DRY CASTING RULES

RULE 1.

Casting shall be under the direct supervision of the Casting Day Organiser. Officials (starters and markers etc.,) shall be appointed by him as required. His decision shall be final.

RULE 2.

Any member who has not placed his name on the starters "List of Competitors" before the commencement of the first event shall thereby eliminate himself from that event.

RULE 3.

Practice casting shall cease when the competition commences. Any member infringing this rule, except with the direct permission of the Casting Day Organiser, who may give this permission, if requested, to clear line after an overrun etc., shall forfeit his next cast.

RULE 4.

Casting shall be in the correct order as per "List of Competitors" Any member not responding to the call by the starter by the time he is due to cast, shall forfeit that cast. Provided however that the "Casting Day Organiser" has the right to waive this rule in respect to officials or upon request by a member having an overrun etc.

RULE 5.

Members are to line up to the rear, left hand corner of the casting arena in their correct order when called by the assistant starter.

RULE 6.

Only that member actually casting is allowed in the casting arena.

RULE 7.

No cast shall be made until permission is given by the starter who shall wait until the all clear is signalled by the marker and he has replied with the same signal before giving that permission. Any defaulter of this rule shall not be credited with a score for that cast.

DRY CASTING RULES Page 2.

RULE 8.

Upon completing a cast, the caster is to immediately vacate the casting arena and move clear to wind in.

RULE 9.

All events will be contested with: Standard fishing gear using level line throughout. (Line of same gauge or breaking strain - no heavier leaders allowed). Any infringement of this rule will subject the offender to loss of all points for that day's casting and he will forfeit his right to complete the programme.

HULE 10.

Weights, except when used with baits, and spinners, must have attached not less than twelve inches of half inch yellow tape. Tape is to be attached by one end, not tied in the middle. (This rule also applies to practice casting and must be strictly adhered to). Penalty for non-compliance - no score for that cast.

F.LE 11.

The object being cast (weight, blob, spinner, etc.,) must leave the rod tip to count as a cast.

JLE 12.

Mis-casts, such as backlash, breakoffs or failure to put reel into free spool or trip the bail wire, shall count as a cast.

正E 13。

In the event of a breakoff it is the responsibility of the caster concerned to retrieve the weight etc., immediately the course is clear.

LULE 14.

All markers shall wear protective headgear at all times when marking. No junior is permitted to mark.

JLE 15.

Markers are to move clear of the target area and when ready, signal the "All clear", to the starter, by waving a green flag from signal to side above the head. Casting may be stopped by the markers in an emergency by raising the red flag above the head.

DRY CASTING RULES Page 3.

RULE 16.

Markers shall stand to the side of the target area in accuracy events, not behind, and shall stand perfectly still while the cast is being made.

RULE 17.

Points are to be allocated from where the weight or blob strikes the ground, not to where it bounces.

RULE 18.

Marking shall be to the nearest foot in distance events. In accuracy events, the target area will be either a 10 or 20 ft. radius circle and scoring using the accuracy marking tapes shall be as follows:-

"Within a 1 ft. radius of the target, 10 points in the 10 ft. target area and 20 points in the 20 ft. target area.

Within a 1 ft. and a 2 ft. radius circle of the target, 9 or 19 points respectively.

Within a 2 ft. and a 3 ft. radius circle of the target, 8 or 18 points respectively."


Scoring shall continue in a like manner until either the 10 or 20 ft. radius circle is exceeded when no points shall be registered.

RULE 19

The accuracy marking tapes shall consist of 10 and 20 ft. lengths of the best quality tape available and at one end shall be attached a ring of sifficient size to allow the shaft of the target to pass through. The tapes shall be graduated in feet.

Between the first and second foot graduations, the figures 9 or 19 respectively shall be marked.

The markings shall continue in a like manner until between the last graduation and the end of the tape, the figure l is marked.



DRY CASTING RULES Page 4.

Rule 20.

Handicaps for distance events shall be assessed, in feet on the "True Average Distance" for any such event, If three casts are successful, the total distance of those three casts shall be divided by three, to find the "True Average Distance". If only two casts are successful, the total distance of those two casts shall be divided by two to find the "True Average Distance". In the event of only one cast being successful, the distance cast shall be the "True Average Distance".

The "True Average Distance" shall be subtracted from the base of 450 ft. for double-handed rod events or the base of 300 ft. (for single-handed rod events and the figure so obtained, shall be Handicap, provided that no handicap for double-handed rod events shall be greater than 180 ft. and no handicap for single-handed rod events, shall be greater than 150 ft.

Handicaps shall be checked everytime a member casts in any handicap event.

If the base figures are exceeded, the handicap shall be revised by reducing the handicap by the figure obtained when the base figure concerned is subtracted from the sum of the average distance recorded and the currect handicap.

In the event of a member not exceeding or equalling his handicap after having cast in six similar handicap events, his handicap shall be reassessed on the highest "True Average Distance" cast in those last six events.

JLE 21.

In both double-handed and single-handed accuracy events juniors will cast at the close targets from the normal casting position. When casting at furthermost targets they will cast from a position 30 ft. in front for the double-handed and 15 ft. in front for the single-handed events.
