


The weather on the Saturday was fine with light S.W. winds and a low swell. Sunday morning was again fine and warm with light ".F. winds. The tides were reasonably low.

- NEW RULES FOR 1990

New legal specifications for marron fishing gear will come into force for the next fishing season, due to open at midday on Monday 1 January 1990.

The Fisheries Department has prepared this information sheet to summarise the new specifications for gear manufacturers and retailers in advance of the opening of the next season.

There are an estimated 25,000 West Australians who go marroning in season, all of whom will need to upgrade their fishing gear to meet the new specifications.


Media campaigns in the metropolitan area and the South-West will be commencing in August to promote the new fishing rules, and encourage people to take out their licences early. At the same time we will be promoting places where people can either buy the materials to upgrade their existing gear, have their gear upgraded, or buy gear meeting the new specifications.

Why new gear rules?

In 1987, after several seasons of plummeting catch rates, the marron fishing season was closed for two years to allow stocks to recover. A factor which contributed to the crash in marron stocks was the widespread take of undersize marron.

The review committee set up to examine future management for marron fishing identified setting minimum legal gear specifications as one tactic to reduce the take of undersize marron.

A complete summary of the Marron Fishing Advisory Committee's recommendations is available from the Fisheries DepartThe marron fishing season will re-open at midday on Monday 1st January, 1990, and close again at noon on Wednesday 28 February 1990. The season will open for a further two weeks over Easter, from noon Saturday 7 April to noon Sunday 22 April 1990.

Help look after W.A.'s marron

The new fishing rules and gear specifications for marroning are designed to help conserve the breeding stock, and keep marroning a sport for people to enjoy in future seasons.

To make these conservation measures effective we need the help and support of tackle manufacturers and retailers.


New gear specifications

The only gear for catching marron permissible will be drop nets, scoop nets, or pole snares which meet the following specifications.

Drop nets

All drop nets used for marroning will be required to have a rigid base of rectangular mesh.

The minimum individual mesh size must be 80 mm x 32 mm.

The Fisheries Department will be promoting this mesh as marron mesh". The mesh may be either wire or rigid plastic grid with a maximum

thickness of 5 mm.

The top hoop of the net may have a maximum diameter of 650 mm, and the bottom hoop must also be 650 mm or smaller. The side mesh of the nets is not specified.

A maximum of 6 nets will be allowed per person

Scoop nets

Fine mesh scoop nets will no tonger be legal gear for catching marron.

Marron scoop nets will be a wire crabbing style basket scoop with a maximum dlameter of 375 mm across the top hoop, and a maximum depth of 210 mm. There must he no more than 6 vertical support wires, and a maximum of 75 individual mesh rectangles,

Handles may be no more than 1400 mm long. One scoop net may be used per person.

Pole snares

Traditional pole snares consisting of a handle and a noose will be promoted for exclusive use in some specific areas of water in National Parks. One pole snare may be used per person.





AUDIT FOR YEAR 1988-1989

 The Revenue Statement for the accounts Books balanced with statement, noting that a payment of costs for the annual Dirner Dance (to Le Mirage Restaurant) was actually paid in July but taken up in June expenses:

Recording of devenue 38635.25 less costs (i cl above) 7952.39 3682.26

- Due to availability of signatures a mater and elec. bill (to the amount of 1425.13) was initially paid out of the General Account. This was done in order no interest payments are made. Monies were then transferred from the Kalbarri account to the General account.
- 3. For the revenue on the annual Dinner Dance, payments for Vaterans, Juniors and for vilitors did not appear to have been processed correctly. Can only request for any future functions like this that tiquet purchasers correctly state who they are buying tiquets for and account for payment to reflect the discounted price of tiquets accordingly.
- 4. For troopy locations where cash is inv lved, it is recovered ded that the unds so through the Treasurers born. This will allow correct statements of income and exceptione against traphise.
- 5. As the ..O. 2 ... C. account, are relatively small (although an significance for the expenditures involved) it is recommended that a "lanual" system is retained.

 Computarized systems do not allow easy transfer from outgoing to incoming Transfer at the election of outgoings.
- t. It is also recommended that the system be retained by various officers providing a statement of the surce of revenue balance against the amount handed to the treasurer. Similarly a statement of where who a cost is to be charged against when money is received from the Treasurer. This will assist the Treasurer keep his books up to date (say on a monthly basis) and correctly reflect S.C. hand, business.
 - From the Treasurers records a few chides were made against the Yearly Statement. Our review gave that the Yearly Statement was consistent with the books.

 Review of the books bighlighted some fundamental principals about the financial viability of S.C. &A.C. viz:

Social Activities generated a good revenue in that for the year the balance was 31480.50 despite an amount of 51100 being taken from this account for the purchase of a photocopier . The General Fund of 3682, year balance looks healthy but in reality has the impact of the hotocopier cost oot being incorporated in this calculation. n-liarri house expenses exceeded rental revenue by approx. 3150. This could be further a henced for tax surposes by proportioning some of the photocopying costs etc. against the Kalbarri house running costs. To this regative cash flow interest has to be added in the tax declaration. This calculation is under preparation by others. when separating onies received from doners for trophies, if colles of run through the Treasurers tooks is taken into account, the ? rations could be greater than expenditures. It i reco mended that better seperate records be sept, and committee enters who purchase trophies on are that expeditures match the wishes of donors. (In the past records tended to show J.C. & .. C general funds were supporting trophies to a large extent.)

5. Jummert.

It in the sciential limited review and experience of e ors Osborne and Strong it was found that the club's finances are healthy and the Exec. Committee have cept reaso able control and balance between reverue obtained and expenditures. It must be noted that a major contributor to this state of affairs is the reverue energies by the social creatizer.
