STEEP POINT-REVISITED

Recently Steve Sutton suggested that we make a trip to Steep Point, and as it has been quite a while since I visited the Point I agreed to go. Frank Sutton and Bob Bartley both jumped at the opportunity to join us, so the crew was set. The next problem was getting approval from my wife Pat. She agreed after several promises of all the jobs I would do when I return (These promises all fade with time). Over the next week we got everything organized, and on Friday evening we set off in two vehicles. Steve's and mine.

The trip was very good and even though Steve towed his camper we had no trouble getting in. We arrived at the point about 8am Saturday morning when we arrived we were pleased to find there were only 2 other camps, both parties were leaving the next day. So after the first day we had the place to ourselves. After hastily setting up camp and starting the generator to keep the freezors going, we decided to put out a couple of balloons. Within 5 minutes Frank's balloon went off, and he had a hook up with a sailfish. Unfortunately after about 1 1/2 hrs the large sailfish severed the line off on a rock. We then put out balloons again. Bob caught the first Mackerel a little later on. We caught another two that day and then decided to have an early night as we were all tired from the long drive.

Early the next morning we went down to the Point spinning and caught a couple of Spanish and one Shark Mackerel. Later in that day the balloons proved to be very successful as we caught eight Mackerel and two sharks. Two of the Mackerel weighted 38 lbs. The next morning was a little quieter, but we still managed 3 or 4 Spaniards. That afternoon we went to the Gibbon Hole, but only managed to catch 6 schnapper. That evening as we were short of ballooning baits we decided to fish the Sand Spit for Tailor but they did not appear so we went back to the fault line and fished for Snook. There was plently of Snook around so it did not take us long to replenish our bait supply.

Tuesday morning both Bob and I had a hook up with lures on Yellowfin Tuna. I lost mine but Bob landed his which weighed 34lbs. Steve got two Spaniards on lures and the balloons produced

some more. That evening we fished the point and caught a couple of Schnapper.

The rest of the week was much the same, a few Mackerel every day and 2-3 schnapper. On Friday morning about 4am people started to arrive and by 9am there was 6 camps set up, and it was so crowded you could not fish, so we decided to leave. While we were pulling the camp down I counted 12 balloons out from the front of the

camp.

During the week the weather although very hot on the first day was perfect the rest of the week as the breezes kept the temperature down. The trip home was uneventful and so ended a successful fishing trip, and as someone once said I shall return.


