
The monthly GENERAL MEETING is usually held on the second Wednesday of each month at 8pm. All members should endeavour to attend the meeting so as to keep up with club matters.



TIDES: Ø.6mm to Ø.5mm. so very little change. The water level was below the reef, with only a slight swell. Very comfortable reef fishing.

MOØN: The moon came up late, bright and full.

MAGIC!

ABSOLUTE MAGIC!

How else to describe our Rottnest trip. Usually we go to Rotto in August but decided to try September this year. (What a good decision that was!)

We got into yellow tailed kingfish off Radar. They came in just as the sun was setting and immediately stitched everybody up. There were yellow tail shooting all over the place. busted rigs, people running around the edges of the reef trying to keep their lines off the rocks and generally real adrenalin-pumping excitment. When it got dark we came in cleaned the fish and staggered up the hill.

We turned out early next morning (4.30am) and went back to see if the yellowtail would return. First lines out and immediate hook-ups and this kept up until daylight started to make its presence felt. The sheer power of these magnificent fish is something that has to be experienced to be believed, particularily, as they were often grabbing the bait just on the edge of the reef, so we were as green as grass when we were trying to land them.

Everyone who came out on the reef got yellowtail (even F.D.O). Tony D'Alonzo topped us all with a count of 18, followed by Peter Booth with 15 then Peter Osborne with 11. Philomena decided to give the reef a try and took 5 nice ones. Ian Taggart and our visitor Phil bought along heavier line than last year, so both managed to land some nice ones. Rob Calabrese also took home 5 beauties, much to his families delight. The Reeley brothers came out in the morning and also took home yellowtail.

The Wintle Mob (Ron, Owen, Eric and Basil) got their limit of herring at Eagle Bay, along with a few skippy. Cathedral was absolutely dead, as the water was too low and too quiet.

A.A.A. REPORT AUGUST/SEPTEMBER 1987

- 1. ESTUARY CHAMPIONSHIPS...SWAN RIVER. October 24th-25th 1987.
- 2. S.W. DRY CAST CHAMPIONSHIPS....BUNBURY End of November (28th-29TH T.B.A.)
- A request has been made to the A.B.C. to show some fishing programmes.
- For A.A.A. competitions the following items were voted on:
 4.1 Expenditure on trophies/pennants etc. (excluding value of donations) not to exceed \$500.00...MOTION CARRIED.
 - 4.2 Motion to have more than one team per club in a competition,...MOTION LOST.
 - 4.3 For the coming year -SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR- selected across four events (beach, estuary, boat & D.C.).
 Alternative motions to changing the current system were put forward and lost.
- 5. Direction is needed from Surfcasters for competitions for fish weighed "in lieu of a bag being disqualified if an undersized fish is weighed in."
 The following is proposed to apply:
 One under sized fish, delete 25% from total bag.
 Two under sized fish, delete 56% from total bag.
 Three under sized fish, delete 75% from total bag.
 It's a bit harsh for a competitor to be totally disqualified for an error especially, juniors.
 For undersize fish the current ruling on undersized fish still prevails...AN UNDERSIZED FISH RESULTS IN A NO SCORE.
- The Recreational Fishing Council is still chasing fresh or frozen tailor, caught locally or in the south (must be in tact).
 Telephone Dot Griffin 364.7171 or Frank Csiciak 364-7171.
- The Recreational Fishing Council advise that:
 The minimum legal length of pink snapper is under review for a change from 38cms to 45cms.
 - 7.2 The number of crays per day amateur fishermen can take is under review. The A.A.A. made a recommendation-"No further change down from 8 to 6".
- 8. Frank Csiczak has been elected as treasurer for the current year. There is still a vacancy for Vice-President.

VETERANS TO THE CAPE

After a couple of months of planning, three club veterans in Jim Strong. Bill Utting and 'Bas' Marsh set off on a two week sightseeing/fishing trip to Exmouth Gulf. Emphasis was to be, at all times, at a leisurely pace. The motor outfit was Basil's L300 Express 4WD Wagon towing his Cabana pop-top caravan.

First overnight stop was the 'S' Bend Caravan Park at Greenough. then on to Denham for a full day. We drove across to Monkey Mia arriving in time to watch and photograph the dolphins carrying on with their antics in their endeavours to cadge fish from the large group of people at the water's edge.

Next day, a pleasant drive to Carnarvon for a 24 hour stay. We were lucky to find a caravan park with a vacant spot for us. There were caravans and people in white lawn bowling clothes everywhere. We fished the alleged local 'hot spot', Miaboolya, with little result. "You should have been here yesterday " was the word. Instead we settled for a dozen cooked king prawns purchased at the fishing harbour at a cost of \$5.40 and they went down well with a glass of Jim's favourite wine. We heard that small Mulloway were being caught in numbers as the end of the mile long jetty, but, we could not talk Jim into walking out that far.

The next day was the long haul to Exmouth. We had lunch at a picnic spot on the Minilya River and took photos of each other in the dry river bed. A week later, that same spot had deep water flowing through after heavy rain. We only purchased emergency reserve petrol at Minilya Roadhouse as it was 76.9 cents per litre. At Exmouth, we again were lucky to get a bay in the very new Exmouth Gulf Tourist Village. We can recommend the place. All caravan parks were bursting at the seams with tourists, a large percentage being retired people or Eastern Staters.

It had been 42 years since Basil had seen Exmouth during his war service there in the R.A.A.F. and naturally the area looked and was vastely different. During our five days there we did the following:

Fished the beach area near the Sea Rescue Service Jetty. Two break-offs and no fish.

* Fished close to the U.S. Navy Jetty, were sprung by Federal Police and ordered to leave.

* Checked out Kaillis Prawn Processing Factory area. It was crowded with seagulls and humans, mostly elderly. either chasing prawn offal or fish.

Drove up the Charles Knife Canyon Road to look at and photograph the magnificent views and check ou the capped oil well head. Good practice for Basil in 4WD on the very steep gravel road.

Purchased a kilo of fresh frozen Coral prawns. Half of these were used to catch thirty Tarwine and Bream. The remaining prawns were cooked and eaten that night, helped along with a bottle of wine. During the fishing session that day, "always hungry" Jim decided privately that seeing the prawns were red in colour, they must have been cooked and okay to eat. After consuming one, he told us in STRONG words that they were awful.

- Visited the remains of a wartime installation at the North West Cape where Basil had spent quite a few hours watching the green radar screen.
- Drove into the R.A.A.F. Base and had an interesting talk with the base caretaker. From information received Basil found the site of the wartime R.A.A.F. Base, even to finding the spot where his tent had been. The remains of the field bakers oven are still there and cement floors of the buildings and parts of the road systems were still in evidence.

The last day was to be an all out fishing effort. We decided to chase the smaller fish species in a proven area rather than possible larger fish around the lighthouse area. With fresh prawns straight off the boat we got of to a nice slow start, but the session improved to a total bag of four and a half dozen whiting and bream. A flick rod with light gear, fresh prawns, the right 'vibes' and you are in business. If you cast thirty metres, you have gone too far, so wind down a bit. The Engel freezer coped well with the laid down fillets and whole fish we brought home.

The weather was pleasant but warm every day. There was a rain storm on only one night. The trip home went smoothly to finish off the two weeks of good company, smooth travel, generally satisfactory fishing and happy days.



It must be realized that in those days, roads amd vehicles were not sophisticated or advanced as they are now. On a Mainland based field day, you drove to the end of the made road in your conventional car and the fishing boundaries were as far as you could walk - with your The trip to Garden Island was often an 'experience to remember'. Park your car behind the Palm Beach Tearcoms overnight for 50cents. Board the ferry at 9.30am or 2pm. The ferry used togo through the waves instead of over them, bottom occasionally scraped the sandbar on a low tide, and on a rough day passengers hung on to the rail for dear life.
