side tracks. This track will follow the fence line for quite a number of kilometres. The only heavy 4WD is within .5km of the creek and beach.

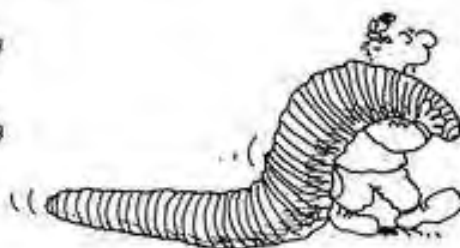

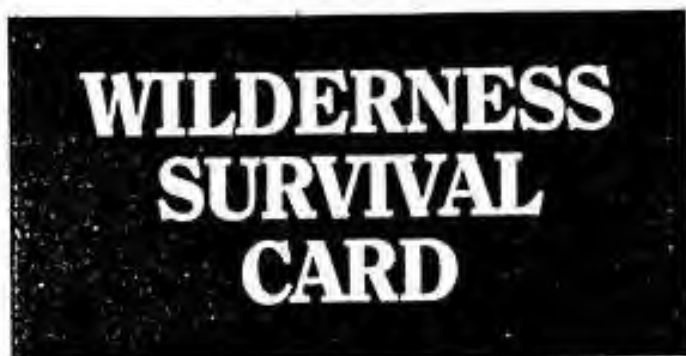

EMERGENCY SIGNALS

FIRES

A smoking fire will aid searchers by day or night.
 Beware of fire danger.

WHISTLE/TORCH — the code:

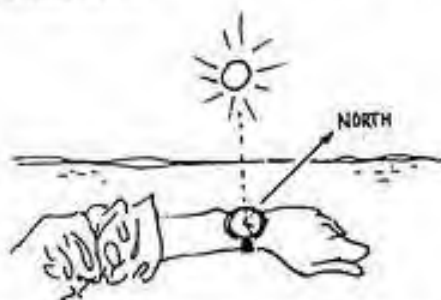
- Lost party — 3 blasts/flashes
- Search party — 1 blast/flash repeated regularly
- Acknowledgement of distress signal — 2 blasts/flashes
- Recall for search parties — 4 blasts/flashes repeated regularly

The same codes will apply for gun shots (fire into soft ground only; **DO NOT** fire into the air) or mirror flashes. Don't forget the mirrors available on your vehicle.

DIRECTION FINDING BY DAY

— Watch Method

To find north hold your wristwatch horizontal, the figure 12 pointing at the sun, bisect the angle between the hour hand and 12 o'clock positions. The line indicates north.



Note: This method will not apply to areas north of the Tropic of Capricorn during midsummer.

CASUALTY ACTION

Leave a minimum of two members with the casualty while a team of no less than two members continues to the aid station with a written casualty report containing:

1. Designation of group.
2. Name of ALL group members.
3. Name of CASUALTY.
4. Nature of problem.
5. Assistance required.
6. Map edition and location of casualty.
7. Food/water state of the group.



PATIENT MANAGEMENT ORDER OF URGENCY

1. Protection of the patient from further injury (safety).
2. Restore breathing and heart beat (C P R).
3. Stop bleeding.
4. Minimise pain.
5. Reassurance of patient.
6. Seek further aid (transport to hospital).

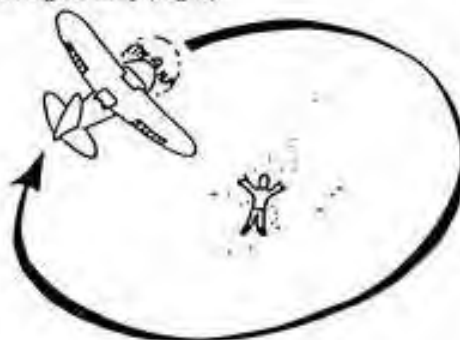
Message Received and Understood

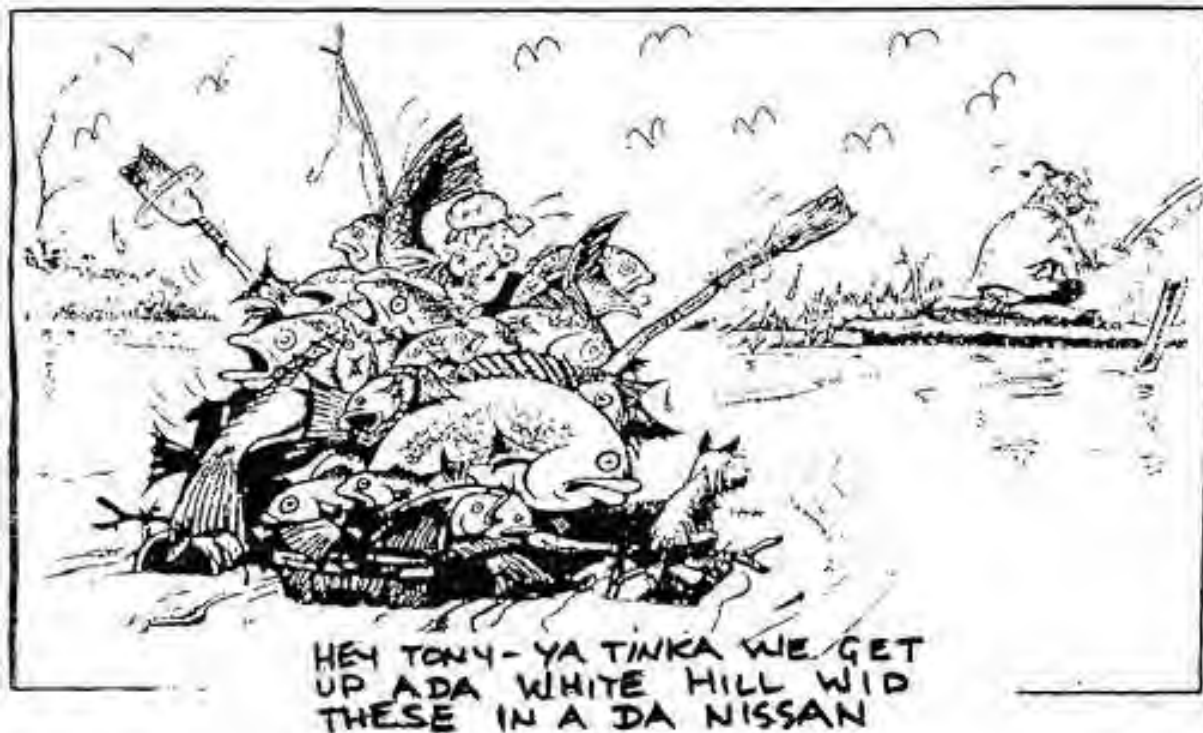


