### EDITOR'S NOTES:

If you were not at the August General Meeting you missed hearing ROLEY McKAY the fish expert from the W.A. Museum, talk on poisonous and venomous fish of W.A.

Roley spoke of blowrish, boxfish andporcupine fish in one group, chinamar fish and red bass in another group and the occurrence of seasonally poisonous rish.

The venomous fish included the scorpian fish group, stone fish group, rabbit fish, stingrays, stingarees, cobblers and catfish.

He also referred to the group which can cause injury by mechanical means i.e. fin and body spines, gill rakers and tail spines as in surgeon fish and tail scutes as in large trevally. His excellent talk was illustrated with preserved specimens and color slides.

NORRIE CHUSS of East Bullsbrook (that's a long way to come from to attend a meeting) enjoyed Roley's talk so much that he sent the

Consequent to Roley's interesting lecture on poisonous fishes at the August General Meeting, the following article by a female member of the reporting staff of the "Pacific Stars and Stripes", W.A.C., S.F.C. Jean Bienert, may be worthy of inclusion in Reel Talk.

### "A NERVE-WRACKING BLOWFISH TOOT"

It's a dish fit for a king, but not for an emperor. Not the Japanese emperor, at least. He is forbidden to eat it; it might poison him.

It might poison anyone, for that matter, but millions of Japanese gobble down 7,000 tone of fugu, the fatal blowfish, when it's in season.

The season is now, so my assignment read "do or die (if you must) at the Tsutaya Restaurant". They serve fugu. I saw my lawyer, made out my will, then headed on to eat dinner.

The Tsutaya Restaurant comes well recommended by the Diner's Club. I was happy to know this was an approved place to die. Inside I discovered several small private dining rooms rather than the usual large single room. Could it be that the reason was not so much for private dining, but for private dying? I tried to forget the notion.

I knelt on the zabutor. If my knees hadn't been shaking so much, kneeling would have been easier. Shortly a waitress placed a plate in front of me.

Sliced sliver-thin, the white meat appeared almost lacy with the veins tracing delicate patterns in the flesh. It looked harmless enough, but I wasn't allowing myself to be fooled by appearances. My palms were sweating.

Holding my chop-sticks with one hand and feeling my pulse with the other I dipped the fish into its accompanying sauce and ate it. A minute elapsed. I breathed a little easier, thinking myself out of danger. The lethal poison tetradontoxin is an ingredient of the fugu's entrails. It takes only minutes to attack one's nervous and respiratory systems.

### Contd.....

Had I swallowed even just a little poison, a doctor could only pump my stomach and hope for the best. No antidote is known. This fact doesn't discourage fugu connoisseurs, but I was scared stiff.

I asked the waitress to tell me more about fugu. She said it's illegal for just anyone to buy the fish for home-cooking fun. If you really are intent on cooking it yourself, you must first find a licensed fugu cher. Then spend 60 days following his directions and practising on at least 3,000 fish.

Once you reel adapt at removing the poisonous parts, you prove your proficiency to Japan's Fugu Association. If you can pass their test, you're allowed to purchase and serve the blowfish.

The old saying "Tractice makes perfect" apparently doesn't hold true for even the skilled fugu chefs. Over 200 fugu eaters still die annually.

In Tokyo a hundred first-class restaurants buy the fish already butchered under Augu Association supervision. About 700 other restaurants prepare the fish themselves.

For the fugu consumer's protection, a Japanese Ministry of Health regulation requires each restaurant to have a telephone and be reasonably close to a doctor.

My knees were a little less wobbly now. I was thinking the danger period must have passed by now. Anyway the telephone and nearby doctor were reassuring I took a big bite, almost enjoying it.

Suddenly I felt myself getting numb all over. My chopsticks went "plonk" on the table. Had I just become another fugu statistic? No, it was also my rirst experience at drinking sake!
