t Meeting of the Club will be held on Wednesday, 11th. September, 1957 in the National Fitness Rooms, 50 James Street, Perth, commencing at 8 p.m. sharp.

CASTING NOTES: We had our first casting outing for the season on Sunday, 18th. August at the Floreat Park Recreational Ground. This ground is ideal for our casting outings and we are indeed fortunate to have the use of such a first class oval.

Unfortunately we got away to a late start, but as we get better organised in committee these annoying hold-ups will be entirely eliminated.

The outing was quite a success and the attendance of 24 club members was rather satisfying.

Two events were cast, and as we have not yet set new handicaps. Both events were judged on average distance.

The first event was the  $3\frac{1}{4}$ , oz. Weight and Tom Neil won this with an average of 1322 yds, 2nd was John Bellman with 1202 yds and 3rd was Bert Payne with 1172yds.

The second event was the spinner eyent and Noel Knight was first with an average of 1172 yds, Tom Neil 2nd with 110 yds, and Doug Edward 3rd with 1062 yds.

Main Point Scorers over both events were - Tom Neil 19, John Bellman 15, Doug Edward, Bert Payne, Noel Knight 14, Felix Hollywell 12 and Aubrey Badger 9.

All the above boys cast consistently well, but Hal Neil and Bert Payne in particular showed vast improvement on last year's performances. Looks like "Panther" is ready to graduate into the expert class. Of the newer members of the Club, two who showed particular good form were Aubrey Badger from Northam and Hal Cook, while the "Old Master" Felix Hollywell demonstrated his ability with his "Egg Beater" ably supported by Arch Ticklie.

It is very apparent that the majority of Club Members prefer to cast with their standard fishing gear and with this object your Committee has drawn up a proposed new set of Casting Rules and Events for future outings.

Event: to be cast: 1. Spinner Event

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2. Blohs Event

Bait Event

3. Scaly Mackeral Event (if a "Scaly" can be manufactured)

Will all members please studythese and be prepared to vote Conditions:

- (a) Only standard fishing gear as purchased over the counter to be used.
- (b) All lines to be level and no leaders to be used other than those used to attach baits, swivels etc.
- The club will supply all blobs, baits, spinners etc. (c)
- (d) The field will be laid down with a double row of flags 10-15 yds apart and casts landing inside this boundary will score an additional bonus point.

- (e) The first flag will be set at 50 yds from the starting line and casts landing short of this mark will not score. (This may be adjusted for single handed events).
- (f) That points be allocated to the first ten placegetters on a 10 down to 1 basis for each event and these points to be tallied in conjunction with points scored on our field day outings.
- (g) The competitions continue right throughout the year up until the Annual General Meeting and the winner (virtually the best all-round club man) to receive the Les Shand "Mystery Trophy" which is awarded annually.
- (h) As soon as a handicap system can be brought into operation all events will be on an Average Handicap System.
- (i) The Committee will have final say on what constitutes standard fishing gear.
- (j) Club members wishing to carry on experimenting and casting with the lighter types of gear will be given an opportunity at each outing, but there will be no competitions run with this gear.
- (k) When Field Days are run the Casting Day will be the second Sunday following monthly meeting.

The next Casting outing will be on Sunday, 22nd. Sept. at the Floreat Park Recreational Ground. Casting will commence at 10 a.m. sharp.

FISHING COMPETITION: Will all members please be prepared to rote on the following suggested amendments to our Fishing competition.

- (a) That weight of fish entered be published in each copy of the Reel Talk and to maintain interest an additional prize be allocated for a "Mystery Weight". This weight to be selected by our Patron, Mr. Jim Munro, and be placed in a sealed envelop and lodged with our bank until the completion of the competition. The member catching the fish nearest to this weight wins this section.
- (b) That consideration be given to fish caught on Field Days and entered in Section 5 of this competition earning additional Bonus Points.

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If club members require entry forms they can be picked up from Charlie Cugley or Les Shand.

Stop Press - Les Shand wants to know if blowfish are eligible in the Point per 1b Score - if so, he reckons he would be leading the competition.

FIELD DAY: Well chaps it's on again - Field Day Organiser Ray Porter has arranged the next field day to be at our old favourite haunt, Garden Island, on the weekend 14/15th September. Full details as to rendezvous and times of departure will be arranged and notified at the next meeting. Better get the gear out and give it the once over.

FLY FISHING FOR TROUT: Trout Fly Fishing seems to be in the newsof late, and as I have overheard several members asking the "whys" and "wherefores", I thought I would try and explain some of the rudiments of this art for the benefit/of us who have never seen trout fly fishing.

I don't profess to be an authority on the subject though I have "flogged" trout streams for over 25 years and if I were to "flog" them for another 50 years I would still be learning.

The claim that certain local fish have been caught on trout flies I can well believe, but the claim that salmon and large sea tailer have been caught on them leaves some doubt in my mind - they might probably have been caught on sea trout or salmon flies - I will later try and explain why.

First of all there are two distinct methods of fly fishing - dry fly and wet fly fishing.

I expect most of you have at some time or other seen for es or insects drop on the water from overhanging branches, or blown on to the water by the breeze - on trout streams these are carried on the surface by the currents and are taken by the feeding trout.

Dry Fly Fishing is making an imitation of these flies and letting them float down on the surface - All these flies or insects - of which there are thousands of varieties have a name, not the long latin ones used by Entomoligists, but simple ones given them by the Trout Anglers, such as "March Brown", "Red Spinner", "Coachman", "White Moth" etc. The imitations being made to kid the trout that they are the real thing. The materials used in the making up of these flies are not the brain waves of tackle makers. They are the materials brought to perfection by Trout Anglers, themselves experimenting throughout the years. Often we find flies named after the Angler who first devised tem one comes easily to mind "Greenwells Glory", invented, some 30 to 40 years by a Mr. Greenwell. No - Imitation are not j t a few feathers tied to a hook.

For instance, the "March Brown" is made of brownish wool wound round the shank of the hook over a few fine strands of feather (woodlock) that protrude as a tail, then bound on with very fine gold tinsel - the legs - called tackle are made from a few twists of Red Hackle - these are those long glistening feathers one sees on the neck of a Rhode Island Red Rooster, then the wings are made from a piece of feather from a Woodcocks Wind.

So to catch those feeding trout all you have to do is to find which one of those thousands of flies they are feeding on and give them the works - you can narrow the field down quite a bit when you get to know your district

end get to know what month or even week these flies hatch cut, as it is no good using a particular fly in August when the real thing only hatches out for a few weeks in January.

I have often watched these flies float down on local waters and have only seen them taken by river gardies. Cnce or twice I have seen pilchard rise just like trout to take surface flies, and a friend of mine who is another trout angler has often suggested we give those schools of nullet often seen near Riverton Bridge a go on trout flies as they often seem to be taking surface flies.

So much for Dry Fly Fishing.

Wet Fly Fishing is letting your fly sink below the surface and drift with the current or drawing it slowly through the water. These flies are usually made up a bit different to the Dry Flies, having more hackle and sometimes no wings and are chiefly made to imitate Nymphs and other aquatic insects. Now, if one of these in any way resembles our shrimp in the water, it can easily be understood why local fish - especially bream - are caught on them. One point mystifies me a little, in the Wet Bly Fishing for trout they never hook themselves and very seldom do you feel the bite. You watch the fly as soon as you see a swirl or the flash of the trout you strike and you have to be mighty quick on the strike as they take it and spit it out in one action, as soon as they feel it is an imitation it's out, probably our local are not educated to this yet and just swallow it.

As to ocean fishing I doubt very much whether Salmon or Sea Tailer will take these flies, they might take the much larger ones used for sea trout or salmon fishing.

These are much larger and much more brilliant in their colouring. What they imitate Heaven only knows, I often think fish take them just out of curiosity, anyway I wave a few of these and one day when the tailer are on I will give them a go and report results.

Trust these few lines might help those members who have been reading "Rod and Line".
