STEEP POINT:

In company with Keith, Hewie, Allan and Pinky, we three Freindlies journeyed up to Steep Point.

The drive can be classified into three sections. However both he and Clay managed a couple of Cobias and Sharkmackerals and with a few snapper and Clays small shark, didn't do too bad a job in the end. Unfortunately for me, the only things that stayed on my line were a few scnappers- no game fishing badge there!

Pinky gets my vote for the best cook although you should ask the boys about his baked beans and I think his quote of the day may just go down in history, but, you'll have to ask him what it was. He never had his line out of the water and deserved every fish he caught even though every third one was "Australia".

Allan caught a magnificent 72 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb Cobia after a valiant effort of more than an hour. When his endurance failed Keith came to the rescue and quietly and insistently talked him through that last terrible 15 mins until Hewie managed to gaff the fish a split second before the line snapped. This type of fishing is definitely nervous breakdown material. All was so exhausted it was a full 10 mins before he could thank Allah.

37 different species of leatherjackets have been identified in W.A. waters, many of them are rarely encountered by anglers because some mature at a length less than 25 cm which is the minimum catching length required by law and others are in very deep offshore waters where specimens have been obtained by trawlers.

MONKEY FISHES:

Named because their facial features resemble that of a monkey. Three different species of monkey fishes have been identified in W.A. waters, they are the Darwin, Inornate and Reticulated Monkeyfish. They inhabit rocky, reef and mangrove mudflat areas Northward of Exmouth.
