DRY CASTING 7th April, 1963.

This being the last casting day of the 1962-63 competition, it was very pleasing to see 21 members, 3 juniors and a prospective member present. This is the largest number we have had on a last day for several years, and no one there could have been disappointed as Bob Tucker and Noel Knight staged a keen tussle right to the finish and at first glance it appeared as though Noel had managed to hold his lead but it was not to be, as when the scores had been finally tallied up Bob was one point in front of Noel. Congratulations Bob and Noel, it was an excellent effort by both of you. Bob Lilly managed to hold off Ron Kildahl and take third place. Good going Bob. In the Open, Bill Bridger continued on his merry way and won convincingly. Congratulations Bill there is no doubt who the master is when it comes to the Open Distance.

Some of the best casts in the Distance were :- Bill Bridger 381 ft., Noel Knight 363ft. and Bob Lilly 348ft. The placings in this event were Ted Horsley first with 307 - 210 - 517. Alan Bunnett 324 - 140 - 464 and Ron Kildahl 306 - 155 - 461, which was very good casting. Ted's score of 517 is the highest score we have had for a long time and it will certainly make his handicap look sick.

In the Double Handed Accuracy, Noel Knight struck top form scoring 56/80 with Bob Tucker right on his heels with 52/80 and Alan Bunnett continuing his consistant form with 51/80. There were no Bulls scored but seven members scored with all four casts. Very good going.

In the Single Handed Accuracy the scoring again wasn't too good. That extra distance seems to find the weak spots and it was left to Bertie Payne to show the way with 22/40, followed closely by Noel Knight 21/40 and Bob Jensen 20/40. Noel scored a near miss and with Bob Jensen and Noel Wilkerson were the only ones to score with all four casts. Bob Jensen and Noel Knight scored with all eight casts in the accuracy events.

As will be seen by the following list of scores and final placings for the 1962 - 63 casting competition the events were all keenly contested and the placegetters have had to really earn their positions.

ADDITIONAL POINTS FOR "SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR" AWARD.

As there is to be additional points allotted to members who exceed the Accuracy and Distance Events for the "Sportsman of the Year" award the following are the Base Figures to start our first days casting in May.

Distance Event:

400 feet.

Double Handed Accuracy:

55/80 25/40

Single Handed Accuracy:

The following is an example: A competitor in the D.H. Accuracy at the end of the event scores 56/80 as top scorer for the first day gains additional points, next month the top scorer has to exceed 56 to gain additional points. As it is with the D.H. Accuracy so it is with the S.H. Accuracy and Distance Events.

FIELD DAY GARDEN ISLAND - 20TH & 21ST APRIL, 1963.

Weather conditions: South-Westerly sea breeze about 18 knots swinging more southerly later in the evening, with seas quite rough. The weather was much colder than last months Field Day although not unpleasant provided you could find some wind break. The northern beaches especially in the gun area, were heavily weeded but further North where some of the descendants of Burke and Wills found their way, was fishable in the earlier part of the evening until the weed moved along

A total attendance of 43 consisting of 32 members, 2 visitors and 9 juniors was once again a very good roll up and it was pleasing to see Ross Wilton and Bill Bridger, with son Don, along on a Field Day once again. I believe Alan Bunnett was not quite as pleased (or so he said) after he had an exciting tussle trying to gaff Bill's 70lb. Ray. Young Don also did well with 2 Tailor and a 2lb. Whiting - the only junior to record fish.

Most areas seem to yield a few fish, although not as plentiful as last month. An indication of approaching winter could be the number of Skippy caught and also the first Salmon for the year. The beaches just north of the track were eaten away and very steep and together with the soft sand made walking extremely difficult. Also the wind has eroded the sand away at the steep hill at the end of the track and it was that steep I ended up crawling up on my hands and knees.

The most productive area was the second bay north where Ron Kildahl and Ron Shirley won the heaviest bag and heaviest scale fish respectively. Ron Kildahl's six Tailor included one beauty of 51b. and he also battled and defeated a 451b. Ray and whe smaller. The Salmon landed by Ron Shirley was an extremely unusual shape being very short and fat. At first glance it looked to be about a 12 pounder but as everyone knows our scales never lie. This fish also knocks off Ian Brown's Kingie in Section 2 which has stood since last November.

Norm Clark fished the same area for a good bag of 6
Tailor and it was noticable that his casting improved
considerably with the new Penn he is trying out. Incidently
someone remarked they thought it was a mortar bomb exploding
when Norm's wires sinkers hit - when they are put, they stay

put don't they Norm?

Joe Strange journeyed South to the rocks and his effort of a nice 31b. Tailor and a 31b. Whiting was certainly commendable from an area which is difficult enough to fish at any time. The walking types mentioned earlier were not rewarded as well as previously for their considerable effort, although Bob Lilly included a 32b. Skippy in his bag to win Section 8. Ted Savage, Bob Tucker, Jerry Windus and Tom Smith all fished the same area together with a few other members for varying bags, mostly Tailor. George Greenham dragged Noel Wilkerson about 22 miles further North again, to catch 12 Herring and a Whiting between them. Speaking of Herring Phil Neri also returned a nice bag of Herring weighing 81b.

A shrill whistle blast about 4 a.m. had everyone wide awake in the hut and although I copped considerable abuse at the time, I think most of the chaps got cut of their warm beds to give it a go once they were awake. However our members were not the only ones to abuse me that morning, for when Norm and I were returning from the beach, we came on a hut with a bed propped across the doorway and a Quokka (or Tammin) trapped inside. We released him only to cop said abuse from some University bods who were collecting these animals to take back for study.

So ended the last Field Day for the current competition and it has certainly been an excellent year what with attendance records broken again and again and a total bag of 2,4581b. of Scale Fish as against 1,6281b. in 1961-62. Altogether 78 out of a total of 104 members attended at least one Field Day during the year. Congratulations to the various award winners both on the Field Days and in the competition itself, you certainly earned them. A special mention to shutterbug Backhouse with his efforts on behalf of our album - your patience trying to pose this bunch Arthur must have been sorely tried.

Transporting all the gear from the hut to the jetty became quite hazardous, for Jim Hawkins informed us that the footbrake on the truck was completely in-effective and asked for volunteer driver. Bill Bridger stepped up and away we went but on arriving at the end of the jetty Bill headed for a soft sandy spot and there we stopped. When asked "What about backing out along the jetty?" Bill replied "Not B - likely!"

While waiting on the jetty for the boat home some of the boas who have never had enough hauled out their hand-lines to have some sport with the Bluies. It certainly was on, with the Mackeral

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biting mad and an occassional Sampson fish to liven things up. I would also like to mention the excellent handling of gear this trip. With everyone pulling their weight it's on and off with a minimum of time and effort.

Boat timetables are yet to be finalised for the May Field Day but it appears that the winter timetable will operate with 9.30 a.m. and 2.0 p.m. departure from Palm Beach. ANGLING ASPECTS ON BEACH FISHING.

The newer members to the thrills and frustrations of our favourite pastime must at times be over come with the many aspects of beach fishing and to finding the answers to the many problems that occur and wonder if they will ever sort them all out and be able to come up with the right answer at the right time.

Admittedly there are many and it would take a far braver pen than mine to try and enumerate them all and to give the right answer. But angling from the beach is not just for wizards or the learned, especially these days with the advent of such good gear, easily procurable and reasonably priced as with information to problems so readily obtainable to Club Members simply by inquiring to a more experienced member for an answer to your problem. After all, that is one of the reasons why you are in the Club. To find answers to your problems which will help and make your angling more interesting and enjoyable.

The novice beach angler should never be undaunted through the lack of knowledge, for the best of our Club members with the angling reputations were themselves novices at one stage or another and I'm sure that I can state in all confidence that it was only be enquiring and practical experience on the beach and fishing with mates, talking and experimenting with tackle, and rigs that have given them the knowledge that they have now. Mostly it was experimenting and experience. By joining an angling Club the novice of course can take a short cut to learning

simply by inquiring.

The right kind of gear is of paramount importance for all types of angling and of course from the beach is no exception. Generally a Medium Glass or Split Cane rod, capable of lifting a three or four ourse sinker, which will give distance casting with minimum effort and enable the angler to feel the lightest touch appears to be the popular choice of rods generally used in fishing the surf beach. Not only is it desirable for its ability but also for the fact that there is nothing more fatiguing than the constant and at times continual holding up of a heavy rod. A rod too light when beach fishing also has its problems i.e. weed etc. Though of course the lighter we fish the more interesting it becomes.

The line breaking strain to be used can be worked out on the following ratio of allowing 1 oz. to every five or six 1bs. of breaking strain i.e. a three ounce sinker would be suggested for a breaking strain line of from 15 to 18 lb. A light line gives many advantages for it reduces the drag caused by wind currents and wash and enable lighter bites to be felt.

The type of reel to be used of course is governed by the type of rod, line and sinker and is I feel sure self explanatory without further elaboration on my part.

The style of rig or hooks to be used play a leading role in angling and I am sure that the novice makes many mistakes by using too small a hook or rig, for the small hook will tend to pull away or open out when the pressure goes on. Though of course many a good fish has been caught on light hooks. Naturally small hooks are used for small fish. Silver Bream, Whiting etc. which are in abundance during summer months. So it necessarily follows that one should use the type or size of hooks and rigs of the type of fish one is angling for or hope that his big brother will take. A good motto as far as I am concerned is the Boy Scouts "Be prepared"

When fishing for Tailor, Salmon, Mulloway etc. I would advocate a good solid type of hook. Tailor can be very savage on hooks and if you are into them - who wants to stop and change rigs because of a bent, spread or distorted hook. Mulloway have large mouths and will readily take a good size rig. One of 5 or 61b. you can put your hand into quite easily. So why take the risk of missing him by not having enough hook. One can almost say "spare the hook and loose the fish" though of course reason must be taken into consideration as to size of hooks and rigs to be used.

Line capacity on your reel is a most important aspect, for who knows when the larger one will bend your rod and make your drag scream. So always make sure that you have ample reserve of line on your reel as that extra big one will eventually come along and to have the mortification of seeing the last of your line go out to sea or hear the crack of it breaking is a feeling that no angler wishes to be reminded of. For general beach fishing a line breaking strain of between 15 to 241b. is suggested and allows a lot of latitude.

The weight of your sinker of course is governed by your rod, line and reel, though the type to be used is a matter which suits the individual, though I would recommend the Star type for when the surf is brisk and there is quite a fair drift, though a slight drift can be to your advantage but not too much for it is no fun galloping along the beach catching up with it or getting tangled with mates

fishing next to you. But when there is little or no drift or when fishing in rocky waters the spoon type sinker is suggested. This can be retrieved by taking in all slack line, giving a good jerk which brings the spoon to the surface and retrieving rapidly.

Whether you use a running rig, i.e. a sinker that moves freely along the line or a fixed rig i.e. a sinker that is secured to the bottom of the line with the hooks on a rig above it, is a matter of choice. A running sinker i.e. one that has the hooks or rig below the weight, appears to be very popular with most members and is in all probability the most extensively used type of rig locally.

The most popular bait appears to be Mulies for Tailor, Mulloway etc., although of course when fishing for other types of fish, Herring, Whiting, Skipjack, Silver Bream etc. the bait position in relation to type of fish to be caught will vary. But for the general beach fishing when Mulies are unobtainable, which does happen periodically, the good old Mullet is a good stand-by bait, which stops on the hooks and is quite easily

preserved by various methods.

It is suggested when fishing the surf to stand as close to the water as possible so as to keep the line out of the drag of the waves or alternatively if there is a sharp drop down to the waters edge to stand high up in the elevated position so keeping the line out of the surf as much as possible and so enabling the lightest touch to be felt. When your fish is on the hook on no account move backwards up the beach, for after all the main thing you have in mind is to get as close to that fish as possible, to the extent of getting him on the sand beside you, so allow the rod and line to do the work for you. A decent sized fish will tire soon enough if you give it enough line to drag through the water and which is far more sporting and enjoyable than trying to pull his head off and after all that is one of the reasons why we have two or three hundred yards of line and a drag on our reel.

It is generally considered that morning and evening or the best times for surf fishing and you will envaribly hear this one or that one say you should fish at so-and-so phase of the moon or not to fish at this phase but I would suggest that most of such advice is nonsence because outstanding catches have been made with the moon at all phases. If there is movement of the waves causing the bottom to be

stirred, Tailor, Mulloway etc. will be looking for bait fish etc. One can expect the lowest ebb in fishing when the sea is a dead flat calm, as there is no incentive for a fish to stop at any particular spot.

As it is with phases of the moon, so also it is with the tides. It would in any case be a poor old time for the angler if he could only fish at particular tides. Except of course if you are fishing at an estuary where it is understanable that as the tide follows out, prawns, whitebait etc. run with it and there could be fish waiting to feed on them which would be a logical state of tide and place to fish.


Though there does not appear to be a definate rule as to places to fish the following can be taken for what it is worth and that is? that gutters and channels are places of interest for it is in such that small bait fish come to feed and it follows that if there is bait fish the possibility of large fish frequenting these places can be contemplated. Fish are invariably where you find them and I would not like to state any laid down rule as to how or where. As a matter of fact I could do with some of that information myself. Finding fishing spots are also a matter of logic and experience as is most aspects of our piscatorial pastime. The short cut to this knowledge is to choose and try to go fishing with mates in the Club who have this experience. Only don't look at the Editor of Reel Talk for he either walks past the "hot spots" or he doesn't walk far enough or else goes at the wrong time. I don't know how I do it but I easily manage to miss out. The next time I go fishing I'm going with "Jack" Backhouse and "Knocker" Wiggins who are two of the reputable anglers I mentioned, I only wish that I had been at the Murchison when with a gallery of learner anglers around them they hooked and worked their Spanish Mackeral to the gaff and instructed their four pupils on the whys and wherefores of the finer aspects of angling. I'm very sorry that I missed out on these lessons and I feel sure that I have a lot of leeway to make up now for it is not everyone who can be lectured while on the jeb by such learned anglers as "Jack" and "Knocker". Both these thoroughly modest members are likely to chastice me for mentioning them but I'm sure that deep down under their hearts of stone they really won't mind.
