Jim carried out the weigh-in at Ricey and I thank him for the 100% job. The juniors fared well at Ricey the best being RAY REID 51b 6oz, MARK TUCKER 11b, DON TAYLOR 11b and DEREK JONES 14oz.

On the Sunday after the weigh-ins at Radar and Ricey, the truck and bus returned us to the settlement and on to the jetty for the reloading of the boat. This again was done with great speed and the rest of the fish were weighed in - then down to the local for a well earned drink with the boys.

We left at 1 p.m. Sunday and had a nice smooth trip back to the joy of DENNIS GREEN.

The members will agree that we missed the presence of GRAHAM BASKERVILLE and when he hears of our fine captures he will be furious - as he has lost his place in the Top Ten - Mad Graham?

A few little accidents happened which should have been prevented. One unlucky person had one of his rod runners smashed through mishandling and one article went over the side; only little things, but be more careful!

I have learnt that BOB FREDERICKS has a method for testing the strength of a rod. This is done by placing 2/3 or the rod over your shoulder with the reel attached and holding the tip with both hands. Bob tells me that if the rod stands up to the strain the rod has good strength. But, to Bob's amusement the rod broke and this was not too good was it Bob. Bob found out his method fishing at Cathederal Rock.

All told, we had a fine field day and many workers did their share to help out. Until next field day where we hope to see many members and lots of fish caught, we'll sign off.

KALBARRI IN ITS PRIME - 1947:

Some time ago I approached Tom Smith for an article for "Reel Talk" and he came up with the following article (although I think he is shirking it a bit - I'll get an original later). Apparently Tom was renovating a client's home and came upon some old newspapers. He decided to peruse them during his lunch break and came upon the following article in "The West Australian" dated Saturday, 20th December, 1947.

"MURCHISON MOUTH":

The Murchison River is better known along the upper reaches of its 400-mile course than it is at the mouth; yet this is an historic spot as well as an ideal holiday retreat.

When the coasts of Australia were first explored, navigators were always on the lookout for waterways along which the heart of the continent might be penetrated. The Murchison River was named in honour of Sir Roderick Impey Murchison, Director-General of the Geological Society of Great Britain and Ireland. It flows into Gantheaume Bay, where there is tremendous surf.

Lietenant (afterwards Sir George Grey) and his party were wrecked there on a rock ledge to the north of the opening on Easter Day 1839. As their boats were lost and their stores and tobacco ruined by salt water, there was "no recourse left but to endeavour to reach Perth by walking. A well-beaten native track running to the S. by E. which was exactly our line of route. There were springs of water at every few hundred yards 10 and 12 ft deep".

So writes Grey in his journal and this path is still followed running "parallel to the sea, distant one mile" when picnic parties journey to Red Bluff, a magnificent headland formed of red sandstone. Some persons fish here, but it is risky, as the sea surges up with terrific force and gurgles through the natural blowholes.

The river abounds in fish. During a recent ten-day holiday a party caught 2461b of kingfish, 2501b bream, 211b of tailor and 241b of cod. Crayfish are also plentiful.

Just south of the mouth is a reef covered with oysters. A woman visitor once was lucky enough to find a pearl in an oyster. The rest of the party practically swept the reef bare, but no one else was so fortunate. However, that was a long time ago and millions more oysters have grown since. The man with a gun has the choice of such wild game as kangaroo, rabbits, goats, foxes and duck.

About 15 miles up the river is Murchison House Station, which was founded by Charles Von Bibra as a horse and cattle station in the 1850's.

"MURCHISON MOUTH" CONT'D:

In the private cemetery are the graves of two of the pioneer flyers of the North-West air mail route. The planes were seen off by a crowd of persons at the old aerodrome at Wooree, near Geraldton, on December 5, 1921. They were flying in formation and were heading for the flat on the north side of the Murchison River. The plane piloted by Lieutenant Robert Fawcett, of South Australia, lost eight too soon and crashed into a paddock near the homestead. The pilot and his mechanic, Edwards Wilson Broad of Leederville, were killed and their bodies were buried near where they fell. Stone was brought from the Bindarri Hills and iron railings sent by Mr. Fawcett, of South Australia. Archbishop Riley came with the rector of Geraldton to consecrate the burial ground, and the graves are still lovingly tended by the people at the homestead.

The mouth of the Murchison is indeed an interesting spot and has long been a favourite camping place for men in the listrict in spite of the rough sand track by which it is reached. A sportsman with a four -ton truck with a four-wheel drive conveys parties to his camp where he caters for visitors as they do on the Abrolhos Islands; and it is generally agreed that the delights of the river are worth the rough journey there.

"TENTATIVE SOCIAL EVENT:"

Our new social organiser, Teny Smith, is making preparations to run a Car Trial-Picnic-Cricket Match, possibly at Gidgiegannup, on Sunday, 29th October.

This type of event has a good deal of merit, and if as successful as the one run along similar lines by Rudy Lerch last year, will be well worth attending.

Tony has only just started preparing for the outing and has a big job ahead of him. All he asks is that each member gives the outing some thought and makes a note of the date and makes the effort to come along with the family.

Tony was dissapointed that he didn't receive more forms of the tentative types of functions that members want run in the future than he did. The only way he will know what you, the members, want, is if you let him know so that he can do something about it.

Give him your thoughts at the next meeting!

A special meeting (or instruction period) will be held to either accept the constitution or amend it where necessary and if there isn't sufficient time, the meeting will be held over to another date until it is finalised.

When the new Constitution has been accepted, it will be re-done and put into book form, along with the field day rules and etiquette, drycasting rules and club etiquette, 3-to-1 rules, 4-wheel drive rules and club etiquette. Each member will then receive an up-to-date and comprehensive club booklet, containing everything he wants to know.

Along with a group of fellow members, Dave was standing in water near a nice hole catching skippy one after the other, at night, when he said to the chap alongside him, "I must be dead"! "How do you come to that conclusion" enquired his companion? "I'm in heaven" said Dave as he pulled in another double header.

Last instruction period took the form of a talk and illustration on a blackboard by myself on what I know about reading the beach.

I didn't hear too many disagree with what I had to say, and even though I don't profess to know all there is to know on the subject, I hope members benefitted by what I had to say.
