

Fishing Field day Report - Preston Beach - February 2020.

Understanding braid and polyethylene fishing line

MOST anglers will usually refer to the super lines they use as braided line or "braid" for short. Using braid is commonplace nowadays but the line you are using might not actually be braided at all. Whilst the use of super lines has now become mainstream, understanding the different characteristics of these lines and some of the terminology will help you be better informed the next time you go to buy some new line.

What are super lines?

The building block for most super lines is polyethylene, an extremely versatile and popular plastic material that is also used to make shopping

bags. The difference between shopping bags and your fishing line however is that is that ultra-high molecular weight polyethylene is used in the making of super lines. This super polyethylene goes through a process called gelspinning to create fibres that stretched and oriented in the direction of the fibre creating an exceptionally strong material. These high performance gel spun polyethylene fibres are the then used to create the various fishing lines that anglers use around the world.

Braided lines

True braided lines are made by taking high performance polyethylene fibres and weaving or braiding them together to create a single multi-strand fishing line. The process of weaving the lines is mechanically intensive so braided lines take relatively longer times to manufacture. Once made, the spools of bulk braided lines are put in a chamber filled with dye or are unwound with the line passing through a tray of dyed resin. This process allow transfers the dye solution onto the line creating the various coloured fishing lines you see on your tackle shop shelves.

Thermally fused line

The other type of super line you'll find in the market is not braided at all but is created by taking the high performance polyethylene fibres and fusing them together. This is done by intertwining the fibred then heating the strand to a temperature which causes the fibres to melt and fuse to one another. This fusing process is much faster than braiding and creates a line that is typically stiffer than braid and more cost effective.

Carrier or strand count

Each individual strand of high performance polyethylene fibre is called a carrier. A four carrier braid is braided with four strands of polyethylene fibre whilst an 8 carrier braid used with strands. Generally speaking, using more strands creates a braid that is rounder and smoother, the end result is that it's quieter when being wound through the guides and allows you to cast further. With that said, a four strand braid might feel courser than an 8 or 12 strand braids but that coarseness has advantages, especially if you're fishing through heavy weed or kelp and need to braid to cut through it. The lower strand count braids are also easier to make and are will cost less to buy!

PIC count

Where each of the individual carriers or strands intersects one another in a braided line is called a "PIC" which stands for Per Inch Crosses. A higher pic count means that the weave of the braided line is tighter resulting in a braided line that is more flexible and is less prone to retaining water. Higher pic count lines take longer to manufacture so will be more expensive.

PE rating

The PE rating system can cause a little frustration as it is quite confusing and non-standardised. Some people will say you multiply by 10 to get the equivalent PE rating in pounds i.e. PE2 =20lb braid. Others will say it's a measure of diameter i.e. PE2 = 0.24mm. Finally some say that it's based on a Japanese thread weight measurements. I've just walked out of a tackle shop in Singapore whilst over here briefly and wanted to buy some 10lb braid. I looked at lines with and without PE ratings and found that there wasn't any consistency in naming; the same PE number was

found to have different thicknesses and characteristics. In the end I compared thicknesses, stiffness and price then settled on something that was a good trade-off of all three!

Pros and cons

There are many benefits to using either braided or thermally fused lines. Firstly, they're very thin and very strong allowing you to get more line onto your reel, cast further or use heavier lines than you otherwise could. They have practically no stretch so transmit bites and vibrations exceptionally well. These lines are not without their downsides however. Good quality braid is usually quite expensive and if you get snagged it can be difficult to beak heavier lines. Also, their slick coatings and smooth surfaces make it more difficult to ties knots with braid. Finally, most braid lines are opaque making them quite visible under water.

Applications

Generally speaking for light casting on spin tackle you want a line that has a little more body and stiffness so a fused line or stiffer braided line would suit best. This results in a line slight amount of memory which helps the line to coil off the spool of a spin reel more consistently than limp braid lines. Braided lines come with different coatings and profiles making them suitable for all applications. Some are supple and soft, others are stiffer whilst some are round in profile and others are oval. For jigging you want a rounder profile and more supple line that doesn't deform and maintains its integrity under load. If you are using a bait caster, a supple braid will flow off the reel freely but be warned that a backlash can be nasty! Higher carrier and PIC count braids are useful for jigging or similar activities that require thin line with exceptional strength and shock characteristics. Low carrier count lines are good when you're fishing areas with plenty of weed and debris in the water where you want a more robust line that has more texture to cut through troublesome growth.

NOTES FROM AAA DELEGATES COUNCIL MEETING 18th February 2020

Presidents Report:

President commented on the two funding applications that were approved by Recfishwest. The defibrillator has been purchased and there is still some more items to be purchased. They are to be available to the State Boat Championships.

The other was for the Snag It – Tag It program which is ready to go to the printer. Assistance will be required later to put the tags into envelopes prior to being passed to Ozflex Fishing and Outdoor for distribution.

The President also pointed out that the four Executive Committee Members will not be sanding at the AGM in August. We need to have four persons to fill these positions and the earlier they are handed over the better the Association will be.

Estuary; Rock & Beach Report

Russell is to contact the caravan park at Port Gregory to notify them of the State Rock & Beach event to be held over the June long weekend.

We still need a club to run the event

ORSSC had indicated previously that they would run the event on the condition that the boundaries were opened up, that the lines down and lines up times were extended and that it was a species competition. Following the loss of the N of M last month the event is now in need of a club to run the event. It will need a Field Day Officer and a Recorder and a few volunteers to assist on the day with the weigh-in. The club running the event can decide the lines down / lines up times as well as the duration of the competition.

If there is no club prepared to run the event by the April Delegates Council Meeting then the event will be cancelled. This will lead to problems occurring with the end of year awards.

Pat Shinnick indicated that if a club decides to run the event and use an event booklet, he will assist with preparation and printing.

Boating Sub Committee Report:

All is in readiness for the March 2020 Boating Championships. The publicity booklet has been printed and all is ready for the competition. Thursday night the 20th there will be a barbeque for the sub-committee. There will be a Volunteers Night held on Thursday night the 12th where training for all assistants on the day will be done.

Thursday night the 19th of March just prior to the event bags will be packed at CCR. Snag It – Tag It cards are required to be put into the bags.

Dry Casting Report:

Due to a major competition in March on the 8 & 9th casting will day will be held on the 16th. Normal Sunday casting will resume in April. Next State Dry Casting event is in October.

There has been record applications received from either State or National.

Fremantle Sailing Club has sought to affiliate with the AAA(WA Division) Inc., a motion was put to the delegates and it was unanimously approved that they be allowed to affiliate and pay a 'pro-rata' fee of \$50-00 for affiliation for the balance of the year. They are intending to participate in the State Boats Championships in March.

Planning for Next Year:

Due to a variety of circumstances, none of the current executive are able to stand again next year. To ensure a complete and useful changeover, delegates are to go back to their clubs and seek interest from their members to fill these positions. Hopefully this can be done before the AGM in August and a smooth transition can take place.

This is urgent and must be addressed.

Brag Mats:

The Association has purchased 100 Brag Mats for use by clubs and there has not been a great uptake. Delegates are asked to take the information back to the clubs and place orders. They cost the Association \$20 each and are being sold for \$10.

Review of Association By Laws

Review of Association By Laws and Sectional By Laws is still to be completed for inclusion on the web site. Current State Boat information will be uploaded in the near future.

Association Web Site:

Club information and club contact details, pictures and any other promotional materials from clubs are still required to be sent to the Secretary. Much of the information currently held is not correct.

Also club activities for inclusion in the Club Calendar of Events which is included with the Delegates Council Minutes is also required.

AMENDMENTS TO SCAC COMPETITION RULES

The following are additional amendments to the SCAC Competition Rules to those previously suggested.

1.2 Visitors

OLD

Any member has the right to bring a visitor or visitors to any club event. The said visitors may enter the competition providing they pay the nominated fees and comply with the Club and competition rules. The fee will be set from time to time by the Committee.

Delete the words in the second line "pay the nominated fees" as fees are no longer charged for Field Days.

NEW

Visitors.

Any member has the right to bring a visitor or visitors to any cub event. The said visitor may enter the competition providing they comply with the Club and competition rules.

2.1.19 Notifying Others.

OLD

Notify someone of your intended fishing locality, so you may be located promptly in an emergency or break down.

Add an additional paragraph to this clause.

NEW

Notify someone of your intended fishing locality, so you may be located promptly in an emergency or break down. "All members are to annually complete an Application for Membership Form with their next of Kin details included. This is to ensure that the club has accurate details of the members name, current address, and current email and telephone numbers as required by the Act".

This is to ensure that club records are correct and up to date and meet the requirements of Division 5 - Register of Members of Section 53 of the Act. This information will assist in the event of an emergency.

2.2.3 Type of Gear

Delete the words "salmon and tailor rigs"

OLD.

All fish must be caught on a line and hook and incorporate the use of rod and reel or handline. All angling gear, including flight of hooks and trebles, must comply with Department of Fisheries WA Regulations. The use of treble hooks on Salmon and Tailor rigs is not permitted for Club competitions.

NEW

All fish must be caught on a line and hook and incorporate the use of rod and reel or handline. All angling gear, including flight of hooks and trebles, must comply with Department of Fisheries WA Regulations. The use of treble hooks on rigs is not permitted for Club competitions.

This alleviates the risk of damage to undersized fish that are to be released, caused by the use of treble hooks. Modern fishing techniques are now using single hooks or 'in-line' hooks in lieu of trebles.

DRYCASTING

3.1.2 Sign On

Delete this paragraph as doesn't encourage participation.

OLD

Any member who has not placed their name on the starters "List of Competitors" before the commencement of the first event shall be eliminated from that event.

3.2.1 Practice Casting.

Delete the current paragraph and replace it with the National Rule.

Practice casting shall commence only after the Dry Casting Officer has given permission. A warning will be given by the Dry Casting Officer to end practice, normally 5 minutes prior to the official start of competition. Any member infringing this rule shall forfeit the next competition cast, unless the cast was made with the direct permission of the Casting Officer who may give this permission if requested to clear line after an overrun etc.

NEW

Practice casting will not be permitted on the official courts on the day of competition prior to or during any event

3.2.2 Casting Order

Delete the words "in the correct order" and rephrase the wording.

Casting shall be in the correct order as per "List of Competitors". Any member not responding to the call by the starter by the time due to cast, shall forfeit that cast. Provided however that the "Casting Officer" has the right to waive this rule in respect to competitors also acting as officials or upon request by a member having an overrun etc.

NEW

Casting shall be as per "List of Competitors". Each competitor shall cast within one minute of being called to the casting mark. "No-cast" will be declared if the caster fails to comply with this rule, and no points will be awarded for the cast. The Dry Casting Officer has the right to waive this rule in respect to competitors also acting as officials or upon request by a member having gear problems etc.

3.2.3 Marker's Casts

Delete this clause. This will prevent an unfair advantage being taken by a caster, to cast at the end of the "List of Competitors" and see what distances have already been cast. Casters shall cast in order as per 3.2.2. Alternate markers will be found.

3.2.5 Presence at the Casting Arena

Delete the words "Casting Officer" and replace with "Call Up Marshall".

Members are to enter the casting arena in their correct order when called by the Casting Officer. Only the member actually casting is allowed into the casting arena.

NEW

Members are to enter the casting arena in their correct order when called by the Call Up Marshall. Only the member actually casting is allowed into the casting arena.

3.2.6 Permission to Cast

Delete the word 'starter' and insert 'Call Up Marshall'. Correct the spelling error 'signalled', delete the words via a flag sign .

OLD

No cast shall be made until permission is given by the Call Up Marshall who shall wait until the all clear is signalled by the markers and has replied with the same signal before giving the permission to markers via a flag sign. Any defaulter of this rule shall not be credited with a score for that cast.

NEW

No cast shall be made until permission is given by the 'Call Up Marshall' who shall wait until the all clear is signalled by the markers and has replied with the same signal before giving the permission to markers. Any defaulter of this rule shall not be credited with a score for that cast.

Call up is done by the Call Up Marshall, radios are used in lieu of flags which haven't been used in years

3.2.9 Markers to Signal All Clear

Delete the words 'starter' and 'by raising the red flag' last sentence The markers may stop casting in an emergency by raising the red flag.

OLD

Markers are to move clear of the accuracy target area or out of the "V" court and when ready, signal the "All Clear" to the starter. The markers may stop casting in an emergency by raising the red flag.

Markers are to move clear of the accuracy target area or out of the "V" court and when ready, signal the "All Clear" to the Call Up Marshall. The markers may stop casting in an emergency.

3.2.10 Safety of Markers and Others

Delete the word MUST and replace it with SHALL.

Delete the first sentence of the third paragraph. Any caster wishing to use a pendulum or backwards style casting action, must notify the Dry Casting Officer prior to commencement of any dry casting event. This is because many casters are now using this method or a variation of it to cast.

OLD

By the nature of the sport, care must be exercised when casting. The caster MUST ensure the arena is clear and no persons are in or potentially going to move into an area where they may be in danger from his cast. This includes the area behind and adjoining to the caster performing pendulum type casts.

Markers shall pay special attention when casts are about to be made. Markers must stand to the side of the target area in accuracy events, not behind, and shall stand perfectly still while the cast is being made.

Any caster wishing to use a pendulum or backwards style casting action, must notify the Dry Casting Officer prior to commencement of any dry casting event.

There shall be two (2) markers for each event.

NEW

By the nature of the sport, care must be exercised when casting. The caster SHALL ensure the arena is clear and no persons are in or potentially going to move into an area where they may be in danger from his cast. This includes the area behind and adjoining to the caster performing pendulum type casts.

Markers shall pay special attention when casts are about to be made. Markers must stand to the side of the target area in accuracy events, not behind, and shall stand still while the cast is being made.

There shall be two (2) markers for each event.

3.3.9 Accuracy Targets

Delete the sizes for the single handed accuracy target and replace with 500 mm diameter and 300 mm high.

The Double Handed Accuracy target shall consist of a cone with a base a 500 mm diameter and a height of 300 mm. The cone shall be made of tin plate and must be a distinctive colour (fluorescent pink). The target shall be mounted on a steel locating peg and supported at the cone apex. The locating peg shall be driven into the ground until the cone

base lightly touches the ground to allow the measuring tape (stretched from a ring at the locating peg) to slide under the cone.

For Single Handed Accuracy, the target shall consist of a cone 600 mm diameter and height of 200 mm.

NFW

The Double Handed Accuracy target shall consist of a cone with a base a 500 mm diameter and a height of 300 mm. The cone shall be made of tin plate and must be a distinctive colour (fluorescent pink). The target shall be mounted on a steel locating peg and supported at the cone apex. The locating peg shall be driven into the ground until the cone base lightly touches the ground to allow the measuring tape (stretched from a ring at the locating peg) to slide under the cone.

For Single Handed Accuracy, the same target cones shall be used as for Double Handed Accuracy.

The DHA cone has now been in use for SHA for several years and reduces the need for additional equipment to be taken and recovered on casting days. SHA is not a State or National event in Dry Casting. SHA events are only cast by SCAC.

3.4.4 Open Events

Delete this clause as it is no longer used.

OLD

There will be four (4) Open Casting events of the following:

Two (2) Open 112 grams level line distance events.

Two (2) Open Single Handed level line distance events.

These events are carried out during the competition year. Members will have two (2) casts in each event.

3.6.2 Scoring of Level Line Distance Casts

In the second sentence of the second paragraph delete the words "The distance is to be rounded to the nearest whole number using 0.5 m as the changeover i.e. 72.5 m is read as as 72 metres". Also delete the last paragraph as no score bord is used and this method of scoring Juniors is no longer used.

OLD

To score full points, the weight cast must come to rest in the "V" court marked by ropes and/or flags. For 56 gram and 112 gram level line the weight must remain attached to the line, and for 112 gram Artificial Bait, the weight and dowel must both remain attached to the line. Any cast which comes to rest outside the "V" court receives zero score, however for Juniors and Mini Juniors a penalty loss of ten (10) metres is imposed.

The distance of the cast shall be the measurement from the base line to the point where the weight finishes. The distance is to be rounded off to the nearest whole number using 0.5 metres as the changeover, i.e. 72.5 metres is read as 73 metres, 72.4 metres is read as 72 metres.

After each cast, the distance in metres shall be shown on the scoreboard provided. Should a penalty for a Junior or Mini Junior be incurred it shall be signified by the letter "P".

NEW

To score full points, the weight cast must come to rest in the "V" court marked by ropes and flags. For 56 gram and 112 gram level line the weight must remain attached to the line, and for 112 gram Artificial Bait, the weight and dowel must both remain attached to the line. Any cast which comes to rest outside the "V" court receives zero score, however for Juniors and Mini Juniors a penalty loss of ten (10) metres is imposed.

This is because a laser measuring device is used and is far more accurate and can record to 3 significant figures.

3.6.3 Distance Record Attempts.

Delete this paragraph as all casts are a potential record casts and are measured to two significant figures using a laser measuring device.

OLD

Any caster intending to attempt a distance record under AAA Rules shall advise the Dry Casting Officer who in turn will advise the markers accordingly. For record distances use a tape or laser measure and record to two decimal places e.g.: 147.83 metres.

3.6.6 Scoring of Open Events

Delete this clause as it is no longer used.

OLD

Members will have two casts in each event and only the greater distance is recorded. No accuracy is required in these events and no penalties can be incurred except those relating to miscasts. The individual score of both events is totalled to give a gross aggregate score for the competition year. For a State or National record to be claimed in an open event, the cast must be within the A.A.A. "V" court specifications as per Rule 3.5.1.

3.6.7 Overall Score for the Day.

Delete all wording following "For the level line distance events, to the end of the paragraph" OLD

The overall score for the day shall be calculated from the declared events for the day.

Double handed accuracy event (except Mini Juniors will have Single handed accuracy event 4 Casts)
Level line 112 gram (max) 2 Casts
Level line Artificial bait 2 Casts
Level line 56 gram (max) 2 Casts

For accuracy events the points scored shall be added.

For level line distance events, the length of the two casts in metres will be added, divided by 10 and rounded to the nearest whole number to give the points for the level line distance event.

This system has not been used for a number of years.

NEW

The overall score for the day shall be calculated from the declared events for the day.

Double handed accuracy event (except Mini Juniors will have Single handed accuracy event 4 Casts)
Level line 112 gram (max) 2 Casts
Level line Artificial bait 2 Casts
Level line 56 gram (max) 2 Casts

For accuracy events the points scored shall be added.

For level line distance events, the length of the two casts in metres will be added.

Scores are calculated on a % basis for each event.

This is based on the longest cast being 100% and then all other scores are calculated as a % of that score. The same process is used for accuracy scores when all 8 casts are summed and the highest score is 100% and all other scores are calculated as a % of that score.

3.7.4 Unauthorised Practice Cast

Delete this clause as practice casting on the day is not permitted.

OLD

A practice cast after start of the competition when not authorised by the Dry Casting Officer shall void the next cast. Refer to Rule 3.2.1 Practice Casting.

3.7.6 Dry Casting Officer's Discretion

OLD

A Caster may be allowed to have another cast should there be any doubts about that cast in the opinion of the Dry Casting Officer of the day or his Appointed Assistant. For example, an accuracy cast for which the marker did not see where the weight landed; or if another person or animal inadvertently shifted the weight or dragged the weight out of the "V" court by accidentally catching the line etc.

NEW

A competitor may be allowed to have another cast, should there be in the opinion of the Dry Casting Officer of the day or his Appointed Assistant, any doubts about the cast in question. This decision shall be at the sole discretion of the Dry Casting Officer.

3.8.1 Top Ten Casters

Delete this paragraph and replace it with the alternative wording.

OLD

To determine the Top Ten for each competition year, the monthly scores of each caster shall be accumulated by the addition of the member's top eleven (11) casting day totals. This addition shall show each member's progressive score for the competition year.

NEW

To determine the Champion Caster for each competition year, the monthly scores of each caster shall be accumulated by the addition of the member's best eight (8) monthly casting day totals. This addition shall show each member's progressive score for the competition year.

3.8.2 Caster of the Year points.

Delete this paragraph in its entirety as it is no longer used to calculate caster of the year.

3.8.3 Attendance Points.

Delete this paragraph in its entirety as it is no longer used or recorded.

3.8.4 Club Record Cast at a State (or National) Event.

Amend the clause to include the word National in the title and in the body of the text.

OLD

If a member of the Club betters an existing Club Record whilst casting in a State Event, the cast shall be deemed a Club Record provided the member has nominated the Surf Casting and Angling Club in the registration form for the event.

NEW

If a member of the Club betters an existing Club Record while casting at a State or National event, the cast shall be deemed a Club Record provided the member has nominated as a member of the Surf Casting and Angling Club on the Nomination form for the event."

4.2 Photographs

OLD

Photographs of fish must be supplied with the application, showing side elevation of fish with ruler or object of known size for size comparison. The photograph must be taken so that the fish fills the photograph. Colour and fin size of scale fish and shark must be clearly shown.

NEW

Any application for a club record must be accompanied with several clear full frame photographs of the fish. Photographs of fish need to be taken <u>as soon as possible</u> after capture. Try to get good light on the subject (the fish). <u>Fill the frame</u>. For identification purposes the recorder needs to have clear focussed pictures of just the fish. The more fish in the frame, the less distractions. Photograph the capture against a neutral background that is in contrast to the fish.

After capture keep the fish moist and cool and flat. Lay the fish out straight with the dorsal pectoral and tail fins spread out as when the fish is swimming. in some species and fin colour and shape is important.

Other points to consider include;

Place the tape measure or ruler you use to measure the fish dimensions close to the fish

Place the fish in a position so that there are no shadows falling on the fish when you photograph it.

Photograph the fish from directly above..

Use a shutter speed 1/125th of a second or faster. This will help eliminate camera shake

If fish is very thick through the body then focus half way through the fish. Use the tail as the focus point.

4.7 Line Breaking Strain Tests

Delete " or the method shall be the wet strength test using the recognised sand method." And the second and third paragraphs of this section.

OI D

A 5 metre sample of the line used for the capture must be supplied with the application for breaking strain tests. Electronic line testing may be used for breaking strain tests, or the method of testing shall be the wet strength test using the recognised sand method. The line being tested shall have (3) equal sections selected from it. Each section shall be wrapped around a 100 mm diameter support such that the line does not cross, and support a bucket or similar container. Dry sand is then poured into the sand container until the line parts. The weight of the bucket / container shall then be weighed and the results recorded. The average for the three (3) tests shall be calculated to give the breaking strain of the line.

With each test the line shall be wrapped evenly around both support bar and sand container handle with the ends of the line taped. At no time shall any knots be tied in the line, nor shall the line at any point cross. Each section of the line being tested shall measure 500 mm from underside of the support bar to the top of the sand container handle. Line testing shall be carried out by the Club Recorder and one other senior member.

Reasons;

- a) there is no 'recognised' sand method.
- b) it is not accurate and can vary by 20%
- c) there are too many variables in this method of testing.

NEW

A 5 metre sample of the line used for the capture must be supplied with the application for breaking strain tests. Electronic line testing may be used for breaking strain tests.

Whether natural or synthetic material, the line class shall be determined by the 'wet strength' of the line and shall be tested on a Certified Line Testing Machine. Line testing for claims shall be conducted in accordance with the Australian Standard - Fishing Line - Determination of breaking load AS4470 -1997, with the exception of paragraph 9 – Number of tests. In relation to paragraph 9 – Number of tests, conducted, at least three (3) single valid tests on each sample provided.

Note: A Certified Machine shall mean: 'A testing machine that conforms to the requirements as laid down by the Standards Association of Australia, Code SAA 2193- 1978 'Methods for the Calibration and Grading of Force Measuring Systems of Testing Machines" 'and has a current Certificate of Accuracy.

Line testing shall be carried out by the Club Recorder or a person nominated by the Committee and one other senior.
