

Hendo almost had a perfect day in the accuracy event with a 30 in the single and a 168 in the double handed accuracy which included 2 bulls eyes, I believe 168 is only 6 short of the national Record, well done Bob. Mark had a very consistent day with good scores all the way through the distance events along with 123 in the double handed accuracy. Klaus continued to cast well with 127m in the 56gr and 136m in the 112gr. In the double handed accuracy I feel a little bit more tuition is needed on the longer targets. For example his scores on one of the shorter targets was 22 and a bulls eye, the longer targets were zeros.

The next drycasting day I will not be casting but I will have the trailer there early and will need assistance on the course. A big thanks to all who participated and helped throughout the 2015/16 season and especially a big thanks to Hendo for the use of the shelter and the laser and also to Geoff Raftis for his assistance in marking the distance events.

Some excellent catches in and outside of field days got some members Masters and Grand Masters Entries, no one claimed the necessary number of catches this season for their badges but some are getting close

To wrap things up Sri Srigandan put in a big effort to get his species badge in a relatively short time, Well done Sri!

To top off what was already a great year, Glen Wong was fishing the Preston Beach area and landed a magnificent 22.28Kg Long Tail Tuna which I am sure gave him a great fight on conventional surf gear. This fish has become the new club record of what was previously known as "Northern Bluefin Tuna" is now recognised as the same species and called "Long Tail tuna". Glen has achieved his Gamefish Badge, Section 16 of the Open fishing competition and possibly a line class badge with this capture. We will be testing the line he used as per the competition rules in the coming days while this Reel Talk is put together so I will provide an update for the General meeting and next month's Reel Talk.

The best way to learn casting is to attend the Drycasting sessions all details in magazine.

April 2016 Field Day Report

SCAC Field Day Report: Cape to Cape, Preston, & Local 16 /17 April 2016 Overview

The April 2016 away field day was split with Cape to Cape (Busselton Jetty to the mouth of the River at Augusta) as the nominated venue and at the April General meeting was split to include Preston. The local was maintained as the standard

For the local event 3 persons fished Perth local (George Holman), and local northern beaches Pat McKeon and Dean Stewart), seven people fished Preston (Martin Wearmouth, Gary Parkinson, Glen Wong, Peet and Sandra Wessels, Mark Nurse and Sri Srigandan) with four persons fished Cape to Cape. (Victor and Slavka Schilo, George Berlin & Peter Osborne)

All venues suffered to varying degrees of swell, minor weed; a strong wind on Saturday afternoon with cool but not cold evenings and mornings

Some quality fish were caught with a total of 9 different species landed at the various venues. Salmon were the prized catch at both away locations. For the various local venues a limited number of small fish were caught

The Trip. Cape to Cape

For the away trip, Peter had a cabin booked at the Yallingup Caravan and Victor & Slavka Schilo and George Belin had accommodation at Augusta. For the Cape to Cape area weather condition included medium to strong and gusty wind on Saturday afternoon and some rain evening and following morning with a pretty good swell at both venues locations. Cool but not cold conditions for evening and early morning.

Slavka, Victor and George came away empty handed. This would have been the result of professional fishermen taking literally truckloads of salmon from this location. No doubt headed for the Cray industry as bait: very disappointing.

Peter had more success at the Yallingup and Wyderup areas. His favourite spot on the reef on the south side of Yallingup did not work well only a couple of small species – just size Tarwhine and Skippy and reef fish. However on fishing Yallingup beach, he found the Salmon. On first cast he put his rod in his rod spike turned away and immediately heard his reel go. A good Salmon, it weighed 4.11 kg cleaned. As a rough guide I use 10% add on to arrive at the true as landed weight. However this fish was absolutely stuffed full of blue sardines hence the uncleaned weight would have been closer to 5.0 kg. Peter caught 2 more salmon, but could not get his 4th. All locations he fished he was plagued with herring that immediately stripping the mulie.

Preston

While some wind and rain was encountered, conditions were not as severe as the Capes. The team of, Mark Nurse, Peet and Sandra Wessels, Glen Wong, Martin Wearmouth and Sri Srigandan went down to Preston. Peet and Sandra Wessels left the group and fished a couple of km further North at a different reef location nearer White Hills.

Unfortunately their favourite spot had already been taken by others so they moved to another spot where they found some Tailor, smaller misc. species; Whiting, Tarwhine Pike and Herring. Sandra managed to get 1 Salmon. Peet tried hard for a Mulloway with set rods and big baits but to no avail. When returning, they found that the group that had taken their favourite spot had managed to get into Salmon.

Of course Glen worked hard and hoped to repeat his previous week's capture of an outsize fish, i.e. - the 22 kg Tuna. No luck with this but Glen managed 3 solid Salmon and some Herring and Whiting. Sri fished hard and got 3 Salmon over the weekend, with 2 during the competition period, plus some Herring - one happy fisho.

Martin did a catch and release on his first Salmon, then switched to a single handed rod, and with patience and determination he landed a 2.9 kg Salmon on this outfit. A great effort – the best capture on a single handed rod for a long time.

While Gary has had some terrific success in the past with some Mulloway and Snapper at Preston, he could not duplicate this for this Field Day. He was in the wrong place for the Salmon and only managed a bag of herring

For this weekend at Preston, the success story goes to Mark. He found a couple of schools of Salmon and using live bait he got Salmon after Salmon for a release for all the 13 fish landed. He also Page 1.

caught Herring and Whiting. Of interest, we decided to upgrade the catch and release weight for fish caught and returning starting the competitive year in May. However for the current year competition the release weight is 3.5 kg, so Mark had 14.0 kg of Salmon. Using the spreadsheet, the average for those Salmon that went across the scales this weekend was close to this 3.5 kg.

Local Beaches

For the local venue, George Holman, concentrated on and fished the beaches from Cottesloe to Sorrento. He encountered flat calm conditions on Saturday afternoon and early evening, hence no Tailor. He did manage to put in his bag a Tarwhine and a Pike.

Pat McKeon and Dean Stewart went north to fish the Capricorn beach adjacent to the groin. Conditions included a northerly wind and a big swell. While they did not sign on for the field day they were joined by Bob Henderson and Geoff Raftis. Fishing was slow and for most unsuccessful, however Pat landed two Tailor with the heaviest of 0.77 kg. He was happy to take home a feed of fresh fish for him and his wife.

As have said many times before, as with Salmon fishing anywhere – the key is being at the right place at the right time. With Salmon being caught from Esperance right around to the metro area we had hoped to see more of this species at all of the venues fished. Review of the field day results gives there was mixed results. i.e. Some with good bags of Salmon, others missing out.

Fish capture results, points scored and the top ten fisherpersons, based on the current SCAC scoring system, are listed elsewhere in Reel Talk.

Fishing for Yellowtail Kingfish on Radar Reef

As a keen and fanatic fisho, one of my ultimate fishing goals was to land a decent Yellowtail Kingfish from shore. The question was where and how to go about it. The most important step in the process is ultimately to pick the right location. The answer was simple. Join a fishing club.

Now the Surfcasters have been around for many years and they knew where to find these mighty fish.

The place they took me too was on a little Island called Rottnest, more specifically to the most western side of this island is a place called Radar Reef, named after a radar station that was set up there during the Second World War.

The thing I love most about Yellowtail Kingfish fishing is the initial strike, it happens so fast and furious that it gives me a quick fright every time it happens.

Afterwards it keeps me lying awake in bed replaying the excitement over and over and then I can't wait to get back there again.



Rottnest's Radar Reef

I have decided to write this article not because I see myself as a Yellowtail Kingfish expert, but because I have had so many failures and witnessed even more failures of people trying to land a trophy King. This article is specifically written for fishing at Radar Reef for Kings and it should reveal what I personally think works the best. Some of these failures were all preventable and they mainly are due to old line with little nicks in them, poor rigging and poor dragging systems. Believe me if there are ANY faults with your gear or rigging the King will find it quickly and 9 out of 10 times you will lose.

Let's look at safety first You need to be reasonably fit and be able to walk down and up a reasonably steep goat track. This becomes rather hard work and takes a lot out of you. So plan and prepare to take only the bare necessities. Always try and buddy up with somebody and fish shoulder to shoulder with each other. It's amazing how many times a little help can be the difference between success and failure. Sometimes just a little encouragement or advice can turn the wheel in your favour. Always fish the reef on low and safe tides. Wearing of a Personal Flotation Device (PFD) is a must. Always use proper reef boots with steel spikes. A wet suit is also an important part of your armour against the elements. A proper hat and a good pair of sunglasses that covers the side of the eyes are also important equipment. Don't forget to apply sun block throughout the day, especially a good lip balm for your lips.

What gear should I use? Any 12 to 14 feet rod with a solid bottom section and a medium top section will do the job. The main thing is it should be able to lift a good fish from the top of the surf onto the ledge of the reef. There are many affordable lightweight and strong rods on the market these days. Pick a light one for the reef and always carry a spare rod close by. I have seen rods broken on every visit to the reef and it is truly a sad case if you are stranded with no backup. A wise fisho will also carry a few rod tip runners and a glue stick, this have personally saved me on a couple of occasions.

Reels are a personal choice and a much debatable subject. Personally, my reel must be robust with a smooth drag and easy to use. Remember the main method is bait casting, so you will be casting and retrieving the whole time. I use the Penn 850 SS most of the time. However it did not last the previous King encounters and I had to call in my trusty old Daiwa GS-9.

The next item is the fishing line, even more debatable. All I can say is what I have found worked the best for me. On the reef I use 15kg mono. I have grown up with Maxima and it has never disappointed me. It has all the features that I want in a fishing line and is especially robust on unforgiving reef ledges. I try and buy the Maxima Fibre Glow line whenever I can find it. It works a treat and at night it makes it so much easier to see.

I have found that the 15 kg line class certainly has enough stopping power when targeting the Kings on Radar Reef.

Be careful however not to try and overpower the King too quickly. When they fight hard for deeper water it is better to let them go for 30 or 50 meters.

Not only does it keep them higher in the water, it also takes them to friendlier water and you have much better control at 50 m than at 5 or 10m.


If they however want to play dirty and make for the huge caves under the ledge you have no choice but to be dirty and fight back hard.

Fish bigger then 5kg or so usually wins the first round and gets under and into the cave. Now if you have a line that is thick and robust enough, you might have a second chance. If this happens put your reel in free spool and take all the pressure off the line. Wait for a couple of minutes while keeping a close eye on the line. Don't be surprised to see the line starting to move to deeper water. Let the fish go until it is well and truly clear and you are on for the second round.

What rig and bait to use? You can use a floating or bait casting rig with the Mulie and Pencil Squid as my preferred baits. Bottom fishing usually ends up with a snagged up rig and can be hard to break off especially if you are fishing with heavy tackle. Spinning rigs with shiny metal lures are also very productive. It is handy to have a few available when you run out of Mulies. My biggest Yellowtail Kingfish was caught on the last cast of the day with a golden 55 gram Halco Twisty.



My rig of choice is a gang of 3 x 4/0 tarpons tied with an 80lb x 30cm leader to a rolling swivel. On top of the swivel I tie another 80lb x 80cm leader with a bean sinker (size 5 to 7) sitting on top of the swivel. I tie the end of the leader to another rolling swivel and then to my main line.

When venturing out onto the reef I always carry a good supply of these pre-made rigs in little plastic coin bags.

It is important to make sure your rig is longer than the fish you are hunting, this helps when a tail wrap occurs and is also very handy when landing the fish.

Other essentials to carry with you You will need a good self drainable reef bag to carry fish and bait. A bait box with a good knife fitted to a waist belt is mandatory. Long nose pliers, little scissors and some ghost cotton should always be at the ready. A good headlamp is a must. A small gaff or lip grips are also worth its weight in gold. A measuring tape to make sure you return undersized fish. A water tight camera to capture golden memories.

Bag/possession limits and size limits (June 2015) In WA the total daily bag limit for pelagic finfish is 3. Taking your Yellowtail home after the weekend of fishing you are allowed to have 2 days' bag limit of whole fish or fish trunks. The minimum length for Yellowtail Kingfish is 600 mm. If you want to gaff a fish to keep it, simply gaff it in the upper shoulder area or lip hook it if you want to photograph and quickly release it afterwards.

Warning This type of fishing is addictive!!

Recipes - Pickled Fish

Thanks to John Curtis

No cooking required.

Ingredients:

White vinegar

½ kg scaled fish fillets (fillets of herring can be used but whiting fillets are recommended)

- 1 dessertspoon lemon juice
- 1 dessertspoon olive or peanut oil
- ½ teaspoon Tabasco sauce
- 1 small clove of garlic crushed. You can use more or less to suit personal taste.

Optional Ingredients: To be used as desired / required.

- 1/4 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/4 teaspoon lemon pepper
- 1/4 tea spoon dill

Method:

Add all the ingredients to the vinegar and stir. Place the fillets in a suitable glass container and cover with the vinegar mix. Leave to stand for approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour.

Pickled fillets are ready to eat after $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour, but taste better if refrigerated and left for about 12 hours.

The fillets can be stored in the bottom of the refrigerator for up to 10 days. Always make sure that there is some liquid covering them when stored.

They can be used as an entree, or a quick snack on a hot day - taste great.

NOTE: Quantities of herbs and spices can be varied to suit individual taste.

Kalbarri House For Rent

The Club owns a house in Kalbarri which is ideal for a fishing holiday in the area. Access to the famous fishing spots at Wagoe, Lucky Bay, Port Gregory, etc is just a short drive away via the main bitumen road.

The Mallard Street house has easy access to the river, beaches and town. It has two reverse cycle air conditioners to keep you cool in the summer months and warm in winter. It has two bedrooms and will sleep up to eight (max) in 1 queen sized bed and 3 commercial grade 2 level bunks. The bathroom and shower were rebuilt in 2012.

Users need to bring their own linen, blankets and towels, tea towels, etc. It has a high definition LCD television, DVD/VCR, stove, oven, microwave, crockery and cutlery and all cooking utensils, washing machine, food fridge/freezer and an extra chest freezer for bait and fish.








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
