#### EDITORIAL:

A trend I have noted over the last four menths is the poor attendances at our field days. This is not conducive to a successful angling club and isn't very encouraging to our hard-working field day officer. I know the weather hasn't been the best, but they have been the closest venues we have and it is no reflection on those members who say that we don't have encugh close venues, to see the low numbers attending- particularly when they can still fish somewhere else on the same day. If we want to get the club back on the right track we should all try to be present on our field days as angling is what it is all about!

Some members have voiced dissatisfaction with the present points system, and if this is the case, we should start having a good look at it now in time to do something constructive before the next year's fishing competition. If you think this point is valid and you have a suggestion or two, you may write a "Letter to the Editor" (as long as it's not too lengthy) and I will print it so that members may have a think about it. This will enable something to be done towards the end of this current season.

A few of the more important points that are not favourable with the present system expressed were:
"That it does nothing to conserve fish as we still catch as many fish as we want anyway;" "That a lot of fish, (namely rock cod, buff bream, wirras and the like) that are found around reefs and live in close proximity to them and which can be fished out because of this, are being fished for, weighed in, and then disposed of;" "That it has no incentive points to catch the varities to compensate for weight of larger fish; also that it doesn't seem to hold the interest of members as indicative of attendances".

I personally think that if the interest is waning in this activity of the club, or the club itself, we should have a very good look at our present situation.

We, as a club, don't appear to take a great deal of interest in any other angling body, club or angling activity. This may or may not be a good or bad thing, but we want to also have a good look at this aspect, particularly in view of the fact that we- as a CLUB- have taken on the job of running the drycasting for the Australian Championships in Albany in 1975. To make this a success, we must all "put our shoulders to the wheel".

We might all meet and enjoy the company of other really fine people in the course of our endeavours.

A personal thanks to Terry O'Hara for his article for this month's "Reel Talk". It is good. Hope a few more members take a leaf out of your book Terry. Could always do with some interesting stories instead of members having to read what I have to write.

## THE AFTERMATH OF CUVIER By Terry O'Hara

"When Cuvier turns it on the bay looks as if someone dumped a whole pile of lemon saline in there, for man, it's alive!" - quote Max Garth.

Cuvier is not a place for men weak of heart. For all the members of our expedition it was an experience never to be forgotten and which had a profound influence on us, both as fishermen and individuals. We witnessed fantastic duels, with man pitted against fish, ranging from the express-like tunas and mackeral, to the heavyweight-like the Cuvier "Splasher", but we also gaped in awe at nature's majesty in and around the huge bay and cliffs at Cuvier. We'll remember event after event, but these I'll leave to a more competent scribe. What I'll tell is what hasn't been told, of the people of the north, their great hospitality and the fishing in the heart of Carnarvon.

The story starts at the Cuvier cliffs themselves when we were returning from a sortie on one afternoon in which we enjoyed a bit of southern tailor fishing, only thing was, the tailor averaged 2½ft long and 9½lb. Malparker's biggest, a very lean 1½ pounder. Anyway there we were descending the 200ft cliff along the track when crunch, Mal's car stopped dead. Halfway down a cliff, 20-odd miles along tracks from the nearest road, what a predicament! Graham (a mechanical troubleshooter of a type) was soon on the scene and had the situation under control, his analysis: one inoperative gearbox and on a Valiant, that means BIG trouble!!

It was the next day before we could do anything (except fish, ha!) to the car. While pondering on howwe could get it to Carnarvon, a friend of Max's suddenly offered to tow the car in with his Toyota. This really touched us, this great comradeship which exists up there is really something. So Mal eventually slid the Valiant into the mechancis at Carnarvon on the Monday of the long weekend. Boy, you should have seen that gearbox. It looked like the remnants of a Bazza McKenzie king hit, teeth everywhere, what a mess! The obvious, but time consuming answer, was to have a complete box flown up from Perth (an operation to touch the pocket of the strongest of us). Mennwhile, we had three days to squander in Carnarvon. The Carnarvonites were great to us. Max, his usual efforescent self, lent us his trusty VW for the whole three days, the owner (I forget his name) of the caravan park in which we stowed the caravanette (he is a Carnarvon ANSA sportsfisher) charged us buckleys for the period and those scaley critters who swim beneath the wharf must of heard we were there for they also put on a great show.

To get back to the fishing, that's what we were up here for, so whynot give the "kingy kids" a run for their money! A fresh had come down the river and as we walked that mile out to the end of the jetty, we could see the murky water beneath us. Mal commented, between mouthfuls of fried scallops that it wasn't usually too good like this. Just when we were near the end, we saw a torch flashing in the murky light. Mulloway coming up, things looked better.

For gear, we had borrowed 2 "heavyweight" handlines around the 2001b mark and coupled with our own two of about the some vintage, we were in business. Our bait was tailor, tops up here, the only thing was that it was a fillet off an 11 pounder. One more mulla came up about 7 o'clock, then nothing. The "kingy kids" soon left, only we three remaining. Bob got a tug, struck and took up the weight. Soon a 201b-odd fish was flapping on the surface but he loosened the pressure for a second and that was that, - minus one fish! Then about two minutes later he redeemed himself with a good run and a well worked 22 pounder was winched up the 12ft cliff with the long gaff. Boy, I'd never fished for mulloway like this before. Mal was next into action with a good 251b fish, followed quickly by a beauty of 321b. Where are they I said to myself as the 250lb string tightened around my finger. Off went three foot then wap, I socked him one and started my labour of love, hauling him in. They are real sluggers and it sure needs a bit of muscle. Anyway, I had him on the surface and being the more agile I was elected to do the gaffing again while Mal held the line. I sunk the pick and handed it and the fish up. Next thing I saw was a 301b plus fish fly past me and bounce as if on elastic, five foot out of the water: Mal had been knocked and had lost his grip on the gaff but not the line. The result was a 331b mulloway swingingin midair, Mal in the meantime tried to regain his balance and get that fish the hell out of there. Luckily it didn't get off and I now had the heaviest of the evening. No sooner was it unhooked than off went one of Mal's lines. This one was a bruiser and teally had him working. Ittried to wrap up the piles, but with a forcelike Mal against it; it was futile. Scon a 34 pounder was flapping on the decking. I had another run dropped, Bob scored No. 2, but Mal, (the so and sc) must have been touched. He had three more fish before we decided to pack up at 10.30. To cap it off, he had just cut a line he had secured to a pipe on the jetty, ready to wind it in, when it began to move seaward, result, a 271b fish. So here we were, 9 mulloway between  $18\frac{1}{2}$ 1b on 341b, over 2001b of fish to carry along that milelong jetty. We made it in the end, but gave the gaff an eternal set.

The next day the gearbox was flown in and fitted and at last we were ready to leave, three days later than planned. What a trip from all aspects and one I definitely will never forget. Well, not until next Cuvier trip I suppose!
