For those who are lucky enough to catch fish, here are two recipies, one for Salmon, and one for Barbeoued Fish.

SALMON BRIDETTE.

1/2 Cup Olive Oil,

1 - only 8 lb. Salmon,

2 1b Sliced Potatoes

l lb. Brown onions

Small ti: Tomato Puree

1 lb. Tomatoes

Salt and Pepperto taste

l cu. Light Sherry

1 " Whegar, 1 cup Potato water.

Salmon cut into 3/4" cutlets.

Fry onions and tomatoes in oil, when cooked add water puree, wine and vinegar and oil, and all to large stock pot. Place a layer of partly cooked potatoes, Layer Salmon Cutlets and Layer of mixture, continue until all mixture used up. boil and simmer for 1/2 hour.

BARBECUED FISH

3 desp. Shortening

1/2 cup diced onion

2 lb. Fish Fillets

1 cup Barbecue sakse

3 tabs. Lemon Juice.

1/4 cup water
1 tablespoon sugar

2 " Worcestershire sauce

Salt and Fepper to taste 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard.

Frypan to 360°, add shortening, fry onion until brown Cut Fillets into serving size pieces and fry then remove. until lightly browned, spread onion over fish season with pepper and salt. Combine barbecue sauce with other ingredients and pour Cover with lid and simmer at 220-260°., until fish over fish. Sprinkle with chopped parsely before can be flaked easily. serving.

FISHING HINTS.

A piece of hose pipe, about 12" long, is ideal for protecting leaders. With the hooks fastened into the rubber at one end, the leaders can be wound through the hose and forced into several small slits, cut with a pocket knife, at the other end so that they will not tangle with one another.

An old tooth brush is excellent for cleaning the gears and other internal parts of your fishing reels.

Sand, in level winding surf reels, causes damage. An old shaving brush will do the trick and save wear and time spent in trying to remove by disassembling the reel.

Chromed rod fittings and reels will remain in perfect condition if coated with a good quality furniture wax and polished.

Wet a soft cloth with acetone and rub the cork on your rod grip with it. All dirt will come off in quick time. Go over it several times for best results.

DRYCASTING RULE No. 10.

Weights, except when used with baits and spinners, must have attached not less than 12" of 1/2" yellow tape. Tape is to be attached by one end, not tied in the middle. (This rule also applies to practice casting, and must be strictly adhered to). Penalty for non-compliance - no score for that cast.
