It was resolved that \$20 be forwarded to N.S.W. towards the trophies for the 1973 Australian Championships.

The remainder of the evening was taken up with reports and minor business. The meeting ended around 11.30 p.m.

Both Club Delegates were in attendance.

CONCLUSION OF 1972/73 DRYCASTING YEAR:

For the conclusion of the '72/73 drycasting year, the weather turned on its "usual" fine display and with the competition reasonably close, many casters were there early to indulge in vigorous practise. The Immediate Past President, in a display of such vigour, took care of one caster for the day when he lopped the top off that casters rod, thereby removing one of the opposition. All dry casters are warned in future to either cast on "Killers" left, or 50' away from him on his right.

LEVEL LINE: With conditions so good, very few casters incurred B.O's or 3 penalties, with two not able exceptions— the Club Recorder and the D.C.O., both recording 3 penalties, together with a Junior in MARK TUCKER, whose feet got in the way. The only B.O. for the morning was RALPH LERCH, whose feet didn't get in the way.

Results of this event proved most interesting with D. "TRUMP" GREEN and L. REID casting very well for 39, G. HOLMAN 38, D.C.O. and RUDY LERCH 37; and with an egg beater, a consistent B. LEICESTER followed closely with 36.

The annual competition was clearly won by G. HOLMAN with 436 points, followed closely by B. LEICESTER 425, D.C.O. with 413, President 410 and D. LATTO 384. Interesting to see two of those people who are regular egg beater exponents, namely Latto and Leicester- the terrible twins.

D.H. ACCURACY: The weather played its part in contributing to some good scores once again which have been lacking from previous months with RUDY LERCH taking this event off with a fine 63, followed by D.C.O. with a finer 60, and then we have a Junior, D. TAYLOR with 58, along with another Junior, G. RENSHAW equal 4th with L. REID., scoring 55 points.

The competition for the year was in doubt until the end of the day's event. R. KILDAHL won this event, after some unethical removal of opposition as mentioned previously, with an average from 11 appearances of 47, giving him a total for the year of 527, B. LEICESTER 2nd with 498, followed by D.C.O. 494, and then G. HOLMAN and D. LATTO.

S.H. ACCURACY: At this stage, it gives a club officer considerable pride and great pleasure in referring to the performances of Juniors, with particular reference to the fine D.H. performance mentioned before of D. TAYLOR and G. RENSHAW. A Junior, following on the footsteps of his father, who has been one of the club's greatest casters, MARK TUCKER, not only took off this event for the day, but took it off in grand style with a score of 31, which is the highest single handed score for this casting year. Congratulations Mark.

It is interesting to note that the highest score in this event last casting year was made by Mark's father, Bob, a record score of 35 out of 40.

Second to Mark in this event was R. KILDAHL with 28, followed by a comparative newcomer in GUS SUSSMEYAR, then a comparative old member in JIM OXLEY with 24, and "ROCK COD" GREEN, fifth with 23.

In the early stages of the competition, delicate experise was used to its maximum by yours truly to allow D.C.O. to take off this event for the year with 237. Most consistent B. LEICESTER followed closely with 231, RUDY LERCH 225, RICK SULLIVAN 219 and G. HOLMAN 215.

The last casting day of the year was fittingly won by D.C.O. with 128 followed by one of our most regular members, J. OXLEY 120 with a Junior, G. RENSHAW 118, RUDY LERCH 116, L. REID 115 and another junior, D. TAYLOR 113 and D. GREEN 112.

D.H. OPEN: The day was concluded with the D.H. Open and D.C.O., was lucky enough to put down the longest cast of the day with 454, to enable him to take off the event for the year with 1736 points, 150 points ahead of RUDY LERCH in 2nd place.

FINAL TOP TWENTY: The struggle to overhaul B. LEICESTER, who had established himself as a caster of considerable merit, ended with D.C.O. getting within 10 points. Brian, who unfortunately missed 3 months last year, showed considerable prowess during the remaining 9 months, to indicate he would be a contender for this award. About half-way through the season he established himself as a clear leader by climbing over all before him, including D.C.O., and was never headed. So Brian finishes on top of the Top Twenty with 1274 points, an average of 106, followed by D.C.O. in 2nd place with 1264 points and then comes G. HOLMAN with 1239, RUDY LERCH 1178, D. LATTO 1172 and R. KILDAHL 1114. It is interesting to note that G. RENSHAW, a Junior, finished 14th in the Top Twenty with 892 from 10 attendances.

At a meeting at some stage last year, the then D.C.O. had a suggested "Caster of the Year" competition endorsed by a large majority of members at that General Meeting. Under this system the caster winning this award is truly the caster of the year. It is my privilege, as D.C.O., to amounce that the "Caster of the Year", was none other than BRIAN LEICESTER, who, having won the overall competition and having come second in D.H. Accuracy, S.H. Accuracy and Level Line, and having come 4th in the S.H. Open and D.H. Open, has amassed a total of 26 points. Congratulations Brain from myself and my assistant, and we feel sure that Brian's fine example of skill and sportsmanship has enabled him to win this award.

Second placegetter in this award, who was also second in the Top Twenty, was D.C.O. with a total of 25 points. Third in this award was G. HOLMAN 23 points.

These 3 were clear leaders to RUDY LERCH 14, R. KILDAHL 10, D. LATTO 9, PRESIDENT $8\frac{1}{2}$, ASST.D.C.O. $5\frac{1}{2}$, B. TUCKER 5, B. UTTING 2, J. OXLEY 1 and L. REID 1.

This concludes the competition for the year 1972/73 and before winding this particular report up, I would like to take the opportunity of thanking all those people who assisted in setting up the ground, marking and scoring. Without these people the task of D.C.O. would be quite an arduous one, but it is made a lot lighter with the assistance of these fine club members.
