#### LIMMERICK OF THE MONTH

Alright, I know it does not rhyme, but what would you have said, had you been in the same position?

Hand your replies to the Editor of "Reel Talk", as it is illegal to send that kind of literature through the mail.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT (Amendment to inside cover):

GARFISH are measured from the tip of the upper jaw to the end of the upper half of the tail; PRAWNS are measured along the body from eye to the tip of the tail; CRAYFISH are measured along the mid-dorsal line from the anterior edge of the pronounced ridge which joins the front edges of the rostral horns immediately posterior to the eyestalks, to the posterior margin of the carapace; CRABS are measured from tip to tip of the posterior margin of the carapace spikes; MARRON are measured from the tip of the rostrum to the posterior margin of the crapace along the mid-dorsal line; all other fish are measured from the point of the snout to the end of the tail.
