Members of the Fish Records Council of W.A. addressed the Club on the aims and policies of the Council.

#### FIELD DAY - Fallingup - 16th/17th April 1960.

Conditions, South East winds, slight ocean swell which made conditions excellent for the angler. 24 members made the journey to Yallingup. Several visitors and Juniors also made the trip. Quite a few members took the chance to show their wives the beautiful but rugged coastline.

The Herring were really jumping, and all the bays and headlands were occupied with many anglers pulling out Herring two at a time. Ron Shirley mentioned that he had caught over a 100 on the first day of the holidays. Ray Porter also had an army ice box packed tight with Herring and John Bellman also had a nice haul. It was pleasing to see John back with us on the Field Days.

Soon after our arrival the club sign was placed in position and names taken and entered in the Attendance Book. The signal to commence the field day was given at 3.30 p.m., and the members disappeared in their vehicles to their favourite haunts along the beaches. Smith's beach was the most popular area, as several Salmon catches had been reported here recently.

Charlie Crouch's party, Bob Tichbon, Keith Martin and Bob's Wife Pat, Norm Giles, Phil Neri, Bob Tucker and myself also walked around to this beach. Soon everone were casting far and wide. However the Salmon were conspicuous by their absence on this evening. The large lumps of seawed that came floating by made fishing difficult, and shortly after 10 p.m., we moved back to the cars with the intention of making a very early start on the following a.m., Came early d. wn and Phil Neri had us out of bed in no time and still half asleep we stumbled along to the edge of Torpedoe Rocks. We soon had the Herring milling around our feet, and it was grand sport juggling the wriggling Herring up the

rocks to where we managed to place them in the bag. I might add that for everyone that we landed safely four or five were lost in transit.

Soon it was time for the weigh in so we returned to the camping area to wait for the catches to arrive. Bob Jensen arrived with his face beaming with pleasure at his  $7\frac{1}{4}$  lbs Salmon. Most of the other members had Herring to weigh in.

Arthur Grocock arrived and introduced himself to the lads and when he opened his bag there was a gasp of admiration at his haul of Skippies which averaged over  $2\frac{1}{2}$  lbs each. Arthur then mentioned that Doug Edward had caught a 10 lbs Salmon and later when Doug Arrived the fish weighed 9 lbs cleaned. Doug mentioned that the Salmon had had two Herring inside its stomach only partly digested. Doug was very pleased with his catch and offered us all a beer on the strength of it.

Bert Payne arrived with a nice bag of Herring and informed us that the Salmon had come through a week earlier when hig hauls had been made at Bunker's Bay. Then Bert whipped but his camera and took some snaps of the lads who were all sporting good beards.

Though we recorded only 100 lbs of fish, most of the lads had doubled that total on the previous day, andali members had plenty of fish to take home. Alan Egan tried hard to catch the biggest shark ever, but had the misfortune to be bitten off twice.

On Sunday a party of members met Arthur Grocock who showed them the Bunkers Bay and Rocky Point areas, where, I have since heard they all made good hauls of fish. This was jolly decent of Arthur and I offer him my sincere thanks.

So closed another happy field day. It sure was a great experience to visit the Yallingup area and to see the many members closely associating with one another. This is how the Club's spirit is maintained and friendship kept up. Msny thanks to all those who helped me on the field day. Hope to see you all on the next one. Till then good fishing.

#### DRY CASTING - 24th APRIL 1960.

Only 15 members turned up for the final day of the current dry casting competition at Floreat Park Oval on April 24th, but, as the placings for the President's Trophy were already assured, and as it was a long weekend, this was not surprising. The promised wet weather did not eventuate, and all enjoyed a mild autumn day with a slight to fresh Sou-Wester.

The programme commenced with the Bait Level Line Handicap and resulted in a tie between Nick Crouch and Bob Jensen, each with an average of 91 yds, handicap 65, for a total of 156. Both will have their handicaps reduced by 6 yds. Snow Tate was next with 78-70-148, followed by Kevin Hawker 77-70-147. Longest casts were made by Noel Knight (110) and Alan Livesey (108) yds.

Best averages, Noel Knight (107) and Doug Edward (100). A break-Off (that nearly went out of the oval) by Bob Tucker and a blow-up by Alan Livesey, showed that these two casters were really trying.

Heavy scoring on the 75 yd target by Kevin Hawker enabled him to easily win the Bait Accuracy Event with a total of 29 points. Noel Knight (22) was second, (he failed to score only with his last cast), followed by Nick Crouch (19). Nick is getting a real danger with his Penn Surfmaster! A possible was scored in this event - Bob Tucker hit the disc with his first throw at 45 yds. Three casters, Doug Edward, Alan Livesey and Bob Jensen, each scored with all four shots.

A fairly strong cross wind mitigated against good scoring in the S.H. Blob Accuracy Event. The winner, Bob Tucker, only scoring 17 out of a possible 40. Bob Jensen was second, followed by Les Shand (13). Five members tied for the honour of closest to the target, Bob Jensen, Nick Crouch, Ron Flood, Les Shand and Bob Tucker, each within 2 ft of the disc. No one scored with all four shots.

Thanks to decreased competition and new oil in his Surfmaster,
Bob Jensen took the honours for the day with 26 points, followed
by Nick Crouch (24) and Kevin Hawker(23). (Bob is being unduly
modest about his consistent and accurate casting. Ed).

As anticipated, Noel Knight 282 points, took off the President's Trophy from Doug Edward 251, and Bob Tucker 247. Congratulations Noel, that makes three in a row, and convincing proof that you are our Champ! To show how close the points were for second place, if Bob Tucker had not had a break-off with his third cast in the Bait Level Line and reached a distance of only 60 yds, he would have displaced Doug Edward from 2nd position, the same as he filled last year. Congratulations to both Doug and Bob for their fine efforts.

In the Children's Event, the S.H. Blob Accuracy over 25 yds Lyn Crouch (with some assistance from Dad) took first place, Malcolm Wright was the only other one to score.

Summing up the performances over the last twelve months, our average attendance over the 10 casting days was 29. Quite a good percentage for our club, but one that can be improved. The longest casts made were:-

WHY LOSE THOSE BIG FISH?

PART 11.

In our last issue I dealt with the incorrect use of gear and will now pass on to faulty and unbalanced gear.

A continual check must be made on all an angler's equipment, particularly the rod, reel, lines and hooks. Rod runners and tips should be examined for any grooves, which can be removed with a small piece of emory paper, or if too deep, replaced with new ones. Runner bindings if kept properly covered with varnish do not tend to fray or become damaged.

All phases of reel care and maintenance have been fully covered in articles and lectures in the past and do not require comment here, but I would stress that only by keeping your reel in first class condition can you hope to beach your fish without any trouble.

Nylon lines have been manufactured to stand a great deal of strain and abuse and do not require a great deal of attention, but they should occasionally be unwound and washed in fresh water ar examined for any flaws which may develop.

The low price of present day lines in relation to the work they perform, makes their replacement preferable to losing a fish or losing too much line to continue fishing. Nylon lines have remarkable stretchability, but if continually stretched until they break, they do not have the elasticity to completely regain their original diameter. In time, this results in loss of the lines potential breaking strain and often a line will break without being subjected to any great strain.

I have found that this weakness seems to invariably develop in the vicinity of where the line is tied to the hooks and it is a good idea when tying on your hooks to test the line, and dispense with any line which seems to be faulty.

Hooks should be kept sharp, and if rusty discarded. If you are using ganged hooks pay careful attention to see that your hooks are secure and not liable to come apart while playing a fish.

Balanced gear plays an important part in all angling according to the type of fish you wish to pursue. A number of our members specialise in seeking certain fish and it can save a lot of trial and error trying to select the correct equipment if these members advice is sought before purchasing gear which is not suitable for the purpose.

Our most experienced members have, by means of lectures based on their own successes and mistakes, made it an easy matter for newer members who are less experienced to select the correct equipment.

The main point is to select your rod and reel in relation to the breaking strain of your line and to restrict the weight of your sinkers sufficient to cast and maintain your bait in the area selected.

As an example using a threadline reel and 12 lbs breaking strain line, I would suggest a 120 Slazenger or a No 3 Southam rod with a sinker range of 2 to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  ozs, although in the case of an inexperienced angler, it is not wise to exceed  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ozs to avoid the rod taking a set.

Hollow glass or solid glass rods are impervious to set and will stand a cast with a large range of sinker weights.

Finally a few words on the loss of fish due to fraying of line on rocks and the hooks being bitten off by sharks. Most anglers do not favour the use of wire due to it kinking and breaking, but I find if the wire is covered with plastic tubing

A. Professor Same, A. A. Data Tensor 原面和意义 it remains pliable and will not kink. I believe that this type of lead attached to swivels can now be purchased in tackle shops.

Piano wire is favoured by some anglers and the only fault seems to be that is susceptible to rusting. The use of a heavy leader does tend to reduce the risk of line fraying to a certain a sha sa sali Beli jung sang pala salah sa pala degree.

In conclusion, most anglers have fixed ideas on their own methods of angling, and my only reason for writing these articles is to give the newer members a basis to work on calculated on my own experiences over a number of years and the help and generous assistance I have received from the older members of the club.

If these articles only assist a few in the club to more successful fishing and a better understanding of their gear, I will feel amply repaid for the time spent putting my thoughts on paper. omening space gallace for the "Capt Cook".
