<u>Business arising from correspondence:</u> None. Moved Pat McKeown seconded Peter Osborn that correspondence be accepted, carried.

<u>Treasurer's report:</u> Victor Schilo provided a detailed report in a handout to members present (see attachment A).

Moved Vic Schilo, seconded Peter Osborne that the Treasurer's report be accepted and accounts be passed for payment, carried.

Secretary's report: Nothing to report

<u>Property Officer:</u> There is one booking for the Kalbarri property and the Christmas period is still available.

Members were reminded to let friends and relatives know that the Kalbarri property is available for bookings so that the rental turnover can offset the expenses.

Field Days: The Rottnest field day in August was discussed.

Sandra Wessels caught the heaviest fish, had the most points and the heaviest bag. Peet Wessels got the second heaviest bag.

On the local field day two sharks were caught and released at the North Cottesloe in a location that was a Fish Protection Area by Martin Wearmouth and Lee Yongli. (In this area any sharks or Sting Rays can be caught but must be released).

Both Martin Wearmouth and Lee Yongli provided good photos of their catches and it was decided by the committee that these sharks would be accepted as a catch at 2kg each.

The next field day (a long weekend) will be held at Kalbarri and Port Gregory and Peter Osborn has room for an additional person in his car if anyone was interested in accompanying him.

Local fishing boundaries for this weekend were discussed and it was agreed to be Preston to Two Rocks. Participants were reminded to complete the weighing slips correctly and make a note if the fee has been paid.

<u>Dry Casting:</u> The next club Dry Casting day is Sunday 13th September at the Yokine Reserve.

Ron Thomas requested that anyone wishing to compete in the AAA State Dry Championships competition should contact him to get the nomination form as there is only 5 weeks to the competition date.

George Holman explained that the Yokine Reserve will no longer be available for club dry casting events as from the 1st October 2015 as the local council is installing cricket pitches in the area.

The council as an alternative did offer the use of the Mirrabooka Regional Open Space but there is limited parking and no storage or toilet facilities available.

Also due to public activity on the site we would have to do a lot of work in managing public access during competitions.

If the Mirrabooka Regional Open Space option was to be taken up the club would have to get a trailer to store all of the dry casting equipment and have to find a location to store the trailer.

George Holman and Ron Thomas looked at the Warwick Senior High School Oval that was currently being used by an Archery Club as a possible alternate location.

A detailed submission was made to the school principal by George Holman and Terry Fuller for the use of the site for the clubs dry casting events and we are awaiting a response to this submission.

A number of other sites that may be suitable will be looked at for their suitability for dry casting.

George Holman requested that members look out for any other areas that may be suitable for dry casting and made a special thanks to Ron Thomas and Terry Fuller for all of the work they had done in the location of alternate site and for the preparation of the submission.

George Holman requested that members should consider applying for this vacant position in order to help the club.

Membership Coordinator: There are no new members this month.

Recorder Justin Rose reported that the results for the last competition have been received and a number of Master Badges were awarded.

Shane Wagnall caught a Goat fish (weighing 1.09 kg) and has broken the existing club record that had been in place since 1965 (50 year record).

Reel Talk Terry Fuller explained to members that postage costs would not be increasing until January (2016) and not 1st October as previously mentioned.

If the Reel Talk had been delivered by email and hand as proposed for the month of August this would have resulted in a saving of \$180.00 for the month due to savings in postage and printing costs.

Ken Howells reported that the clubs Facebook site is up and running and has 13 members. He proposed that the site be open to the public in order to attract more interest from the public and sponsors.

<u>Raffle</u> The raffle was drawn with the first prize being won by George Belin and Shane Wignell winning the second prize

There was a break for a short period before the instruction period.

Instruction period

Peter Osborne conducted the instruction session and showed members what he considered to be a selection of rods, reels and equipment including of pre made rigs etc. and how he packs all of this equipment into a single back pack so as to be able to fish away from your vehicle without having to carry additional unnecessary equipment and gear.

Shane Wignell then gave a short talk on what he considered to be the minimum requirement for a First Aid kit. He recommended that as a minimum the kit should include an assortment of band aids, gauze and larger dressings (for wounds), sterile water (for washing sand out of your eye) and antiseptic (for washing wounds).

He also recommended that you carry at least one large/long elasticated bandage to be used where you may have bites or hemorrhaging. As we often travel fish in areas where there are snakes the elasticated bandage is useful in the event that anyone is bitten by a snake. This bandage can be used as a pressure bandage and to immobilize the limb to help slow the spread of any venom.

He explained how recently a woman was bitten on the foot by a snake while walking along the beach and used a shoelace for a tourniquet but she never recovered consciousness. If an elasticated bandage had been applied to the limb with a little pressure this may have been a better item and possible saved her life.

He also suggested that all members should carry (and drink) an adequate amount of water when fishing in order to prevent dehydration

Shane offered to produce a first aid article for a future the Reel Talk magazine to help members put together a useful first aid kit.



Derby Horizontal Falls

On Friday (7 August) I drove to Derby to go on the tour of the Horizontal Falls at 2.15pm. I was picked up from the King Sound Resort along with ten other people. We were taken to the Derby Airport and boarded a Cessna with floats, one of three on the tarmac, all to take passengers to the falls.

We were the last to take off and made a direct flight over the land to the falls and landed on the sound at 3pm. On the flight across the land (120k's) not one sign of human habitation. No tracks, fence lines or posts just continuous untouched country.

After taking our overnight luggage to our allotted rooms (will describe the room later) we donned life jackets and boarded the high powered boats. They have three boats for the falls run. Two carried about twenty four persons and a smaller one about fourteen persons.

The boats are massively powered, the large ones have three, three hundred horsepower outboards and the small one merely six hundred horsepower.



On this occasion there were two boats, a larger one and a smaller one.

The two falls were a short distance away and the experience of a lifetime began.

The height of the first of the wider of the two falls dropped in the height of the water going through the falls about one and a half metres.

The boats were powered up to speed and shot through the falls, bouncing occupants all over the place.

Taking turns with the other boat we repeated the process three times.

I was trying to take a movie of the event but half way through I kept forgetting the camera and my natural instincts were to grip on for safety.

The water was really churning on both sides of the falls so you had to hang on. I was sitting in the front row of seats so had a good view but did get a bit of the spray.

After this exhilarating experience we toured the surrounding gorges at a more sedate pace, including Cyclone Creek as it is the best place to ride out a cyclone as it is protected by high surrounding sheer walls. They also mothball the whole floating operation here over the off season and have not had any trouble or damage to the structures.

Some of the geological formations were amazing, horizontal sedimentary rock structures were forced vertically, formed 1800 million years ago when continents collided.

Back to the Floating Palace and it was time to feed the sharks. Leftovers of barramundi BBQ earlier were fed to the sharks who know when it is feeding time. There would have been between eight and ten sharks, all about two meters who arrived when the feeding began.

We also fed Batfish with bits of bread rolls when they came to the surface to feed. One of the sharks (Dusky Nurse Sharks) allowed some people to touch its skin, like leather not rough like normal sharks.

After all the activity it was time for a drink to watch the sunset go down after which a BBQ was cooked for us with the main menu, being Barra Burgers, yum, yum.

At about eight thirty, nine o'clock every one headed for bed as we had an early start next morning, breakfast at 6.15am and if you wanted a helicopter ride over the falls (an additional \$100 for ten minutes) that was done before breakfast.

We then had a repeat of the previous day shooting through the falls again in the fresh morning air, the surrounding waters being as still as a mill pond, then back to the Floating Palace.

By this stage the day visitors were starting to arrive. In the short space of fifteen minutes three flying boats and two helicopters arrived. When they got out, we got in and were flown back to Derby, this time taking a longer route around the peninsular for a scenic flight. We crossed over Cove Bay where a barramundi farm is being developed. We arrived at Derby by 8.15am right on time.

The Floating Palace. I call it this because it was a floating structure with everything. It had berths for three of its speed boats, docks for three flying boats, out of water docks for a sea doo and two small aluminium dinghies.

A barge for the helipad and the small helicopter could be stored on top of the structure if the helipad was being used. The small helicopter was a permanent fixture and the bigger helicopters come and drop off and pick up tourists.

It had all the infrastructure including desalination, power barge (all rooms air conditioned). Crew were housed on the lower level with some of the accommodation top and bottom.

The Palace replenishes it stores by a converted fishing boat. It takes twelve hours to reach Derby. That gives you some idea of the isolation of the Palace.

Here comes an interesting part. Due to the accommodation being full I was give privilege of using the executive suite. There was a passage down the centre of the structure with cabins on both sides. At the end of the passage is a door with a combination lock on it so only authorised persons can enter. Inside it was amazing. It was at the end of the structure and had widows around 180 degrees in a half circle giving an uninterrupted view of the surrounding bay. It had a lounge, sink, fridge, en suite, large digital TV (with Blu-ray videos). Outside the side door onto a private balcony that followed the circular widows around was a stand with four fishing rods and spear gun.

The other rooms were basic and small, only air conditioning they had to share toilets and facilities, no TV or en suite.

Unfortunately I did not get to enjoy it as much as I would have liked because we were kept busy while on board, but at least I got to live like a king for one night.

The only condition they put on the enjoyment of the suite was I was not allowed to tell anyone else on the tour as you could imagine it may have caused friction with my fellow travelers, but I was sorely tested. Maybe they gave this mere male mortal the privilege as they thought I could keep a secret! So you hear it first straight from the horse's mouth!

I spent a few hours looking at the tourist sites and had to wait till 12pm for the liquor stores to open (there was a queue outside) as I turn off the main highway before I get to Broome so I did my shopping in Derby, very expensive. The liquor licensing laws here are very strict as far as packaged liquor is concerned.

My vehicle should be ready in a week's time and I will be then off to Fitzroy crossing and then start the Gibbs River Road Trek.

Would like to stay longer to check out the fishing but the weather is getting hotter and I need to get across the top of Australia before the wet sets in. I now have a Personal Locator Beacon so you can stop worrying about me getting lost.

Update via Facebook 14 September. Will find it hard to believe but I have broken down again!!!! Half way up the Gibb River Road and had overheating problem, checked out by Mechanic at Over The Range Tyre & Mechanical. I broke down less than a k from the only mechanic on the Gibb.

Towed back to Derby (\$1600 plus RAC \$700) car is in Broome, they cannot find a fault as yet!! Stuck here until the car problem is sorted.

Update via email 14 September

Hi Guys, Yes I have broken down again, not very happy. Stuck in Derby, car is in Broome, back at Broome Mechanical. Still trying to find the problem.

It is overheating, initially thought the head was cracked but now uncertain.

Staying at Kimberley Cottages 8k out of Derby. Do not know when I will be back on the road. Will not continue on the Gibb but go by sealed road as it is too late in the season, too hot and rivers and falls drying out. Will continue on to Kununurra and Darwin and take it from there.

Will change phone to Telstra when I get to Kununurra. No service here. Regards Ray

Update Sunday 20 September. The cause of the overheating problem has been found by a 4x4 company in Derby. Ray has advice from Consumer Affairs Department in Broome and has emailed a claim to the Broome company for reimbursement of costs and expenses. He expects to get the parts installed for the fix on Wednesday 23 September.

Change of Dry casting venue

After paying to use the Yokine Reserve for nearly 37 years since November 1978, the Club is not able to get a booking there for the summer season 2015/16 due to the installation of cricket pitches and use by cricket clubs on Saturday and Sunday mornings and afternoons.

The Club has been offered and has booked the Mirrabooka Regional Open Space, and has also written to the Warwick Senior High School about using their oval.

Bookings for reserves are only done for a 6 month period, summer or winter. Every period becomes a juggling exercise for the City of Stirling (and other Councils) to try to fit all of the sporting and community groups who want to use a reserve on weekends into the ones that are suitable, recognising that some Clubs have "home grounds" and get priority.

In recent years the Club has shared the southern end of the Reserve with Hockey during the winter season, with the Club getting one weekend day a month and Hockey getting the other 7 weekend days a month.

Apart from when the City was doing ground maintenance, or big carnivals like the Junior T Ball carnival, the Club has been given bookings for most of the specific days we have asked for during the recent summer seasons.

If the Club wanted Yokine Reserve on a week day during either summer or winter, it seems we would have little problem getting the bookings.

The City of Stirling will give the Club keys to toilets beside the Reserve. An answer on storage space for the Club's dry casting equipment is expected soon.

Why no dry casting at Yokine Reserve

Following on from the article "Cricket pitches at Yokine Reserve" on page 36 of the September Reel Talk.

The Club put in its application for the use of Yokine Reserve for our dry casting for the summer season 2015/16. The Club received an email offering Mirrabooka Regional Open Space, the grassed area to the east of the Herb Graham Recreation Centre.

After phone calls, and an email giving details of how we use Yokine Reserve, the Club received the explanation and the diagram copied below.

Terry,

Thank you for your email.

The information you have provided has enabled a better assessment of the situation both parties are faced with.

The City of Stirling understands that Surf Casting and Angling Club of WA have utilised Yokine Regional Open Space for many years. However, the City of Stirling is experiencing exponential growth in the sport of cricket, and local clubs have in recent years have been forced to turn children away, capping their memberships due to limited reserve space and availability.

With the installation of centre wickets and practice nets at Yokine Regional Open Space East, the reserve will be utilised for junior and senior cricket fixtures on both Saturdays and Sundays. Given the nature of how cricket is fixtured, particularly junior cricket, fixturing all games away from Yokine Regional Open Space East – South one Sunday each month will not be viable. The space available at the reserve will thus be limited to an estimated 90m width in the south-eastern most corner of the reserve.

The City has identified several safety concerns with this location including the risk of cricket balls entering the surf casting and angling area, and vice versa with stray casting and sinkers. For this reason the two sports cannot co-exist at Yokine Regional Open Space East.

Currently, Mirrabooka Regional Open Space is the only available reserve large enough to accommodate your club needs.

As per the attached map, the City is of the belief that surf casting and angling can be safely accommodated at Mirrabooka Regional Open Space. Should the Surf Casting and Angling Club deem Mirrabooka Regional Open Space unsuitable, an alternative location will need to be sought, bearing in mind that Yoking Regional Open Space East will not be considered.

The City has investigated other potential locations such as Yokine Regional Open Space West and Hertha Road Reserve, however both reserves are utilised each Sunday by remote controlled flying clubs, and are thus unavailable.

It is understood that the decision to install cricket facilities at Yokine Regional Open Space East is not favourable to your club. However, as mentioned above, the new facility will enable hundreds of local children to play cricket during the summer sports season.

By offering your club a suitable alternative in Mirrabooka Regional Open Space, it is anticipated that all sports can continue successfully within the City of Stirling.

Should Surf Casting and Angling Club of WA decline the use of Mirrabooka Regional Open Space, the City is unable to offer an alternative location and thus would encourage the club to contact neighbouring local government agencies.

50 years ago. Rottnest Field Day, 11-12 September 1965

32 Senior members, 2 visitors and 2 juniors made up a total of 36 in all attending the venue, and after a pleasant journey over in the "Kat" the truck was loaded, and all members journeyed by bus to their various destinations. First stop by the bus was made for Bob Jensen and Ken Hunt at Geordie Bay, then off to "Radar" area where about a dozen of the boys had a quick look at the reef and decided it was perfect to fish with only ankle deep water running over it.

Among the boys to stay here were Norrie Cross and his friend Bruce McIntyre, who I believe slept in the old bunker with a hive of bees under the floorboards. Eric Sullivan, Tom Smith, Dave Latto, Doug Talbot and Denis Bodle slept in one bunker while Bill Utting, Ron Kildahl, Hew Hoy Yew and Warren Minnett were in the other with some friends of Bills. Arthur Horton Don Webb, Lofty Griffiths, Roger Broinowski, Terry Fuller were some who decided to fish from the West End area, but this spot proved to be almost barren except for a few rock fish and an eel caught by Lofty.

Harry Barrot, Allen Bunnett, Alf Rutland, Steve Demitro, Ron McQueen, Mike Dawson, Ian McLennan and myself decided to fish Strickland Bay area, but without any sea breeze, and the low tide, not even the sharks ventured into this area, although Alf Rutland and Junior visitor S. Stubbs finally landed a tailor. Young Les Newton, fishing near Doug caught a fish from this area which Doug eventually had identified by Rolly McKay as a "Chad". Les has entered for a State Record. Incidentally Eric Sullivan's Yellowtail kingfish and Ron Kildahl's Red Mullet have also been entered as State records.

Tiger Lilly, Hugh Gregory, Ted Savage and Ron Mansfield decided to fish at a point closer to the settlement and they certainly produced some fish. Bob eventually taking off the heaviest bag award with Tailor and Salmon weighing 68lbs.

Hugh knocked off the heaviest Tailor award with a beauty of 7lb 5ozs.

Arriving back at the jetty for Sunday morning "weigh-in" we were met by Bob Tichbon who had stayed with friends and fished the natural jetty area producing a nice haul of Tailor. Bob Jensen weighed a nice bag of fish all caught on his single handed rod.

Some of the other captures of note were Doug Talbot's Crayfish and Tom Smith's Buff Bream of $11\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., the heaviest fish caught on the venue.

It was pleasing to see the more fortunate anglers sharing their hard won captures with unlucky anglers, and this reflects good Club spirit between all Club Members. There were some mighty tired anglers on the return trip to Fremantle, and we all enjoyed another calm crossing.

So ended a busy venue. My many thanks to all members for the help I received, Tom Smith, lan McLennan, and many others were kept busy checking figures etc. My heartiest congrats to award Members who all fished hard and long for their captures. Hoping for a good attendance at Lancelin in October. (Details as listed in "Reel Talk").

Taking photos of fish

We all like to have photos of our fish to show to other people and get published. There are some points to remember when taking photos of your fish which will give good results even with simple cameras.

Make sure the fish is clean, with no sand, no blood, no visible slime or any bits hanging out, and fins and tail spread as naturally as possible.

Choose the background, try to get a neutral and uniform area, without distracting cars, tree trunks, buildings, signs, poles, boxes, other people, beer cans, etc

Check the lighting. Set your camera to use the flash every time, even in daylight.

Otherwise photos in the sun will have too high contrast and dark areas. If your flash is powerful enough it will nicely "fill in" the shadows, but there's still the problem of the person holding the fish squinting at the bright light.

A photo taken in the shade with "fill in" flash often gives a better picture. Look out for and avoid very bright sunlit areas in the background which can affect the exposure, unless you know how to set your camera to ignore or compensate for these.

Compose the picture to photograph only the important part, fill the frame with the person holding the fish, rotate the camera for portrait photos, where the height is more than the width, or landscape photos, the usual orientation of a camera.

Have the person hold the fish close at a 30 to 45 degree angle with the head upright, with most fingers concealed behind the fish.

Don't get the camera too close to the fish, because this can distort the image, make the fish look bigger than it really is, and make some parts over-exposed compared to other parts due to the flash.

<u>Don't hold the fish out towards the camera</u>, because this distorts the photo and makes the fish look larger than it really is. You may think this effect is good, but it is very obvious, <u>is</u> <u>misleading and often won't get published.</u>

Make sure the camera focuses on the fish. Read the manual for how your camera focuses and lets you know when it is ready, particularly in low light. And then practice with the settings and see the results.

Above all, take at least 2 photos of each pose, preferably more, and take photos of a couple of different poses. After all, digital photos cost you just zero cents each, and having several is good insurance against some photos having some problems, and lets you select the best.

Management of South Coast Commercial Fisheries

A new Fisheries Management Paper has been released setting out proposed plans for the future management of a number of South Coast commercial fisheries.

Among the Department of Fisheries' proposals, which are now open for public comment, is placing this group of fisheries under two new management plans.

The purpose of this paper is to set the context for the Review of South Coast Commercial Fish Trap, G-net and Open-Access Line and Net Scalefish Fisheries and Squid Jig Fishery (Review). This includes providing an overview of these fisheries, summarising the issues relevant to these fisheries and providing the Department of Fisheries' proposed direction for the future management of these fisheries on the South Coast for discussion and consultation.

This paper was designed and prepared by the Department to encourage public involvement in the development of formal management proposals that will form the basis for the development of formal management arrangements for these fisheries under the review.

Comments regarding the contents of this discussion paper are sought from all stakeholders, including commercial and recreational fishers, industry members and organisations, relevant community interest groups, government agencies and interested members of the public.

Following consideration of the management-related matters raised in submissions on the discussion paper, the Department will finalise proposals for consultation with those that are likely to gain access to the relevant fishery/fishing activity.

While this is occurring the Department will establish an Independent Panel to consider and make recommendations on future access to the FBL condition (fish trap and G-net fishing) and open-access activities/fisheries (i.e. line, squid and net fishing) for the purposes of the Review.

The recommendations will then be considered by the Department and subject to the Minister for Fisheries approval, form the basis of legislation to give effect to the future management of these fisheries.

Although specific proposals have been outlined for comment, your views are sought on any of the matters in the document that are of significance to you and/or your group.

The oceanic waters of the South Coast between Black Point, 115°30'S and the Western Australian/South Australian border are the last in Western Australia where commercial openaccess line and net fishing activities remain. The rest of WA either has formal management arrangements in place for these fishing activities/methods or has been through a similar Review process.

On 18 December 2014, the Minister advised WAFIC and Recfishwest that as part of a package to address herring stock issues, the South Coast G-net fishery would be closed on 1 March 2015. At that time the Minister also advised that it was his intention to establish a voluntary fisheries adjustment scheme for affected G-net fishers and to undertake a review of the status and management arrangements (including the ongoing closure of the G-net fishery) for herring in late 2016. The development of formal management arrangements for the G-net fishery through this Review will be subject to the outcomes of the G-net fishery voluntary fisheries adjustment scheme and the review of herring stock status and management arrangements (due in late 2016)

These will only cover commercial fishing in the ocean, not in the estuaries where most of the interactions occur between commercial and recreational fishers.

The public comment period will end on 6 November 2015.


