"LUCKY BAY/WAGOE"

OCTOBER FIELD DAY

Almost every segment in the fishing competition has changed as a result of the fish weighed in during this field day. This makes it extremely difficult to knock off any of these sections, as the next big fish area (the Murchison), is not until March next year. Although, if you have a line in the water and you are lucky, it is possible that one or another of these sections could be yours.

Some excellent individual fish were caught and I would say that GEORGE HOLMAN'S 58 lb Mulloway would be a very good effort indeed. HEW'S 941b Grey Nurse shark would have given him a large number of points had he registered on time (next time listen to KEITH FLEMMING, he at least knew the time to sign in). DENNIS GREEN with his 81b 3oz tailor and COLIN BUCHANAN'S 61b15oz spotted Trevally and 31b 7oz Flathead, were other fish of note. ERIC SULLIVAN had his share with a 61b 13oz snapper and a 21b6oz tarwhine. DOUG NEWTON'S 31b 4oz skippy and young GEOFF RENSHAW'S 31b 8oz wirrah were other good fish.

Generally, the tailor caught varied from 21b to 51b on average, although there were a few exceptions. JERRY LAFFEVER and PETER BRAMBECH, not often seen on field days, each caught two tailor; the individual totals being 81b 2oz and 11lb 4oz. DOUG SAVAGE and Dad, TED, ranged up and down the hot spots known to DOUG (as a result of his excursions with the Northampton Club) and quite a few nice fish were landed. One of his tailor registered 61b 10oz and was a beauty. TED had a nice silver bream in his bag which showed 21b loz on the scale, "a tasty morsel", somebody mentioned to me.

Most members arrived early at this venue and some even left Friday morning to arrive about 5 p.m. RUDY, JOHN NUICH and RALPH LERCH were one party. COLIN BUCHANAN and Co. (GRAHAM, ERIC, LOFTY and ALLAN) left around 2,30p.m. Friday and arrived at their selected campsite at midnight. Suffice to say when we arrived at "Half Way Bay", around 9 a.m. most members had already taken up residence. In our immediate area were JOHN COTTER and son PETER, "SNOW", RON MANSFIELD and DOUG NEWTON, had followed us in as did KEN A. JONES and son DERRICK and set up nearby. DOUG and TED SAVAGE also arrived around this time and set up near our front door. BOB TICHBON, TED HORSLEY and junior visitor, CRAIG STEPHENS, came in later and camped adjacent to us.

I knew GEORGE HOLMAN was around somewhere as I could see his car parked some hundred yards away. BOB KLEIN and two sons, DOUG and BRUCE, with RON SHIRLEY were camped in one of the huts and were fairly comfy. JACK HARVEY, PHIL NERI and ARCH TICKLIE were also installed in one of the Northampton Club huts, with one of the members of that Club as pathfinder and fish finder. I think they found their way about ok. but the fish were elusive.

TOM SMITH arrived on venue with his family and it was tipped that Tom's wife would catch a fish before Tommy ... (which she did). There was a rumour

going round that some rods had been left behind and it meant an hours trip back. Any truth in it Tom?

BOB TUCKER, son MARK, JACK KENDAL and two visitors, BRUCE ORKNEY and JIM TRUSCOTT, soon had a tent up and appeared comfortable, with the exception of JACK KENDAL whose back was giving trouble.

One of the unlucky ones was BERTIE PAYNE who had been given the wrong directions and found himself on the "new" road, result, hopelessly bogged. Fortunately, after some hours, one of the Northampton members freed Bert from his muddy predicament. Many thanks to that member.

The S.W. winds made conditions very uncomfortable and those who had ventured up to "Wagoe", had deemed it unfishable. However, Saturday aftermoon found most anglers scattered from near the south boundary to up at "Wagoe" reef; (from information received). It wasn't long before some of the chaps started to get itchy feet and looked for greener pastures. Quite a bundle of anglers were fishing about a mile north of the settlement and here ERIC SULLIVAN set an early pace by cutfishing those near him. Eric seemed to have the pink snapper on a string and he caught five in good time. The others, catching the odd bream and tailor with a smattering of skippy. JOHN NUICH did fairly well here and caught a nice mixed bag of 131b loz.

Looking about, it seemed as though LOFTY, COL and ALLEN BUCHANAN, were not here and were probably fishing further north.

Carrying on further up, we decided to try a spot we had fished in June, with reasonable results. Just south of "Disaster Bay" a nice sand spit juts into the Bay and here were three anglers (the missing trio), with the wind almost at their backs, casting into what looked like hopeless water. Taking out my high power field glasses, these fishermen took shape as LOFTY & CO. Now and again they caught a tailor, however, getting towards 4.30 p.m. (Sat.), things looked promising with COL flogging back in the Land Rover. As we guessed, he had gone back to pick up GRAHAM and ERIC. It wasn't long before they returned and the tailor really came on the bite. Quite an interesting night.

Up at the cutting were GEORGE HOLMAN and DENNIS GREEN fishing in very rough water. Through perseverence, they managed to catch about 361b of tailor between them. Near 6 o'clock, GEORGE had a run and his first thoughts were "shark". Twenty minutes later, one only large gleaming Mulloway lay on the reef and George's eyes returned back in their sockets.

Sunday morning, the conditions had moderated slightly and GEORGE, DENNIS, RON and DREW, returned to try their luck again. It wasn't long before the fun started and some excellent tailor were caught. The fish could be seen following up the bait and from the reports, bigger fish were hanging back and allowing the smaller (81b 3oz) tailor to take the bait. I suppose

that is how the big tailor have survived - more brains or not fast enough! Many bite offs were experienced here by George who was using 151b line. (Dennis was using heavy shark gear). It was here that Dennis bagged his BIG tailor, although Drew and Ron Scrivener had large fish, they weren't quite up to that size.

By this time there were about fifteen anglers trying to get into the thick of things, but too late. Whether some of the chaps were standing too close to the edge of the reef had frightened off the fish, (or perhaps not hungry anymore). So at 8.45 a.m. all was quiet and the anglers dispersed.

Weigh in time on Sunday and a few members were waiting at the hut ready to put their fish on the scales. I was disappointed in some of the members clearing off as soon as their fish were weighed, as this was supposed to have been a social hour with the Northampton Club. Still some remained to knock off a few beers. RON presented the N.A.C. President with a suitably inscribed Gavell and thanked the Club for its help to our Club.

What a sight to see, some of the bags of tailor coming in, tails sticking out from the carrying bags. I would note the biggest fish but somebody kept saying 'don't worry, there is bigger ones to come'. As mentioned, THERE WERE bigger fish.

GECFF RENSHAW with the good result of 111b 4oz, knocked off his Dad, and PETER COTTER and MARK TUCKER also had the same experience, but not Ray, as I had his measure this time ... next time, who knows?

The Monday morning weigh in was a dead loss as only approximately fifty five pounds of fish were weighed from sixteen members and nearly half of this was my mulloway and COL BUCHANAN'S skippy. A proportion of members had their fish packed in ice and did not weigh in.

Many thanks to RON, DOUG and RAY for the assistance rendered, it was appreciated.

AUSTRALIAN ANGLERS' ASSOCIATION STATE ANGLING CHAMPIONSHIP

This was the inaugural championship held in W.A. and saw approximately 16 teams and close to 200 anglers participate. The weather conditions were absolutely apalling and was the undoing of our own team, along with a bad decision by myself as team captain on the location to be fished.

However, to start from the beginning:-

It was decided at our General Meeting in July that we enter a team and it was my honour to be elected your captain. The response of names available was most gratifying and as a result, six of the best anglers assembled were selected; there was also some extra good anglers available who didn't make the team because we were only able to have one team (consisting of six anglers).

Those selected were: GEORGE HOLMAN (CAPTAIN): HEW HOY HEW: GRAHAM BASKERVILLE: LOFTY GRIFFITHS: ERIC SULLIVAN and RON JOHNSON. Others representing were: GARRY GILDERSLEEVE, DENNIS GREEN, TOM CORCORAN, BOB FREDERICKS, KEITH FLEMING, REG NOBLE, DON BIBBY, TREVOR STAM and SELWYN BESSELL-BROWN.

After two meetings, one at Graham Baskerville's residence and the other at Ron Johnson's, the boys became a highly organised unit as was displayed on the actual competition day.

Organisation was definitely the key word, and this was displayed in a punctual arrival at the Pines near Yallingup. A little organising of vehicle loads, so that the main body of anglers were in three 4-wheel drive vehicles, and a quick look at the area to be fished by myself, and we went to the Canal Rocks base for the Championships, and all checked in.

By this time the weather was really bad, (having been raining and the wind blowing for the previous 3 days) and once again the weather bureau were wrong, as instead of moderating, another gale came through later that night which contributed greatly to our downfall.

At 3.30 p.m., after an address by the Busselton Shire President, the vehicles left the centre behind the pace car and needless to say, our three main vehicles were not far behind it.

Cont. ... Seventh instalment of "THE TRIAL TRAIL" by Dave Latto

It was easy to imagine oneself a spectator high in the gallery of an immense operating theatre. The surgeons appeared as a well equipped and skilled army of ants, making the first incisions into the stomach of a sleeping giant. I imagined the scene should he awake before they had completely grafted the great wall, that would place a lake of cool water upon his chest. He would destroy all and return to his wild primitive ways. The operation a success, he could rest forever, the green of crops to replace the dust about him, and the exciting scent of water on hot earth, driving from his nostrils, the lifeless smell of dry grass, gum leaves and dust. The slamming door of the Land Rover shattered my fantasies; Joy was reminding me we should press on.

Border crossings conjure up visions of barriers, armed guards and barbed wire etc. The Northern Territory presented nothing more formidable than a lonely "T" sign post and two very dusty travellers, the younger of which, was nursing a large, unhappy looking Kangaroo dog, whilst posting for his companions camera. We exchanged greetings and the usual track chit—chat, though both men appeared shy, and more accustomed to talk with each other and to their dogs, than with other humans. They finally climbed aboard an ancient and incredibly battered Land Rover, which, to add to its over loaded state, trailed a large heavy looking boat, the sight of which, seemed incongrous in such dry surroundings.

We made the West Banes River and I decided after camp chores, to try a spinner in some long deep looking pools. Darkness and disappointment finally resolved me to try again in the early morning. The proverb that deals with 'early birds catching worms etc' must surely have originated in the Northern Territory, for their chatter and twittering awoke me well before dawn, the thought of a Barramundi breakfast levering me out of my warm sleeping bag. Many casts, full, hot daylight, and a snagged and lost spinner, eventually convinced me. The water looked cool and inviting as I trudged back to camp, but spotlights shining from the down stream bridge the previous evening, served to remind me we were in crocodile country, and it could be healthier to ignore such temptations.

It was early afternoon when we arrived, hot and very dry, at the Timber Creek store. I padded through the ankle deep dust to the bar, where several sweat streaked faces, turned from their beer cans just long enough to observe me enter and ask for two Swan and a "softy" for the kids. A tended Dollar note returned only two cents change, but much satisfaction, as we poured the cool liquid down dry throats. The presence nearby of a well stocked yard of vehicles, in varying stages of repair, bore mute evidence of the rigours of travel in these regions. Rumour had it, the proprietor tended to be a hard bargainer with anyone unfortunate enough to have dealings with him. With "living" the price it was in this place, who could blame him?

The scenery became more interesting now as we drove for some miles close to the wide Victoria River, and wound through hill country, past road construction gangs of multi-racial workers, though it was difficult to tell white from black. All waved cheerfully, even though our passing raised blankets of dust to add to the discomfort of heat and flies. Through dry creek beds and road cuttings with fascinating rock stratas, and through high dry grass with bands of wild eyed cattle staring stupidly at us from the roadside, or having to be blasted aside by an enthusiastic small boy at the Rover's horn button. We camped the night in a snug gravel pit and spent an enjoyable interlude next morning feeding a couple of very tame Butcher birds, who, I suspect, had discovered the softer side of human nature from some lonely camp cook.

We made our leisurely way into Katherine and found it to be a place of considerable size. Stock yards, depots with huge road trains, those fearsome juggernauts of the dusty roads, houses with neat gardens and new shops side by side with recently renovated and modernised older buildings. Katherine appeared to be prospering.

Joy and Rochelle headed into the cool, air conditioned depths of a large Supermarket, whilst I settled onto a comfortable seat by the entrance to mind Troy, and watch the passing parade. My watch showed 10.30 and appeared to be ticking healthily, when I noticed a young shop assistant about to close the doors. In answer to my query, he informed me it was 12 noon and being Saturday, the shop was closed. Further conversation revealed a factor we had not taken into account, Central Standard Time; The need to advance watches one and a half hours after crossing the Territory border. We were lucky to have arrived in time to shop.

A check during fuel up, showed the Rover in need of a pint of oil and a lengthy debate ensued with the garage prop. on the advisability of mixing his brand oil with the Castrol already in the sump. He, on the one hand, adopted a superior attitude, whilst I on the other, argued with the knowledge I had acquired over the years of discussions on this subject. Rightly or wrongly, I refused to allow him to add the lost pint, and after drawing a disinterested reply from him, and from others I asked, as to the whereabouts of a local Castrol agent, we left, hoping to find a supplier further down the track. The loss of the oil wasn't serious in itself, for the Rover had a big range between the High and Low levels. Where it had gone, and why, and would further loss occur, was the real worry. Forty seven miles on at Larrimah, I finally located Castrol oil at one of those sell-everything shops by the roadside. I had stopped frequently to check the oil level and each time it had shown the same reading, now it read Full. I bought a 35-cent "Swan" and sat under a cool trellis to ponder this odd behaviour. Not again on the journey did such a thing occur, and I still have no satisfactory explanation.
