- 3. Fishing twelve field days One suggestion was to cut back the number of events per annum, This would have to be a last resort although a valid point. Another was to have local events during the winter months (June, July, August) thus not wasting money travelling for very minimal returns during that time and this would mean that members resources would be better spent on the more productive months and locations.
- 4. Cost This is a major factor to consider and if members can get maximum benefit for their dollar we will get good attendances. Making sure we have full passenger loads in our vehicles is another factor and also makes for good comradeship.

- 5. Family and Competitive Venues How many family venues should we have versus purely competitive. Family meaning somewhere near caravan park facilities or camping facilities. Competitive meaning out-of-the-way locations where we hope the best results may be achieved.
- 6. Long weekends How many long weekends do we use. Also consider school holidays which invariably seem to fall on these weekends with the new school term format.
- 7. Other Clubs Whether we would like to combine with other clubs in some events.
- 8. Short and long Venues How many short and long venues should we have

These are a few of the things we need to consider when selecting our venues along with any other points you may think of. We also need to remember our senior members, wives and children as well. They are part of our club as well.

The President of the Anglers Association, W.A. Division, Lindsey Harbord, has kindly consented to attend our next meeting and put to us his plans for our association for the future as well as answer any questions you may wish to ask. He will stay on after the meeting to enjoy some refreshment and talk individually to members.

Next month's discussion will be on our social activities and I look forward to some constructive suggestions - such as how many functions you would like, the type of functions, whether you would like to combine one with a field day or drycasting day, have an outing with another club or association (such as trout association). Thinking caps on?

The club is going to purchase a large asky for our social organiser for all our future functions.

Congretulation to Peter and Sharon Osborne on their selection as State Captain and State Drycasting Captain respectively for next year's Australian Championship in Queensland. Also to Sharon on winning the top lady title over last year's four championships.

I would like to thank Tony Richardson and Eric Parker for taking on the position of Drycasting Organiser and Assistant respectively owing to Malcolm Head having to stand down due to personal commitments. STATE A.A.A. ESTUARY CHAMPIONSHIPS 23rd-24th AUGUST (1986)

We were represented by a senior's team, Jim MacDougall, Captain, with George Holman, Peter Osborne, Tony D'Alonzo, Dennis Stiglmayer and Ric Parker. Ladies were Philomena B'Alonzo (Captain), Helen MacDougall and Sharon Osborne.

The catch was mainly combler, with only a few bream making an appearance. Surfcasters didn't take any honours, but sure learned a lot about fishing the river.

Points to remember for next year's State Championships:-

- Blowies bite in the day time.
- Cobblers don't.
- Blowles have big teeth and eat hooks with or without bait.
- Bream don't, they gently suck the bait off your hooks and wait for the next serve.
- Fresh river worms or fresh prawnsscrapped off the sides of the pylons are the best bait (just don't fall in).
- Following rains like we had this year, the best fishing is from the Narrows Down.
- Blowies can be caught anywhere.
- To fish the river successfully, you have to search for the fish. Your best bet is to find proven anglers like the Bunbury mob and stick as close as possible to them.
- Fish until the bitter end. The biggest bream was caught by a Melville lady at 8.40 am Sunday. Lines up time was at 9.00 am.
- It's considered angling courtesy to remove the cobbler be; a before you put your bag in for weighing. It's considered stupid to use enything shorter than 12 inch sidecutters to do this.
- It's also stupid to measure your cobbler from the forward sal fin, as this can mean your bag gets disqualitied for undersized fish. Always measure from the rear sal fin.
