

Presentation of fish for weigh in

A reminder. Section 2.3.5 of Competition Rules is:

All fish presented at the weigh in must be gutted and gilled, and in a washed, clean and edible condition. All fish to be weighed must be presented in a natural fibre bag such as hessian or cloth based bag. The use of plastic, woven plastic or woven fibreglass bags is prohibited. Fish may be brought to the weigh in area in eskies or damp natural fibre bags.

Field Day sign on, fishing and weigh in times

If you don't like any of the proposed sign on, fishing or weigh in times because of the heat or whatever, there is plenty of time to comment or ask for changes. Dry Casting report 4 August 2013

Gary Parkinson, ever on the improve, scored well on a few accuracy casts and only sliced one distance cast. Peter Pekaar was a clear winner in the seniors distance casting, as was Gary Gildersleeves in the veterans, except for a break off in the artificial bait.

In the veterans double handed accuracy Allan Jones won a close contest over Terry Fuller and Gary Gildersleeves, in part due to a bullseye on his third cast. Gary wasn't helped by suffering an unexpected break-off.

In the mini juniors single handed accuracy event Owen Williams scored a great bullseye, putting on the brakes perfectly to a cast that was sailing well over the target. In the seniors single handed accuracy, Peter Pekaar matched Owen's feat in scoring a bullseye, on the way to a win over Rhys Jones. In the veterans single handed accuracy, Dean Stewart had a close win over Garry Gildersleeves.

August field day Rottnest

As in past years, the August 2013 Rottnest field day lived up to expectations, and those of us who went on the Saturday and Sunday had a mind blowing fishing experience with Skippy.

As last year, the thought of a Rottnest field day was always an anticipation of catching great fish like salmon, yellowtail kingfish, skippy, tailor, misc. species and of course herring. Unfortunately although nearly a nil appearance of yellowtail kingfish and tailor and nil on salmon it was memorable weekend of catching great fish.

A team of eight SCAC fisherpersons, Mark and Wendy Hansen, Peet and Sandra Wessels, Greg Keet, Ian Taggart, Theo Van Niekerk and Peter Osborne arrived Friday night, and divided into the two pre-arranged cottages.

While one group participated in some pizza etc. at the local pub on Friday night and watched the football, the rest of us had our precooked meals run through the microwave.

Saturday morning at 11am we had the bus trip out to West End with our stopping at the bakery to get a hot pie to eat for lunch on the way out. And as in past years, to my and Sandra's palate, the lamb and rosemary pies were on the agenda as they really are a great pie. All the anticipation of this came to nought as at the time of our arrival, they were not yet cooked. We had other selections with a request to have them available for us on Sunday morning.

On arrival, we spread out from the Tennis Courts to Wilsons. Those that tried Wilsons could not get the herring to go on the bite using bait, very unusual. Mark and Wendy tried the Tennis Courts and found herring and misc wrasse. Greg Keet wasn't feeling the best and while riding out on the bus had decided not to fish and save his energy for Sunday as looking at weather reports it looked like a better day.

The rest of us tried Wilsons for tailor. Sandra concentrated efforts on fishing in typical tailor white water suds.

Only Sandra found that one tailor, a good one. On close inspection it was a big fish and very lean, probably due to having a ganged set of about 6/0 hooks caught up in his mouth.

A bit of light braid was tied to the top hook and looks as though the tailor bit it through.

Theo thrashed the corner for tailor, nil result on this species, but he did capture a good snook. All the fish I caught were tarwhine and were undersize. Did manage a few small herring later in the afternoon

An effort around the corner of Wilsons by Ian proved fruitless as it was full of squid latching onto and destroying the mulie bait soon as it hit the water. As we did not have squid jigs to enable a good hook-up we thought we would leave this for Sunday afternoon. On leaving Wilsons, pretty well empty handed, and going to the top of the cliff we spotted a whale, with some broaching action, with a calf. This sighting is always a great feeling to see.

We knew we were not lost when we made our way back. Peet and Sandra had returned some 30/40 minutes prior to lan and me, Theo a little later. Peet had a spool of ghost cotton on his belt and as he started up the cliff he must have brushed against a scrub with the cotton catching. The spool unwound with a cotton trail going up the cliff along the road to our stop point: 1.5 km of marked trail.

Following the whale sighting, about 3pm we took a break at the bus stop to have a drink/coffee to restore energy and again engage in anticipation of what was to come. Sandra

and Peet had gone down to the Tennis Courts a little earlier and did manage some reef fish, western rock blackfish, a leather jacket and wrasse. By 4pm we had all started to make our way to Radar Reef.

As always although though downhill, it is a tough climb down and a tougher one back up. While the swell was up to moderate and there was a strong SW wind, however a low tide gave us reasonable conditions for fishing off Radar.

I arriving at the rock platform and setting up our gear we could see the Wessels and the Hansens already fishing, conditions looked pretty reasonable considering a strong wind blowing into our faces. Greg and Ian had decided to take it easy for this session. When Theo and I arrived at the fishing location those fishing already had initially captured a couple of tarwhine, a couple of great skippy and western rock blackfish. Continuing, an odd skippy came in leading up to low light, but about the time one was thinking about using headlights it was skippy time.

Unfortunately I managed to miss this action. As my bait was low and I did not have my head lamp I walked in to get it. Halfway in I had a set of pretty solid swell waves come through, hence when I staggered up on the rocks, I thought no, not my thing, can't keep up that pace. Course when climbing up the cliff, I looked back and the reef appeared to be totally exposed with no waves coming over.

At the time I climbed the cliff apparently it was then as though a switch had been turned on that activated skippy to feed aggressively. The skippy kept coming and coming, all hooking up with Peet managed to get a couple of beauties. Most got their bag limit with fish averaging over 1kg uncleaned,

The yellowtail did not create much activity, a couple of undersize were caught and released with Peet landing the only just size fish. However, some had heavy bags of skippy to climb up the hill or should I say cliff.

Lots of excited talk on the bus as everyone wanted to relive their successes or bust-offs. Once back in the very comfortable cottages, relax and followed by a hot shower and a hot meal, with everyone sleeping well that night.

The following morning, Sunday, a repeat of loading up the bus at 11am, stopping off at the bakery again and out to West End. The bakery lived up to its word and we had those lamb and rosemary pies ready and waiting for us, hot and delicious.

On arrival at the West End and viewing the sea, the weather conditions exceeded our expectations, swell low, no wind with tide still falling, with about 5 hours to low tide at 5pm.

We split up again with most heading to Wilson and Mark going down to the Tennis Courts. Mark, also using soft plastics ended up with a bag of 18 herring.

Round at Wilsons, the effort was worse than Saturday, only a couple of tarwhine and wrasse, except Peet caught a magnificent Green and Red wrasse. A unique fish that when subject to verification by John Curtis, should be not only be a club record, but a State and National record.

Have to advise that Sandra has lost the title of buffy queen as Peet's success on this species for this weekend, made him a clear winner.

However Greg appeared to want to get into this scenario. He also managed to land some huge buffy that were difficult to manage the handling during the unhooking process. Excitement also created by a wobbegong shark that kept swimming around our feet. As long as you stay still and do not kick or tread on them they are harmless.

As the previous night just about just before dark the switch was flipped to tell the skippy to go into a feeding frenzy. Suddenly all of us were on. I had 4 casts resulting in 4 skippy.

Then I had 3 misses in a row before I realized the fish were so aggressive feeding from top to bottom of the water column. If you did not immediately flip the reel bail arm take up line slack and feel the sinker as soon as it landed in the water, the bait was gone and thus no fish. Once recognizing this I soon had my bag limit of 8, hence I went back to shore.

Peet and Sandra went back and started fishing the Tennis Courts mid-afternoon and managed some wrasse, western rock blackfish and a good leatherjacket to Sandra. The rest of us, Ian, Greg, Theo, and me arrived at the Rader Reef a little before 4pm. Peet, Sandra and Mark were there already and had caught an odd very large skippy.

We all fished under perfect conditions with the odd skippy, tarwhine and wrasse coming in. However what bought a lot of excitement was the number of buff bream coming in. They were huge, my guess some of them would be 10+kg. The initial hit by one of these gave immediate thoughts of a yellowtail kingfish.





During this session, it was great to look up and see 3 or 4 fisherpersons hooked up and rods bent double on skippy of 1+kg. Sandra of course making the usual South African war cries of shouting and yelling each time she hooked up. Think she was trying to tell friends back in South Africa she was having a ball. Some stopped on for a bit to undertake catch and release. While most used mulies, I had caught a couple on herring fillets which had the same reaction as casting out a mulie; Mark also caught most of his bag during this session on soft plastics.

Walking back to shore I pondered again our Rottnest trip was a really great and memorable fishing experience. When back I started gutting and clean my skippy and tarwhine. I was soon followed by others in cleaning their fish. I then made my way up the cliff with a full load of fish. Hard work, but a smile on my face.

Again lots of excited talk on the bus as everyone wanted to relive their successes or bustoffs. Once back in the very comfortable cottages we cleaned ourselves up a bit, organized our bag of fish and went about the weigh-in. The tabling of the bags of fish was very impressive. Gilled and gutted skippy averaged from just less than 1kg, with some fish well over. Peet Wessels was a clear winner with some 17.8kg of fish and 6 species. His 2kg skippy was the largest just pipping his yellowtail of 1.95kg. The rest of us had bags of 9 to 12kg. Theo did well as he had 4 species and 12.36kg, as did Sandra with 5 species and 11.77kg.

We all had a good sleep, followed by a hot breakfast then coffee etc. at the bakery before catching the ferry at 11am. What a trip.

With the boundaries opened up a bit further for the local fishing, Pat McKeown, Dean Stewart, John Crompton and Martin Wearmouth headed up to Seabird. What a disappointment, windy, rainy and all the usual beaches filled with weed.

They then decided to head south and check out fishing spots on the way back. A favorable spot, the mouth of the Moore River at Guilderton was open, generally a plus for catching mulloway, however again all weeded up.

They then went into Wilbinga, again weed, but potentially fishable. They tried for some 5 hours into the dark, losing rigs to weed, however Pat

Mosquito bites are not just a nuisance

With the coming of Spring and people spending more time outdoors, once again people have been urged to avoid mosquito bites. These can carry Ross River, Barmah Forest or Murray Valley virus which can cause serious diseases in a small percentage of people.

People are urged to be especially vigilant about mosquitoes at dawn and dusk, wear long, loose clothing and apply insect repellent. Make sure caravans, tents and swags are fitted with good fly screens. If sleeping outside, use a mosquito net over the sleeping bag or swag. Even the best repellents only last up to four hours, so they are not effective all night.

Symptoms of Ross River or Barmah Forest virus vary from person to person but include painful and/or swollen joints, sore muscles, aching tendons, skin rashes, fever, tiredness, headaches and swollen lymph nodes. In rare cases, it can last for up to a year, and reduces a sufferer's ability to work.

Murray River virus is active in the Kimberley and Pilbara regions every year. Occasionally it extends into the Gascoyne, Murchison, northern Goldfields and Midwest regions of WA.

A small proportion of infected people develop a severe brain infection called encephalitis. Symptoms of encephalitis from the virus include fever, drowsiness and confusion, bad headache and stiff neck, nausea and vomiting, muscle tremors and dizziness. People with suspected Murray Valley encephalitis virus should be taken to the nearest hospital.

Black bream research and tagging

Here is a summary of an email received by the Club originally addressed to the Australian Anglers Association.

Murdoch University's Centre for Fish and Fisheries Research recently launched a three year project, funded through a grant to Professor Ian Potter from Recfishwest's Recreational Fishing Initiatives Fund, to investigate the biology of black bream across different estuary types around Western Australia.

The project will involve researchers sampling the Moore Estuary, Swan-Canning River, Murray River, Walpole-Nornalup Inlet, Wilson Inlet, Wellstead Inlet and Culham Inlet to collect biological data on the black bream.

Over the course of the studies 4000 fish would be tagged in the Swan-Canning River and the Walpole-Nornalup Inlet to enable researchers to track their movements over time.

Back bream is an iconic species in the estuaries of Western Australia. Previous research by Murdoch University researchers has revealed that the biological characteristics of black bream vary markedly among estuaries.

Our research will involve sampling black bream from different estuary types, namely permanently open, seasonally closed and normally closed, to provide data on the characteristics of this species in very different environments, with the aim of determining the factors that produce this variability.

The results from this study will greatly benefit anglers as they will provide a greater understanding of influence of climate change and modifications to estuaries and provide data that can be used to ensure that black bream will be conserved so that people can enjoy fishing this remarkable species into the future.

We would like to meet with black bream fishers as we would be particularly interested in hearing of your experiences with this species and sharing findings and informing you of what we are aiming to do and the results of our studies. We would like to involve you in our proposed tagging program.

We aim to tag a substantial number of black bream to estimate the population size and movements of this species in the Swan and Canning Rivers. To ensure that we tag a sufficient number of fish it would be great to have people assisting in fishing and implanting an external T-bar tag in black bream. The procedure is very simple and can be done with 15 minutes of training.

Update of Club website

This Club website's first page was loaded in July 2001, and the appearance was last updated in 2009.

The main pages on the website are being rearranged with a new, more modern look. These changes are evolutionary not revolutionary, with many of the effects being subtle and pastel, that is not using strong colours. Check http://www.surfcasters.iinet.net.au/





The updated design

The configuration of all the rewritten pages will all be held in a single central file allowing major changes to be made to the appearance, colours, fonts, sizes and layout by changing the definitions in that one single file.

The site will be upgraded progressively including updating of the content of many pages. Some rarely used old pages may stay with the current layout for some time.

Some content from the early years is out of date. Pages which are replaced or renamed will divert to the new equivalent page. Pages which have been completely removed will divert to a special page.

I run regular checks to make sure all pages linked from within the Club website are actually still working. If you try to access a page which doesn't exist on the Club website, you will get a special help page using the internet code "404 page not found". This page is rarely used which shows that the diversions and checks are working. When used, it is almost always from mistakes made by people entering the link or from a wrong external link.

If you think a page is missing from this site, please contact me with the details.

Features and operation of the upgraded web site. Pages on the website have one of two consistent layouts, with appearance and features as listed here, and following many familiar website conventions and standards.

One of the design principles for the previous version of the website was that the pages looked and printed exactly the same in all versions of browsers, or as closely as possible. That severely limited the options, and can't be used forever.

The site has been redesigned to operate in modern browsers and uses some simple definitions from the latest Cascading Style Sheets version 3 (CSS3). The new version does not display identically in all browsers, but the differences do not affect the operation.

Display using Internet Explorer. The multiple versions of Internet Explorer are always a problem for web page designs because different versions operate or display differently to each other and to other brands of browsers. However some operating systems like Windows XP and Vista cannot use the latest version, and also many users have not updated their versions of Internet Explorer.

Display and operation has been checked to be correct or useable in versions of Internet Explorer as follows:

Internet Explorer 10. All features display and operate as designed.

Internet Explorer 9, 8 and obsolete version 7. Page layout, resizing and operation are as designed but some enhancements of visual features are not supported by these versions and do not display. IE9 is closest.

Internet Explorer 6. (a really obsolete version). Page resizing and printing did not work as designed for modern browsers. The pages have been made a fixed width and now display without problems. Printing should choose the Landscape mode due to the poor control of printing width in that obsolete browser. Debugging all this reminded me why I changed to Firefox all those years ago. It also showed how important it is to test with a working version of these old versions of Internet Explorer.

If you are using Internet Explorer earlier than version 10 and want to see what the design should look like, use Firefox, Safari, Opera or Chrome.

Display using other browsers. Other mainstream modern browsers are free, are regularly and sometimes automatically updated, and these are not tied or limited to any particular version of the Windows operating system, so can coexist with any version of Internet Explorer. There is a multitude of versions "out there", but really there is no reason for users not to update to the latest version. It is not practical to test with all the earlier versions.

The display and operation has been tested in the latest versions at late August 2013 of Firefox 23.0.1, Safari for Windows 5.1.7, Opera 12.16 and Google Chrome 29.0.1547, and also on a Samsung Android smart phone and an iPhone.

Window size and content width. The left column containing the internal links is a fixed width. The main content panel is variable width between a set maximum and a set minimum. The website allows the user to adjust the overall width of the window and still see all of the contents of the page on a widescreen monitor or a narrower monitor. Narrow windows may require some horizontal scrolling.

Links. Links on a page are underlined and visible. Underlining is not used except for links.

Some images and some sub headings will also act as links. Every image and sub heading which is also a link will also have the link description in coloured and underlined words nearby.

Browser windows and tabs. When you click on a link, all links to pages on the Surfcasters' website will open in the same browser window or tab currently being used.

When you click on a link to an external website, these open in a new window or tab. In all cases where space allows, this is shown by the words "link opens in a new window" next to the link.

Window size and content width. The left column containing the internal links is a fixed width. The main content panel is variable width between set maximum and minimum. The website allows the user to adjust the overall width of the window and still see all of the contents of the page. Narrow windows may require some horizontal scrolling. The obsolete version 6 of Internet Explorer has a fixed width display.

Font and font size. All pages use the same font in the same sizes for the same type of content. The website allows the user to increase or reduce the size of the displayed fonts and images using the standard features provided by browsers.

PDF and other files. Internal and external PDF links nominate "the same" or "a new" tab or window as above, but the actual display result will be decided by the settings in your browser and your PDF reader program.

Search. There is a simple site Search feature at the top of each page to help you look for specific words or phrases, and a separate full featured Search page.

Age of the information on the page. All pages show when the contents were last updated. Formatting, minor layout changes and minor corrections are not usually listed.

Printing of pages. The web site has a separate central configuration file for print settings to change the formatting and to print only the important content which is required in a printed version. The essential contents will print full width in both portrait or landscape A4 page layout at the "shrink to fit" setting available in modern browsers. Background colours and link menus from the left hand column are not printed.

"Read more" opening a link with more detail is used where that is sensible.

Where to now? Please check http://www.surfcasters.iinet.net.au/ and give me any comments on what has been done so far, and any suggestions for changes.

Most things which have been done on the updated Club website have been done for a reason, but that doesn't necessarily make them right.

There are millions of websites which all look different and operate differently and have different ways of presenting content. Many of these are brilliant for their purpose but don't always suit a different purpose. Give me the link and I will see if that approach will be an improvement.

Content wanted. New and extra content is wanted from members: photos, tips, articles, members' stories, movies, etc. for the web site. I can take these in any format, Word, PDF, text, email, even an audio recording for content, and any of the usual image or movie formats.

Tips for cleaning fish

Having trouble gripping all the insides of a fish when cleaning it? Slippery isn't it? Use a small piece of towel to grip the contents and the membranes in the gut cavity.

Cut and scrape the blood channel with a knife and use the towel to scrape all the blood off the backbone.

You only need a small piece and it can go into the rubbish afterwards. But not into the water, please.

All old towels at my place are cut up, saved with my fishing gear and used to wipe hands and fish.

A small piece of wet towel can be used to wipe any sand, blood and slime off the outside of a fish before taking a photo, but don't use towel if you are going to release the fish. Dip the fish in water to give it a fresh glisten in the photo.

Number of baits and gangs of hooks

About 12 months ago AAAWA wrote to the Department of Fisheries and the Minister about the Regulations which said "... may not use a line with more than 3 hooks or gangs of hooks attached" but did not define what a gang of hooks was, and indeed there was conflicting opinions within the Department about the meaning and how that regulation would be interpreted.

Well finally there is a result. The Fish Resources Management Act Regulations have now been amended on 27 August so that it says "3 baits or lures" without caring what hooks are in those.

Regulation 64E. Lines etc. used for recreational fishing, limit on number of

- (1) Unless otherwise specified in the Act or these regulations and subject to subregulation (2), a person must not use more than 2 rods, reels and lines or single lines held in the hand at any one time when fishing.
- (2) Subregulation (1) does not apply to -
- (a) the holder of a commercial fishing licence; or
- (b) a person fishing from a boat.
- (3) A person, other than the holder of a commercial fishing licence, when fishing WA waters may not use a line with more than 3 baits or lures attached. Penalty: \$2,000.

I have copied the full text of that Regulation because it may raise some more questions.

Note that the limit on the number of rods applies to shore fishing but (b) allows a person fishing from a boat to have as many rods in the water at the same time as he likes. Why the difference?

This Club has a limit of 2 rods in use (with a bait or lure in the water) at any time during Club fishing. Be careful also at other times and be aware of the limit.

Also be aware of some other Regulations.

Regulation 64C. Fishing lines in use for recreational fishing must be attended (1) A person who fishes using a line must attend that line.

Penalty: \$2,000.

What does this mean? Can you put your rod in a rod tube in the sand and walk away from it to talk to someone nearby, visit the sandhills, etc? Well, technically only if you don't go further than 10 metres from your rod. Why 10 metres? Because:

64B. Term used: attend

In this Part - attend in respect of a line, means to be within 10 metres of the line.

And they said the Regulations would be simplified.

Commonwealth marine parks

The Keep Australia Fishing (KAF) website http://www.keepaustraliafishing.com.au/ has some information about Commonwealth Marine Parks and sanctuary "no fishing" zones in time for the Federal elections.

A number of recreational fishers have asked if the proposed Commonwealth Marine Reserve system as recently announced will be the last of claims for further marine reserves in Australia and specifically "no fishing" zones? The answer is NO!

There are a number of proposals for marine reserves from international and Australian based environmental groups that, if met even partly, would result in large extensions to the Marine Reserve System.

These proposals, in the form of publicly available submissions to the Commonwealth Government, spelt out those groups' proposed reserve requirements and designs for the Marine Park Reserve system. The proposals were a mixture of text descriptions and geographic maps.

http://www.keepaustraliafishing.com.au/index.php/marine-park-watch has a single map assembled by KAF to compare with the Commonwealth proposed marine reserve system.

All these areas are in Commonwealth waters, generally starting 3 nautical miles from the coast, so would not affect shore based fishers.

State waters from the shore line out are handled by the State Government, with the two major parties having quite different approaches to handling the demands for protection.

Some environmental groups are unhappy with the timing of the release of this map close to the Federal election, however KAF have defended the map and offered to discuss any so called errors with the environmental groups.

Federal Labor is standing by their current proposals but has not ruled out extensions in future.

Even if only a fraction of the demands are agreed to, this will add large areas to the "no fishing" map.

The Greens have criticised the current plans as not protecting enough. That means they say not enough area is closed to all fishing, because in their opinion "if it is not closed to fishing then it is just not protected", regardless of how tightly the fishing is managed or the actual risk fishing might involve.

The Liberal Party has promised to suspend the marine protected areas that the Government has recently declared, and will not declare a marine protected area without the right science and without the right consultation.




